Each day approximately 22 U.S. Veterans commit suicide. Let that sink in-22!

"Seriously. One is an outrage and a tragedy," says Gayle Vann, marketing events coordinator for Legendary Marine. "Short of suicide, our brave men and women, military and first responders across the nation and abroad are struggling with symptoms related to PTSD and other byproducts from defending the front lines."

Hence, the Emerald Coast Honor Games was born when the vision of Lt. Sean Lynch of the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Department was realized. Filled with competition, honor, community, fun, food and world class views; the community, competitors, vendors, Veterans, special guests and current "defenders" come together on Nov. 9 to raise funds to support defenders of the front line. last year. But they still feel the storm's effects. "One of my kids has special needs, so I stay home to take care of him. Money is normally tight; it's even harder now after Hurricane Michael. Without help, my kids wouldn't have enough to eat," says Jane.

Meet Brittany and Clint who both have jobs – he has a college degree and works at a local bank while she has a job at a movie theater. But the family's income is still at the poverty level. Sometimes, they even go without utilities to help pay for food and other bills. They need help making ends meet, especially around the holidays.

No one expects their lives to be hit—whether it's by 155 mph winds or—just life.

This Thanksgiving, you'll likely set your table to enjoy a Thanksgiving meal complete with turkey and heaping sides of stuffing. But for the thousands in our area who struggle with hunger, celebrating the holidays can be tough.



Currently, there are approximately 399 sheltered and unsheltered homeless throughout Okaloosa and Walton counties, says Homelessness and Housing Alliance. According to Feeding America, there are 8,720 food insecure children in Okaloosa County alone. Of this group, family incomes are at or below 185% of poverty level. Hunger in Okaloosa and Walton County is a very real issue for children, families, active duty military, and retired veterans struggling each day just to satisfy their basic needs.

One way we can all help this Thanksgiving is through the Annual Crop Drop! On the appointed day each November, Crop Drop Destin UMC and Thrivent Financial, Emerald Coast Group, along with the help of the Destin and surrounding communities gather to help local, struggling families have a good Thanksgiving meal.

Hundreds of brown paper bags and boxes filled with unsold produce line the parking lot of Destin United Methodist Church on this day. Even children with their parents help to package goods. The sight is so beautiful, if you've lost faith in humanity, this event will cause

you to reconsider. Smiling and happy faces of people with generous hearts are rampant. By the end of the day, volunteers will have packed and prayed over 80,000 pounds of produce—potatoes, sweet potatoes, cucumbers, bell peppers, corn and everything in between—to help feed 6,000 local families for Thanksgiving, including Veteran support groups, elderly care services and shelters. Prayer helps to meet spiritual needs as well.

Family-size bags are then loaded into agency vehicles to be transported to food pantries, homeless shelters, and church dispensaries across the Panhandle. More than 50 agencies throughout Walton, Okaloosa, and Santa Rosa counties collect and distribute the bagged produce from Crop Drop that feeds an estimated 24,000 individuals each year.

Thrivent Financial started the Crop Drop in 2009 and has hosted it every year. For more than a decade, young and old, families, students, churches, non-profit organizations, bystanders, clubs and other groups have come together to work like a well-oiled machine to lift, sort, pack, move, load, haul and drive the produce.

Crop Drop coordinates with farmers in Florida and Mississippi that glean their fields of the produce that isn't sold to the market place and then a freight company delivers it to Destin.

The Crop Drop will be held Saturday, Nov. 23 from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at Destin United Methodist Church, 200 Beach Drive, Destin. To register, visit www.cropdrop.org, their Facebook page Crop Drop Destin or call 850-586-0585.

movements that can be adjusted to accommodate ANY fitness level or movement limitations. "With these two events alone, your entire family can do something special to let our Veterans know that you stand in support of their sacrifice," says Vann.

The Emerald Coast Honor Games also features a fitness competition with various di-



visions to bring out your best inner warrior. Hundreds of competitors embark on a day of strength, conditioning and grind during four major fitness events. With popular vendors, raffle and silent auction items, special VIPs, local heroes, music, food, kids' area, and other patriotic ways to engage, the Emerald Coast Honor Games provides our community an opportunity to show our pride and honor. ## Meet our Hometown Hero: Byron Beplay

We're honored to introduce Byron Beplay, a local who grew up in Destin and Pensacola, joined the military in 1990 and served our country as a Special Ops Army Ranger. While serving, he participated in the Iraqi and Afghanistan invasions, risking his life to protect ours, as do so many others.

