Doolittle Institute using her skills towards applied innovation and technology transfer, along with strengthening small businesses and mentoring adult and youth entrepreneurs. By 2015, SHN was growing and became a fulltime occupation for Esther.

Engaging the community for positive impact is a high priority for Sharing Hands Network. SHN's CommunitySTRONG

outreach program works to support families and youth, veterans and first responders, along with food insecure and homeless. "In addition to outreach work, we also have our digital platform (SHN.co) that's made available for the community to use. Everything we do is to make our community stronger," said Esther.

The devastation left by Hurricane Michael accelerated the expansion of regional use of SHN's capabilities and services. Esther has been appointed as a member of the Executive Committee for the newly formed "Bay County Long Term Disaster Recovery Organization (LTDRO)" and is leading Volunteer Engagement to address the unmet needs of disaster survivors. SHN's digital platform (SHN.co) was tailored for Hurricane Michael relief efforts and is being utilized by various responders, including collection/distribution facilities and FEMA/FDEM personnel.

Needs will shift as recovery efforts progress, and SHN wants

to meet those needs in ways that maximize precious and limited resources. To that end, Esther is collaborating with the Hurricane Harvey LTDRO in Houston, along with LTDROs in other cities that have experienced largescale disasters. She knows that leveraging lessons learned by others will strengthen our local recovery efforts.

Community engagement is critical to achieving SHN's mission of "Healthy & Happy Families, Strong & Engaged

Communities," Esther said, "We do what we're doing, because each person in the community matters, and each individual has a contribution that is uniquely theirs to make. It's incredibly important to acknowledge that what we're all part of is bigger than the part we each play."

"One of the first artists to climb on board," says Ron, "was Allison Yii. Her original creation entitled 'Look Ma' depicts a young boy holding a seashell. "I encourage the artists chosen to keep their artwork simple and colorful," he says. "It's one thing to have a painting right in front you with tons of detail, but quite another when viewing it several feet above while traveling at 35-40 mph. In the future, Ron hopes to get children involved and display their art as well.

For the Banner Project to work, each artist creates and donates an original work of art. They use whatever style and medium they prefer - oil, acrylics, watercolor, etc. - just as long as it works on a banner. Ron says the banner artwork seems to cover all the different styles from funky (Red Bird Art) to impressionistic (Libbo Morgan). The artwork is then photographed and the digital images sent to CJ Signs in Ft. Walton for printing. Once printed, they're available for viewing in Destin's Flutterby Antiques until the city installs them on the poles along Main St.

This initiative began when Ron and others formed the Main Street Betterment Alliance in 2013 with the intent of improving Destin's Main Street. "We are just a group of citizens dedicated and

motivated to make Destin the best it can be," says Ron. Projects implemented through the Alliance include adopting Main Street, number of artists in the community, but no central area where their work can be seen. "That's one reason why Main St. would



Vision CAN Become Reality with Your Help

Destin Lifers have been discussing the desire for a Destin High School for nearly a decade. This past October, Destin High School was officially established as a Florida not-for-profit corporation. Upon approval of the charter application, the new high school could open as early as August 2020. (Please see complete story in Dec. 2018 Destin Life, www.MyDestinLife.com.)

DESTIN HIGH SCHOOL TIMELINE:

June 2016: Destin City Council votes to approve formation of Destin High School Advisory Committee.

August 2018: Committee selects Collaborative Educational Network (CEN) - consultants charged with writing the charter.


October 2, 2018: Officially established as a Florida not-forprofit Corporation.

Mid-January 2019: Meeting with facility financing and development firms to explore underwriting and viable site locations for high school.

February 2019: CEN will

submit charter application.

August 2020: Upon charter approval tentative school opening.



GOALS:

Phase 1: \$85,000 for consultant fees to write the charter and provide ongoing expertise until the school opens. It will also cover attorney fees for legal

documents and the establishment of Destin High School, Inc., as a not-for-profit entity.

Phase 2: \$500,000 is for facility development, plans, faculty search, Federal CSP Grant writing, operational and startup expenses.