In 2009, he returned home as an instructor and taught a pre scuba dive course for the Army's Special Ops Special Forces Combat Dive School on Eglin Air Force Base. Since then, Byron has worked as a contractor, an underwater welder, and has worked in the medical field's emergency services.

So, what's a formal Special Ops Army Ranger with 13 years of active duty experience to do when the top-secret missions on his movie reel of life ends?

Byron spends his days volunteering for free and delivering medicine, medical care and aid to some of the world's most dangerous places. Currently the director of forward deployed operations for Global Surgical Medical Support Group (GSMSG), Byron takes former military Special Ops Veterans, (1000 members from all branches of the military) and coordinates going into war torn countries like Iraq, to teach tactical combat casualty care. He also leads military teams of nurses, doctors and surgeons that render medical aid and who all volunteer their time in service of others.





Byron says, "In a world that is very inhumane where I've witnessed so much destruction, I want to bring a little humanity." For this Army Ranger who deployed 15 different times, he feels it's an honor to serve others and in turn honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice. In fact, he recently returned from Iraq where he was helping the Kurds. And how did this all start?

Fast forward to last year when Hurricane Michael hit Panama City and Mexico Beach, Byron sprung into action. He started out on foot with merely a rucksack and began rescuing people from the rubble. The next thing he knew, he was coordinating rescue efforts by helicopter, and

soon the total monetary aid he implemented reached 3.5 million dollars.

This admiral feat did not go unnoticed as the founder and president of GSMSG, Aaron Epstein, contacted Byron to offer him a director position with his 501 (c) (3) charitable organization, and the rest is history.

It's important to note that GSMSG goes into conflict zones and austere environments where high quality skills sets are needed most, and is strictly a humanitarian and charitable organization. The volunteers all pledge their time for free and even pay for their own flights to the different countries.



## From Destin Mayor Jarvis: Norriego Point



Good things are in store for the City of Destin! As we roll into 2020, the final phase of the Norriego Point Stabilization Project will begin. Amenities will include a pavilion, restrooms, showers, drinking fountains, environmental educational signage, bike racks, a boardwalk,

dune crossovers, vehicle parking and ADA components. The first phase began in October of 2017 to restore and stabilize Norriego Point and the addition of vegetation to the dune structure was part of the second phase. The idea for stabilizing Norriego Point began in 1999 with the development of the Inlet Management Plan and has been supported by numerous city councils, mayors, committees, harbor businesses, the chamber of commerce and community organizations. In 2012, the city's hope for the stabilization project was made a reality by a partnership with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). Together,

the city and FDEP secured the necessary funds through the Beach Management Funding Assistance program and the Natural Resource Damage Assessment (NRDA) restoration process which evaluates and restores natural resources impacted by the 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill. More than 12 million dollars has been allocated to this project. This park will be a wonderful place for our residents, families, friends and visitors to enjoy.

Please stay tuned as we will have more to share in the coming months regarding the amenities at Clement Taylor Park and the future development of Captain Royal Melvin Heritage

## From Sheriff Larry Ashley: Emerald Coast Crime Stoppers




Do you have information about a crime? Do you know that there is an anonymous way to provide information to police and possibly receive a cash reward? Emerald Coast Crime Stoppers is a program that involves the public, the media and the police in the fight against crime. Simply stated, the Crime Stoppers concept is based on the principle that someone – other than the criminal – has information that can solve or prevent a crime. It offers anonymity and cash rewards of up to \$3,000 to those who furnish information that helps law enforcement solve crimes, locate wanted fugitives, recover stolen property and obtain illegal narcotics.

What most people don't realize is Emerald Coast Crime Stoppers is not a branch of any government or law enforcement agency and there are no tax-payer dollars used to pay the reward money. It is a non-profit 501©3 organization run by a civic-minded, volunteer board of directors who meet monthly to approve reward amounts and conduct day-to-day operations for the program. Funding comes directly from the local community in the form of donations and a grant, administered by the Florida Attorney General's Office, with funds emanating from local courts.

#### How does Crime Stoppers work?

The process of contacting Emerald Coast Crime Stoppers is simple and tipsters are provided three secure methods: 24



hour tip line at 863-TIPS (8477), encrypted web tips at www. EmeraldCoastCrimeStoppers. com and mobile tips submitted the P3 Tips App which is a free download at both the App Store for iPhones or in Google Play for Androids. At no time are tipsters asked to provide a name, number, address or any other identifying information. Once the tipster provides information, they are assigned a code number and password, which is the only method Crime Stoppers has of identifying you. Tipsters are responsible for remembering their code number in order to check the status of a tip. In the meantime, Crime Stoppers passes the anonymous information onto the appropriate law enforcement agency, which takes action based on the information and reports back to Crime Stoppers whether or not the tip led to an arrest or recovery of stolen property, or illegal narcotics. If so, the tipster is eligible for a cash reward and is instructed to pick up their reward at a designated bank on a certain date, all 100% anony-mously!

Crime Stoppers has been a proven, effective crime deterrent, since the idea was conceived more than 40 years ago in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Locally, Emerald Coast Crime Stoppers was founded in 1997 and since that time it has received more than 38,000 tips, almost \$350,000 in rewards have been approved, nearly 2,600 arrests have been made, and nearly \$3,000,000 in stolen property and narcotics have been recovered. Surprisingly, only about 35% of tipsters actually claim their reward money.

Crime Stoppers works and the program's success is not measured by how many rewards are paid out, rather by how many cases are closed, arrests made and crimes prevented because of tips that come in, which in turn makes our community a safer place.

## The Dream Becomes Reality Westonwood Ranch Opens in Walton County

Lindy Wood dreamed of a day when she could offer more for her son, Weston, and other teens and young adults affected by Autism. "I see my little Weston now and already worry about the fact that, as he gets older, his opportunities to develop and cultivate independent skills rapidly decline. A parent should not have to worry about outliving their child. So, I found myself questioning what can we do as a society to better equip youth with special needs," said Lindy, Weston's mom and founder of Westonwood Ranch. And so, the heartbeat of Westonwood Ranch was born.

Westonwood Ranch, a local nonprofit dedicated to providing life and vocational skills for adolescents and young adults with varying developmental disorders, recently opened its new farm-based campus in Freeport. "One in six children are diagnosed with some form of developmental disability and the harsh reality is that these children do not outgrow these disorders," said Lindy. Westonwood Ranch's newly hired executive director, Kelly Thompson, is ready to address this challenge. "We hope that we can be a vital resource to the teens and young adults affected by autism in Walton County and the surrounding communities," said Kelly. Specifically, Westonwood Ranch offers a holistic learning program on its campus that focuses on providing functional learning opportunities to prepare young individuals and adults with developmental differences to transition into independent living and work exploration.

Lindy and her family moved to Walton County after years of living in rural Alabama. Her son, Weston, age 9, was diagnosed with autism when he was age 2, and therapy options there were limited. The Wood Familv made the decision to move to the panhandle in order to gain more therapy options for Weston. They moved to Freeport, and bought a 40-acre tract of land, trying to recreate the farm they had in Alabama. Lindy learned that there is a shortage of programs geared towards older youth and young adults not only locally, but nationwide. She knew her new land could be used for more than just a family farm.

Westonwood Ranch now welcomes full-time students ages 12 through adult in the comprehensive program and is a State






of Florida certified McKay and Gardiner Scholarship provider. Students learn independent living skills with an emphasis on work exploration. Students have the opportunity to learn through hands-on ranch operations including aquaponic farming, animal feeding and care, as well as kitchen operations, creative art exploration and fitness classes. Included in the holistic curriculum, the students receive equine assisted therapy. In addition to the full-time educational program, Westonwood Ranch offers multiple after school programming for younger children with special needs including art therapy, equine assisted therapy, as well as a summer day camp utilizing farm based learning and equine activities.

Lindy wanted the farm to be self-sustaining with a revenue stream to help support the non-profit. It is a working farm with several micro business enterprises that not only serves as hands-on job skill training and employment opportunities, but contribute back into the program. At the center of the micro businesses is a commercial aquaponics greenhouse that raises channel catfish and produce in a closed loop ecosystem.

Lindy hopes Westonwood Ranch will fill in the gaps where traditional vocational rehabilitation programs fall short. Those with autism and other related developmental disorders have unique social, communication and behavioral challenges that people with other disabilities have. "There's not enough focus on looking at the individual and figuring out what their unique talents and skills are and retrofitting that into a job that's comparable to their skill set," stated Lindy. "The support that we've received has been tremendous, including support from area businesses and nonprofit organizations," Lindy said. "I've been in awe of the numerous individuals who have been touched by autism in some way, who felt led to give their time, talents and financial gifts to make this vision a reality," said Lindy. "I am so grateful to be a part of such a generous community."

being green," and it can be overwhelming.