Tips from the Trainer: Be Positive about Communication

One of the most hotly contested issues in the dog world concerns training methods. I figured it would be a good time to insert my two cents, for what it's worth. B.F. Skinner is a famous name that is thrown around quite a bit in the world of behavior studies. While Skinner once believed positive reinforcement was the key to success in behavior modification, he also said this a few years before he died in 1990, "We may know that certain things are going to happen, but knowing is not enough; action is needed." It was his concession that the world cannot change just knowing a bad decision would bring about negative consequences, many have to experience them in order to change. He truly felt this was unfortunate. I think we can all agree that it is. Skinner realized that his theory was merely a utopian idea when considering the masses. This has, to this day, left dog trainers at odds with one another, and people confused at which method is best. I think it really depends on the individual dog being trained.

The first thing we must consider is how dogs learn in order to be able to teach them what we expect from them. Let's just start with a basic concept. Most dogs like to play, and when dogs want



to play with another dog they often have a higher pitched bark that sounds pretty happy. When dogs do not like something or someone they bark deeper - and when they really don't like something, it gets even deeper and growly. So, if we want to best communicate with a dog that we tout as our fur-baby, dressed in holiday costumes, it would only make sense that we communicate in a softer manner. We actually do the same for personal protection dogs and working dogs. It only makes sense that we would do this rather than barking commands in an authoritative voice that naturally sounds like you

are not happy. Did you catch that? commands. It is time to rethink everything.

When we communicate properly, it is more likely to yield a positive response. We all want a perfect relationship with our furry pals. I often say that a good relationship

has good communication, while a bad relationship has bad communication. You must communicate what you do not like, as well. This might be the time to use a little tougher tone or other correction to express displeasure. Some people call this negative, but Skinner knew it worked even if he preferred a positive reward system.

If you want a better relationship, stop barking commands at your dog. Convey your "expectation" and hold your dog to it. If you ask your dog to sit, he should sit until you release him from the position. Studies show that dogs can learn 200-250 words.

One dog is on record as having learned over 1,000 words. Use your common words and your dog can learn what they mean fairly quickly. Use lots of praise when your dog gets it. This is the reward your dog truly seeks. A special treat here and there doesn't hurt, but should be saved

for building a relationship - like bringing home flowers or cooking a favorite meal.

My husband and I want to be able to stay at home as we grow older and know that we might need some help. Does Medicare pay for home health costs?

A. In my work, I find a lot of people who believe that Medicare will take care of their Home Health Care needs. To a certain extent, Medicare will pay for SOME Home Health Care services. However, it is limited. Medicare will pay for Home Health Care services provided by a skilled nurse and that care must be certified by a doctor. Help with things such as bathing, dressing, food prep, etc. would not be covered by Medicare. These services are called Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) and are considered custodial in nature. In other words, they do not require a skilled nurse to perform. In order to receive coverage for ADL services, you would need to pay out of pocket or purchase a specific type of insurance plan designed to pay Home Care workers. The other option is qualifying for Medicaid. The state Medicaid program will pay for these services as well. Feel free to reach out to us for a personal consultation.

Benefits of a Customized Auto Policy

Billy always looked forward to Christmas dinner with his family, and the food was worth dreaming about. This year was no different and Uncle Eddie dominated the table conversation.

But that was okay because Uncle Eddie, though quite the talker, was dearly loved. We sat spell-bound as Uncle Eddie regaled us with details of the car accident he had been in earlier this year, and, as he expressed it, "I thought I would die!" Several broken ribs, a broken clavicle, concussion, and almost a week later, he was out of the hospital and back home recuperating.

Uncle Eddie learned a lot about auto insurance in a short period of time. He now believes he can spar with the best insurance agents out there as they throw words around like 'uninsured motorist' and 'personal injury protection' and more.

To make auto insurance simple, you can think of it as having just two main components. The 'people protector' and the 'vehicle protector'.

In the people protector you have Bodily Injury/Property Damage, Medical Payments, PIP (Personal Injury Protection),

and Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist.

Bodily Injury and Property Damage coverage protects your assets. The more assets you need to protect, the higher the limits should be, with \$100K/\$300K/\$100K our recommended starting point. So, if you slam into a car or cars in front of you as they hit their brakes, your insurance will pay a maximum of \$100,000 for each person you injured, subject to a maximum of \$300,000 for the accident in total. After that's depleted, their attorney will come after your bank account, and any other assets you have.