To me, being green is respecting our environment by keeping it clean, using our resources the right way without wasting them and taking actions to reduce our carbon footprint. Taking simple steps, like turning off the lights in rooms and turning off the faucet when brushing your teeth can and does make a difference. To move the needle further towards being green we have been taking some aggressive actions listed above to make further changes. In the late 70s we were alerted that our ozone layer has a hole in it and is grow-



ing. The ozone layer ranges from 6-13 miles in the atmosphere and protects our planet from the sun's harsh UV rays. This layer protects ecosystems, plants, animals and even us. But, there is good news. In October 2019, NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) reported that our ozone layer hole is the smallest recorded. What?! Yes, the ozone is actually shrinking because of the changes we made along with ideal weather conditions. Scientists expect the ozone hole to shrink to the size it was in 1980, by the year 2070.

Being energy efficient means going green. Everything has a carbon footprint or can be linked to CO2 emissions. Some ways we can be green is to buy local and use fewer resources to get products or services. At ECES, we focus on homes which on average produce 7.5 tons of CO2 emissions. By taking actions to increase energy efficiency, you increase your comfort and reduce your CO2 footprint. Some actions include properly air sealing your home. These unintended gaps and cracks cause poor air quality and lose energy, which costs you money. Having the right insulation is important. If your home was built in 2004 or before, your attic may be under insulated. New construction codes have now increased the required attic insulation R value by 61% to R-30. Radiant barriers are becoming a vital component to energy efficiency. By adding a radiant barrier and additional insulation in the attic, it would reflect 97% of radiant heat and could reduce your attic's temperature by 30 to 40 degrees in the summer. This would make your ductwork and insulation more efficient, saving you money and increasing your comfort. Another way to become more energy efficient is through windows. But replacing windows can be expensive. There are virtually clear window films which reflect 94% of radiant heat and almost all of the harsh UV rays, increasing comfort and the life of furniture and flooring. These

films won't change the architecture and are great for sunrooms, store-fronts or restaurants. Another area is a crawl space under our homes. These areas go unmonitored and traditionally use a batt insulation and netting which unfortunately fails over time, causing energy loss.

There are many ways we can become more energy efficient, be green, increase comfort and save money. It takes awareness and a professional with knowledge to identify these areas and educate us on ways to become more energy efficient and be green like Kermit.

to customers' needs; these all make the most positive customer experience.



Officially opened in 1991 after new Hwy. 98 was constructed, the park now has many natural resources such as sea turtle and shorebird nesting and welcomed 476,000 visitors from May-September this year. It's also one of the top 10 volunteer outlets in Florida!

At lunch at Fudpucker's, we heard about some of our area's best attractions from Trey Tisdale, Gator Beach at Fudpuckers trainer, Patrick Berry from the Gulfarium and Jearl McCall from Emerald Bay Golf Course. If you haven't visited the Gulfarium lately, you'll find there's so much there...seals, penguins, otters, reptiles sharks, stingrays, dolphins, turtles and more. Captain Steve and Wendy Wilson, owners of the Buccaneer Pirate Cruise, birthed the first dolphin eco-tour in the Destin area responsible for sparking an entirely new tour boat industry here. Integral in their success has been giving back to the community and offering a high-value form of family fun at a low cost. And, of course, we were treated to the World's Greatest Alligator Park Tour at Fudpucker's! Did you know there's a true, albino alligator there? I mean, even his eyeballs are white!



## **The VA Loan:** If Eligible, it's Your Best Friend When Buying or Refinancing Your Home

I've thought a lot about our military since moving to the Emerald Coast and I've worked with military buyers and sellers. Before we continue, thank you – I appreciate and am humbled by your service to our great country.

A VA Loan is a mortgage option available to eligible members of the regular **military**, **reservists**, **Veterans**, **National Guard and spouses of military members** who died while on active duty or as a result of a service-connected disability. If you are one of these folks and have not purchased a home, then continue reading this article. And if you already own a home, you should read this too.

• No Mortgage Insurance. Private mortgage insurance can be hundreds of dollars per month, so it's another cost savings.



As colder temps roll in, we are starting to notice different species of fish migrate into our Gulf waters – specifically Find Flounder burrowing along the bottom, waiting for their prey. One of the best things about targeting Flounder is that they will come back for

dant, so the season is open yearround for these species. The limit per angler is 10 flounder per day, and 15 sheepshead per day. Many anglers will tell you they love catching these fish and bringing them home for dinner. Both species are considered prime seafood, with a delicious white meat that's never oily or "fishy" in taste. Before it gets too cold, we recommend getting out and hitting the waters to stock up while they're easy to find!



Flounder and Sheepshead. The cooler weather means the fish will school up in one area, making them easier to catch once you track them down.


"Flounder and Sheepshead are two popular winter/spring fish that anglers will be targeting in this area," says Captain Lionel James of Lion's Tale Adventures Fishing Charter. "Flounder will start to school up in October as they prepare to migrate during winter with the cooler water," he says, "typically heading out into the nearshore gulf areas." The move allows them to settle on natural and artificial reefs to spawn at this time.







## FWBMC Honored for Hepatitis B Vaccine Birth Dose Rate

Fort Walton Beach Medical Center (FWBMC) has been recognized by the Immunization Action Coalition (IAC) and the Florida Health Department for achieving one of the highest reported rates in the state for its work to protect newborns from hepatitis B virus infection.

"I am incredibly proud of our Labor and Delivery team, who provides outstanding care to moms and their babies," said Caroline Stewart, Chief Nursing Officer at Fort Walton Beach Medical Center. "That includes immunizations, to protect newborns from hepatitis B."

Fort Walton Beach Medical Center is the newest entry into IAC's Birth Dose Honor Roll (www.immunize.org/ honor-roll/birthdose), which recognizes hospitals and birthing centers that have attained high coverage levels for admin-



istering the hepatitis B vaccine at birth. FWBMC immunized 97% of babies from 1/1/2018 to 12/31/2018 and took additional steps to prevent perinatal transmission of hepatitis B.

The national standard of care to prevent hepatitis B vi-

rus infection in babies is to administer hepatitis B vaccine to all newborns before they leave the hospital or birthing center. This standard is being adopted by centers of healthcare excellence nationwide as a safety net to protect newborns from a wide range of medical errors that lead to babies being unprotected from perinatal hepatitis B infection. ters have a responsibility to protect babies from life-threatening hepatitis B infection," said Deborah Wexler, MD, executive director and founder of IAC. "Fort Walton Beach Medical Center's commitment to the best practice of hepatitis B vaccination at birth has shown them to be a leader in preventing the transmission of the hepatitis B virus."

Journey Bravely, our counseling practice, moved cross-country to Florida and we are pinching ourselves daily when we see the ocean! We started dreaming 2 years ago about moving to a sunnier, ocean-side community. We realized in our coaching and counseling work we were encouraging people to "journey bravely" and needed to take some brave steps on our own. We were excited, scared, hopeful, doubtful, but motivated for change. We determined a 2-3 year timeline and just over 2 years later, we have landed in Santa Rosa Beach.

How are you supposed to get from dreaming to realizing your dream? First, explore how comfortable you are with dreaming in general. Consider these questions to get your dreamer working. What do you want to be true in your life? When you come to the end of life, what will you regret not doing? What relationships and experiences bring you the most joy? What contribution can you bring to the world that brings you excitement? When you think of a daily reality that feels meaningful, what does that look like? In addition, try dream related reading and podcasts to improve your dream flow.

Second, create a vision board using pictures and words to represent future priorities and dreams for your vocation, family, finances, travel, character development, generosity, etc. Place your board visibly and spend time daily focusing on dreams and action steps to make it happen. Vision boards are flexible over time as you experience personal growth.

Third, it's time to break down your dream into manageable parts. Once you choose a focus, set goals and action steps. If the goal is moving in two years, what are the practical steps you must take? For us that included vocational change, selling our house, talking with our kids, and finding Florida housing. Sometimes dreaming is easy and action steps feel overwhelming or boring. However, people who write down goals regularly are 42% more likely to achieve them. This is where you gather your grit, do one thing at a time and gradually progress toward your dream.

Fourth, it's time to make friends with healthy risk. Most people who realize dreams learn to navigate some calculated risk. Being risky scares people, the big step for us was listing our much-loved house. We waffled for several months, sought wise counsel, faced our fears, and eventually listed the house without having solid jobs. Twelve days after we listed, the house sold which resulted in our dream being realized 3 months later. It was very uncomfortable moving without jobs in our future, but had we not done so, we would not have been here when my husband's current job was posted specifically for someone living in the area.