For those with significant assets, an Umbrella policy is recommended for increased protection. In most cases the Umbrella will require minimum underlying Liability limits of \$250K/\$500K/\$100K.

PIP, mandated by Florida, provides medical, disability, and death benefits to you and any passengers in your vehicle. Basic PIP covers up to 80% of your medical expenses and 60% of your lost wages. For as low as \$2 per year, you can purchase Extended PIP which covers up to 100% of your medical expenses and 80% of your lost wages, with a maximum payout available of \$10,000. A smart buy!

Medical Payments covers you for any injury sustained in the accident and is usually offered in increments of \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$10,000.

Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist is critical coverage when you're involved in an accident that is someone else's fault and they either don't have insurance, or not enough limits to take care of your medical costs, which include rehabilitation, lost wages, pain and suffering, and more. It's like having your own Bodily Injury coverage. Although often confusing, we always recommend the Stacked (broader) Option vs, Non-Stacked with limits equal to the Bodily Injury Limits on the policy.

In the vehicle protector of auto insurance you have Comprehensive and Collision, Rental Reimbursement, Roadside Service, Gap Coverage and other options. The deductibles for Comp and Collision usually range from \$250 to \$2,500 per claim.

Collision coverage repairs or replaces your vehicle if it collides with another vehicle or stationary object or rolls over. Like when the Michigan slush pulled me off the road into a ditch where I ended upside down hanging by my seatbelt. That's a collision claim.

Comprehensive coverage re-

pairs or replaces your vehicle for damage sustained from things like fire, theft, falling objects, glass breakage, and more. Almost anything that can happen to your vehicle other than a collision. I once had a customer call to file a claim on their auto policy. I asked them for some particulars. "Well," they said, "when I woke up this morning and looked out my front window, there was a bear in the bed of my pick-up truck. He had broken my back window and was destroying my upholstery." That's a comp claim. I'm not sure if the adjuster filed it under 'contact with an animal' or 'vandalism.'

One last thing. Many of our customers have golf carts, or LSVs (low speed vehicles). As long as they're not rented, they can be written as a separate policy or added to your auto policy if they are licensed for road use. The rental exposure can some-

times be written under a commercial liability policy.

The bottom line is to talk to your agent and get customized auto coverages that fit your personal needs.



That was a long time ago, but in some ways, I am still that sixteen-year-old fool. And in some ways she is still that pig-tailed girl.


And one day, when Lucy grows up to be big and strong, perhaps when my life is over, she will read this. Time will have moved on without me, and I will be just a memory.



Stock, Bond and Money Markets:

Destin History and Fishing Museum: A Comforting Throwback to Early Fishing Times

Nestled back on Stahlman Drive near our Destin Community Center lies a small house-like building showcasing the history of fishing in our beach town, known as the Destin History and Fishing Museum. January is a great time visit and see first hand the journey our city has gone through since Leonard Destin landed ashore in 1835.

The Destin Fishing Museum opened Oct. 1, 2005 with a goal to share the story of how our small fishing village became a major tourist attraction. It houses thousands of historic photographs, artifacts, fishing equipment, murals, fish mounts and even some historic boats from the early days. There is even an entire section dedicated to our famous Destin Fishing Rodeo that showcases notable catches, records, and more.

Outside the front door is what is known as Museum Heritage Park. Wander through and see restored boats such as the Primrose, the last seine net boat in Destin. You'll also find the old Destin post office that was built in 1936, restored and full of exhibits. Another favorite is the huge replica of a Megladon Shark jaw, a perfect place for a photo opportunity.

Upon entering, you're greeted by the staff who offer a variety of ways to experience the mu-

seum. From scavenger hunts, to self guided tours with or without audio headsets, to having a staff member lead you through and answer your questions, the choice is yours. The museum is currently open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. with a small admission fee to the public ranging up to \$5 a person.

In one corner you'll find cabinets of old black and white photos from the early days, with women and men

posing by their monster catches on the docks of what is now Harborwalk Village. See images from Destin's first Rodeo, families posing by fish boards, and even proud anglers posing next to fish 3 times the size of themselves. In the days without rules or regulations, these photos showcase a different time and culture when it came to the sport of fishing.

From there you can wander through the backside of the building, which houses the bulk of the exhibit. Destin's history hangs on the walls from the times of Indians, stories of how life was back then paired with artifacts and photos. As you move through, you'll learn how the boats and



fishing equipment evolved over time, what commercial fishing was like and why it was important, and how our city has changed over the years as fishing grew.

Pause at large exhibit in the middle of the room and you'll notice over 70 locally caught fish, mounted, with details of the species of fish and where they can be found in our Bay or Gulf. Next to that is the history of fishing poles and bait, what was used to catch this variety of fish. As you near the end and where you started, you'll find the museums gift shop with a variety of t-shirts, seashells, posters, history books, ornaments and more.

The Destin History and Fishing Museum is a must for any fishing enthusiast, history buff, or anyone with interest in the evolution of our fishing village. Make plans to stop by and support this non-profit and all that they're



Communicating With Teens

Many parents complain that their teenagers no longer talk with them. Communication has now taken the form of sullen mumbling or random, rage-filled outbursts. Many teens prefer the company of friends rather than their family which leads to hurt feelings all around. As children turn into teenagers their job is to separate from the parents/caregivers in their lives. It is developmentally appropriate and necessary for them to begin to pull away and become independent.

My advice to parents of teens is, "Don't take anything personally." Teenagers are in a difficult stage of life. They are figuring out who they are independent of parents. That is why you will often see teens bucking commonly held family morals and beliefs. They are testing those beliefs to see if it's what they actually believe in personally. Your teenager faces judgement, deadlines and peer pressure every day, but is still in the process of learning how to juggle all of those demands. It's no wonder, tempers can be short. You are a safe space for your teen to melt down. I know that does not make the outbursts any more enjoyable for you, but it does take the personal affront out of it at least.

There are several steps that you can take to ensure communication with your teen remains intact. The first step is to be in the same room as your teen. As any parent of a teenager can tell you, it is not unusual for your child to stay in his or her room for long periods of time and deliver heavy eye rolling and sighs when you enter their domain. For that reason, I suggest

the next popular room in the house for teenagers-the kitchen. Prepare a favorite snack when your teen is due home from school. Be sure that you are able to be completely present in that moment-no cell phone, no work emails, etc.

Parents often make the mistake of drilling their kids with questions when they walk in the door, "What did you get on your exam? Did you remember to take out the trash?" Or parents make the other mistake of asking a bland question like "How was school?" Both of these communication styles will most likely lead to a miscommunication with your teenager. Instead, try asking your teen an openended question about something he is interested in. For example, "I heard you listening to a new song the other day, what's up with that band?" By sticking to neutral topics of interest, you are more likely to gain positive communication as a response.

Another very important step is to listen. As parents we often jump in to offer advice or point out what our child did wrong in a situation. Our teens will shut down immediately if there is any sense of judgement or criticism as a response to their opening up to us. Instead, focus on active listening skillsnodding your head in agreement, leaning into the conversation and empathizing, "That's lousy that Jennifer said that to you..." There is so much that is said without words, you will get a glimpse into your teen's world if you pay attention to body language and facial expressions. If your teen is saying something you disagree with, hold it to yourself and approach the topic at a later time.

As children grow into teenagers, rules and expectations must be adjusted. Allow your teen the ability to have some input into the rules that govern their life. If you immediately shut down your teen's attempts to negotiate with rules, you risk shutting down their communication completely. Everyone has a need to feel heard, including teenagers. This doesn't mean that you give into every request your teen makes, such as missing curfew, but if you hear your teen out, you might find he has a valid point. If he knows you are willing to listen,

he will be more willing to speak up.

One final suggestion is to set limits on their cell phone usage. This is not a popular tactic with teens of course, but it is necessary. Set times throughout the day where a technology ban is in place—meal time, one hour before bedtime, in the car, etc. Our kids have distraction right in their back pockets, and do not feel the need to communicate with those around them. They also lack the impulse control to refrain from looking at their phones. When we take away that distraction, they might complain at first, but at least they will be talking to you! Eventually it will just become an accepted expectation within the home that opens up opportunity for talk. Don't forget, the cell phone ban is for everyone in the home, including parents.