Fifth, when you realize a dream, savor the personal growth and celebrate the outcome. Dreaming, opening your life to change, and taking action steps is work that results in transformational change in your

faith, your relationships, and how you see and understand yourself. Slow down, take note of your change, and carry your new perspective forward in life. Celebrating acknowledges your faith, your work, and all of those who were part of your journey.

We are regular people who were afraid our dream would never happen. We decided it would be our responsibility if we found ourselves 10 years down the road having never taken decisive action to reach our dream. Our process has left us certain that the work and risk were worth the reward and foresee this realized dream being the first of many to come.

The brave journey to realizing a dream is beautiful, difficult, risky, transforming, and life-changing. Once you have experienced it, you know you can do it again. What are your dreams? What is holding you back from pursuing them?

## **Eat Your Veggies!**

Last month, it was about encouraging healthy eating for children. One of the most common complaints is an aversion to vegetables. Given that this food group is indisputably important, the first recommendation is to introduce vegetables early and often. Even if the baby seems to react negatively, consistency is key. If kids are a little older, the advice still stands: Modeling and consistency. And, of course, one can get a little creative with cooking methods and recipes.

The first and easiest cooking technique is to simply wash, chop and eat. Fresh raw vegetables are LIVE foods that are enzyme active and alkalizing to the systems. As a rule, a minimum of 50% of your daily food intake should be healthy, fresh, LIVE foods. Including fresh raw vegetables will not only help reach that goal, it will also help with acid/alkaline balance and fiber needs - all the while providing an amazing array of nutrients. To encourage children, set out cut veggies at a time you know they are truly hungry. Everything tastes better when hungry! Allowing them to dip veggies in salad dressing or even peanut butter might also encourage them to indulge.

Although most vegetables can be eaten raw, there are some that require cooking to neutralize certain elements. For example, eggplant and potatoes contain a compound called solanine, which inhibits the absorption of calcium and can cause neurological and gastrointestinal disorders. Some green beans, lima beans, and kidney beans require cooking to neutralize compounds that cannot only block the absorption of important nutrients, they can be toxic enough to make you ill. Most greens and cruciferous vegetables can be eaten raw however; some cruciferous vegetables contain goitrogenic substances that can block the production of the thyroid hormone. If one has a disorder of the thyroid, it may be beneficial to cook these vegetables more often than not.

A common misconception is that cooking will destroy vital minerals and vitamins but this is not the case when done properly. In fact, for some vegetables heating can increase digestibility by breaking down the cellulose wall, providing easier access to the nutrients while destroying or neutralizing the anti-nutrients. Heat based cooking techniques including roasting, stir-frying, or grilling should be done quickly when using high temperatures to preserve nutrient content and prevent the formation of acrylamide, which is potentially carcinogenic. Most vegetables are best served al dente, rather than cooked soft, highlighting the flavor and enhancing the nutrient content.

NOTE: Microwave cooking creates irradiated foods that have molecules found NOWHERE in nature. I do NOT recommend cooking vegetables in the microwave, especially NOT in any type of plastic bag or container.

One favorite way to prepare vegetables is super easy and sure to please even the most finicky palate. ROASTED (BAKED): Simply cut vegetables so that they are a similar size, toss in oil, put on a cookie sheet or place in a shallow roasting pan and season. Slow roasting at 325 degrees will dehydrate vegetables while sweetening their flavor. This method is good for root vegetables like potatoes and beets. Medium temperature baking at 350 degrees will cook the vegetables evenly and round out their flavors, while high temperature baking at 400 degrees or higher will caramelize the vegetables but leave them juicy and al dente. Simple seasoning with sea salt and ground pepper works well for almost every vegetable, highlighting their natural and unique flavors.

The cruciferous vegetables like broccoli, asparagus, brussels sprouts and cauliflower are particularly good roasted. If one has never been a fan of these vegetables before, try them this way seasoned with nothing more than salt and pepper. Root vegetables like potatoes, onions, carrots, beets and garlic are also terrific roasted. Simply toss in oil and season with salt and pepper. Fifteen minutes before they are ready add some fresh chopped rosemary to really give good flavor.