These years with teenagers are fleeting, just as their toddler years were. As your teen gains confidence in who she is as a person, you will see a return to easy conversations. Have patience, give love (especially when he is unlovable) and engage in active listening.

Coconut Lime Shrimp

1 lb. peeled and deveined shrimp, fresh or frozen

1/2 cup Coconut Balsamic Vinegar

1/2 cup Persian Lime Olive Oil

1 teaspoon garlic, minced

1/2 teaspoon crushed red chili flakes

1 tablespoon cilantro or parsley, minced

1 tablespoon fresh lime juice

Salt and pepper, to taste

2 tablespoons more Persian Lime Olive Oil

Cream cheese

Crackers or cucumber rounds

Combine all the ingredients through the salt and pepper in a non-reactive bowl. Cover and refrigerate for 20 minutes. Remove from the refrigerator and drain. Lightly pat dry.

In a medium skillet, add 1 tablespoon of the remaining olive oil and the shrimp. Saute about 1-2 minutes per side, just until opaque. You might need to do this in two batches. Let cool to room temperature.

Spread a little cream cheese on a cracker or cucumber round and top with the shrimp.

Makes about 20, depending on size of shrimp

Fare for the New Year

I was invited by The United States Potato Board, the nation's potato marketing organization, to create a fresh, light, natural and healthy recipe to start the New Year off right after indulging over the holidays. Most of us can use a little help, right? The U.S. Potato Board provides inspiration, information, tools and education to potato lovers all over the world. Rich in potassium, vitamin C, and containing zero fat (until loaded with bacon, butter and sour cream), I happen to be a fan of potatoes, the most versatile root vegetable.

This particular recipe is amazing as it is filled with turnip greens that are rich in calcium, vitamin K, and also known to be an excellent source for detoxification. Locally



sought-after fresh shrimp are added as a fantastic source of vitamin B12 (brain health), and omega 3 fatty acids that help reduce cardiovascular problems. The red potatoes, one of the 9th wonders of the world, are also one of my favorite potato varieties as you can cook just about anything with them at any time. They are a staple in my low-country boils, crawfish boils, and in holiday recipes like my roasted red potatoes with sea salt and Rosemary. In this soup recipe, the red potatoes are adding an excellent source of fiber, as I mentioned before are a superior source of vitamin C, and have three times the potassium per serving than a banana. Throw in all the extras like the fennel, garlic, onions, tomatoes and herbs to name a few, and you will be thanking that bowl of goodness you are holding for being so tasty and nourishing your body as you savor each bite.

Healthy Shrimp, Red Potato and Turnip Green Soup

Full of flavor, healthy and nutritious, this shrimp, red potato, and turnip green soup will get your New Year off on the right track after derailing over the holidays. Just take a look at the ingredients! Packed with veggies, protein, and potassium rich potatoes, the pep in your step will return after just a few bites.

- 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 bulb fennel, trimmed and chopped
- 6 cloves garlic, minced

1 bunch turnip greens, washed well, tough stems removed and leaves (chiffonade) finely chopped. Do not throw away the white turnip at the end of the green, as the turnips can be mashed or pureed with potatoes for later use as a delicious side dish.

- 1 can (28 ounces) San Marzano tomatoes, rinsed, drained and diced
- 8 red potatoes quartered
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 2 (32-ounce) containers low sodium vegetable or chicken broth
- 1 lb. extra-large fresh shrimp, peeled, deveined and tails removed (tails on for optimal presentation)
 - 1 Tbsp. chopped fresh rosemary
 - 1 tsp. kosher salt
 - 1/2 tsp. ground black pepper
 - 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper
 - Flat leaf parsley or cilantro, chopped (optional garnish)

In a large Dutch oven, heat oil over medium heat. Add onion, fennel, and garlic; cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add turnip greens and tomatoes and cook until turnip greens are tender, stirring frequently, about 15 minutes. Add wine; cook for 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Gradually stir in broth and red potatoes. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat; reduce heat and simmer for 25 minutes. Add shrimp, rosemary, salt and pepper; cook 5 to 7 minutes more until shrimp are firm and pink (do not overcook shrimp). Garnish with parsley or cilantro, if desired. Serve with warm cornbread or your favorite crackers.