## **Opioid Addiction is a Pain, but There's Hope!**

Blood pressure, pulse, temperature and respiration are measurable and all serve a vital role in the health and treatment of patients- thus we describe them as "Vital Signs." In 2001, The Joint Commission, a private business that provides accreditation to hospitals, decided pain was being under-treated and a "fifth" vital sign, pain level, must be recorded at each visit. der there were huge increases in opioid prescriptions. The measure of a doctors effectiveness was based on a subjective pain scale!

Your chances of becoming addicted to opioids doubles every three days of use! It was essentially the standard of care to dispense 30 days of pain medications. So, it's no wonder so many became dependent on these medications. What's the cure? Rehab? Methadone clinics? Will power? Rehab programs nationally have about a 5% success rate. Methadone is an opioid just like heroine. It just lasts all day with a lower euphoric effect. And, going "cold turkey" rarely works and often leads to relapse. However, There is hope!

Suboxone, or buprenorphine, works on the opioid receptor but in a completely different way. Suboxone only partially interacts with the receptor. Suboxone provides relief



As you well know, pain is subjective and cannot be measured. Everyone has seen the smiley face, frowny face, 1 to 10 pain scale at the doctor's office. In fact, you have probably been asked about your pain level when you had no complaint of pain. Doctors started getting evaluated based on their ability to relieve "pain" and were even sued for not "effectively" treating pain. Not treating pain became malpractice. Most health care professionals can tell you about at least one patient who complained about "excruciating and unbearable pain" while that patient sat comfortably playing on their cell phone. It's no won-

from cravings and withdrawal with minimal to no euphoric effect. It is safe to use in nearly every situation. I began using this medication in opioid dependent patients years ago and I was quickly surprised by the profound positive effect it had in patients. I have seen changes in patients I never thought possible. Suboxone does not cure opioid dependency but treats it in such an effective way most people would never know these patients ever had a problem. Some argue Suboxone just covers a problem and doesn't fix it. Well, to those critics, I say diet and exercise cures diabetes and high blood pressure but over

50% of the United States covers it up with a medication instead. Wouldn't you expect addiction to be even harder to cure?

Patients on Suboxone almost immediately become productive again. They can work on getting their life together without leaving their jobs for 6 weeks of rehab and without going to a methadone clinic every single day. They see their doctor about once a month for a check up and refill of medication, just like anyone else on a prescription medication. We are currently accepting new patients for treatment. ## Life in Motion – Be Active – Be Thankful

This is the season for Thanksgiving-that is giving thanks and being thankful. Last year I wrote that I was thankful for movement, aka. being able to move. This year I'm thankful for that again. Use it or lose it, as it's said, but oh so true. If you find yourself a little more achy or feeling weak, you can do something about it. You have much more control over how you feel than you realize. Technology, longer work hours, and larger life demands make taking care of yourself challenging. But just like an athlete methodically and specifically trains for their event, starting small and building to their personal best for competing, so must everyone. If life or work demands more, then the worst thing you can do is stop moving or exercising, because you will become weaker and weaker and life will become even more cumbersome. An individual that follows a good exercise routine will have much more stamina than someone who doesn't. That's the very definition of why we exercise. We put our bodies through challenging actions (stress) to train it to handle any actions (stress) that life dishes out. If I ask you how you would like to feel, I'm pretty sure you would say: To feel energized, strong and with stamina regardless of your age. So, any movement is good. Start small, set realistic goals, don't get too down on yourself if you fail to meet your expectations, and JUST MOVE! Regardless of any limitations you have, use modifications and rise above. If one body part is injured or limited, then work the others. Movement = Calorie Burning, period! No matter where you start, you can always progress with time, consistency and determination.

Here are some strength ideas to keep you moving using bodyweight so you can work out anywhere with or without access to a gym, etc. Lunges, Push-ups, lying Bridge Dips, Squats, Side Squats, Side Moving Squats, Dips from a chair or table or stairs, various planks, hyper-extensions (lying face down on the floor), Pilates moves or Yoga. When using body-weight for your workout, you should aim for fairly high reps, i.e. doing as many as you can before you begin losing your form. Start with your major muscle groups which are your Legs/ Back/Chest because movements that are meant to target your major muscle groups are compound movements, meaning you have to use a combination of muscles to perform the exercise.