#Tip: Recipe can be altered by adding 1-2 cans of drained and rinsed cannellini beans for additional fiber.

#Substitute: Kale or your favorite soup worthy leafy green.

#Vegetarian Option: For a creamy, smooth and silky green soup, leave out the shrimp and use vegetable broth, then transfer the soup to a heavy-duty blender. Puree the mixture for 2-3 minutes or until the soup is completely smooth. Transfer the pureed soup back the Dutch oven, and stir in additional vegetable broth until it is the thickness desired. Top with a dollop of yogurt.

The answer is only one. Clint's eclectic works incorporate a broad spectrum and are about as diverse as his upbringing.

Raised and educated in South Africa, Clint says he's really from just about everywhere. Born to a middle-class family with tendencies to move frequently, Clint became of age during the turmoil raging in South Africa. In the late 70's, he attended the Johannesburg School of Art and formally trained in sculpting, drawing, painting and mixed media. After graduating in 1981, he settled in Dallas where there was a support system of



other South Africans who had fled the country to escape the escalating violence back home. His next adventure took him to Scotland where he ultimately was awarded a scholarship for his creative achievement while enrolled in the Advertising and Design program at the Fashion and Arts Institute.

Clint became involved with several businesses after college, always as the lead designer, including Frontline Graphics based in San Diego. By age 23, his work was internationally published. Frontline Graphics began selling his originals and his lithographs in Japan, Scandinavia, Australia, western Europe and the U.S. "I was young then, but I was starting to realize I was making the owners of the company a lot of money," he said.

About the time Clint was thinking about going out on his own, the largest gift and home décor company in the country, Figi Graphics, hired him as Director of Product Design and Development. He was 25 years old and living his rendition of 'the dream.' He had a gorgeous office overlooking the

San Diego Bay, a great salary, and free reign of his creative powers. He had a large staff of artists working for him from all different backgrounds. He redesigned a lagging line for Figi that generated millions in sales for the company. By the early 90's, Figi was sending Clint to Asia to launch and manage production in factories in Taiwan. Recognizing the growing industry in Taiwan and China, Clint made the move to Taipei and set up his own design company. He was all of 27. He landed his first account shortly thereafter for a large picture framing company in Texas, and it wasn't long before he was doing industrial designing for several large companies in the consumer products area.

In the mid-90's, he wanted to develop his international design and art consulting company, and moved back to the states. "Many headquarters of the companies I worked with were in Chicago, so it seemed to make sense to be closer to the customer," Clint recalled. It proved to be a very good move. He was able to build up his customer base with very successful importers, including, Pier 1, Stein Mart, CBK, Ganz, K-Mart, Wilton Industries, J.C. Penny, Kirkland's Home Stores, Venture Stores, Disney and Costco and others.

Clint's International Trading and Import/Export company expanded and became established. He opened a major office and showroom in China, with a staff of 110 and a 35,000 sq. ft. facility. Business was booming and he expanded his design consulting and services to Europe and landed many accounts in the UAE, as well, mostly home décor stores, gift shops, and lighting studios.

So, how did this internationally known artist and world traveler find his way here? "Well, my wife, Effie and I visited a friend in Destin a few years ago and, in the matter of a few days we were in love. Chicago's cold you know," he said with a chuckle. Clint and Effie bought a house in Destiny East in 2017 and opened Clint Eagar Designs in Uptown Grayton Circle, Grayton Beach. Clint says our area reminds him of the beauty of South Africa where he grew up. Working on 30A has inspired Clint to get back to his painting roots, where he spends most of his time in his studio in the back of the gallery, though he's still working with a few favored corporate companies on the side. It's an area amenity to have a master of the craft like this. In collaboration with "Theo of South Walton" and the Friends of South Walton Sea Turtles, Clint created a painting of Theo, developed a "Theo" product line, Christmas ornaments, A Theo Pillow and of course, the classic plush turtle. The dredging project could begin as early as this March.