For example: When you want to work your chest, you have to use your arms and shoulders to do so. It's the same with training your back. So, you might succumb to injury if you work your arms first, fatiguing them out, then ask those same arms to assist in working the chest or back. Legs are a little more resil-



ient, but still probably not smart to fatigue out the hamstrings then ask them to assist in squatting or lunging which is meant to target quadriceps and glutes (thighs & butt). Or Just get out for a walk or bike ride. The beach is an amazing place to exercise, because the extra challenge of the soft sand. Walking in the soft sand alone for a good 20+ minutes will tone your legs and burn calories all over better than just about anything else. Then add push-ups, planks and dips and you have a super good and simple workout.

Holiday Health Challenge: This holiday season I invite you to join me in "Weigh Down to Christmas." For the next 60 days/9 weeks, let's see if we can keep our weight the same. The objective is to not gain weight during the holidays. Don't worry about losing—just don't gain! Indulge a little ,but also stay active to counterbalance the extra calories. **Tip:** Taking a walk after a big meal not only burns calories, but the energy needed for the walk will use up any sugar you ate before it gets stored. This is a great way to help control blood sugar levels. This is not to be confused with vigorous training directly after a meal; that would counterproductive and could be too hard on your system. But a nice walk will help blood sugar and your weight as opposed to sitting on the couch while full.

Ingredients 60g canned pumpkin puree, 225g nonfat Greek yogurt, 30g vanilla whey protein, 27g fat free cool whip, 12g fat free sugar free cheesecake pudding mix. Mix all ingredients together and refrigerate for at least an hour. Add cinnamon, maybe whipped cream, or spice on top and ENJOY!

## The Quest for Good Advice

Thumbing through a magazine, one came across the article, "What's the best advice you've ever received?" Some of the publication's regular readers weighed in:

• We don't have to agree on anything to be kind to one another.

• Don't act like the destination is more important than the journey. If you can't enjoy the way there, you aren't properly preparing yourself for the goal.

• A boss told me: "When you come discuss problems with me, you also should bring me solutions, options, or recommendations to choose from."

• You can't get it if you don't ask.

• Don't have a huge expensive wedding. Save up that money and put it toward a home purchase.

Conversely, in that same

piece, was a reminder that not all advice is good:

• My grandpa once told me not to use my blinker when driving because "it's no one's business where you're going."

• No flashlight on your phone? Take a photo of the sun, and use it in the dark.

• Mom said to always say what's on your mind. That advice is why I was called into HR today.

• My friend's dad told her, "If you're doing something that you'll regret in the morning, just sleep until the afternoon."

How do you discern the caliber of the advice you receive? Do you measure it up against the character or reputation of those offering the recommendation? Is it a quantitative process whereby statistically "nine out of the ten or so times I've done this, it's turned out ok?" Are you watching what family, friends, or trusted neighbors think, say or do? How influential are the opinions of communications media or prominent public figures? What concerns do you have of "what people may think" based on your acceptance or rejection of the advice?

Where to start?

A good place to begin is with your personal values. Many of us derive them from our faith beliefs. We also remember watching our parents, or whoever was entrusted with our primary upbringing, and likely tried to borrow from what seemed to best work. At school we had a favorite teacher who probably taught us lessons that transcended what might be gleaned from a textbook. In our earliest work environments as we made our mistakes, there was often a boss or co-worker who effectively set us straight.

**Trust your instincts.** We always seemed to know the "tough" kids in the neighborhood. Later as teens, when driving around with the windows down on a mild evening, you learned the places to avoid. In transactional business you get a feeling in your gut when you come across the proverbial "snake oil" salesman.

Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor created The Four-Way Test. It is an ethical guide for Rotarians to use for their personal and professional relationships and is often cited at the commencement of club meetings. The test asks the following questions:

Of the things we think, say or do:

• Is it the truth?

Is if fair to all concerned? Will it build goodwill and

better friendships?Will it be beneficial to all

concerned?

Many years before Mr. Taylor, the Apostle Paul, in speaking to the church in Galatia, presented that the fruit of the Spirit of God is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

I look to these characteristics when considering the legitimacy of the advice giver or weighing their advice. To date, I have found no better yardstick than these tenets from the 5th Chapter of Galatians.

# Habits of Miserable People

Steven Covey wrote one of the most influential books in modern times that has influenced many, including myself. The book, The Habits of Highly Effective People, outlines seven habits that change people's lives.

People who practice these habits energize, encourage, and empower others. However, there are those people who seem to

want to be miserable, and they succeed by inviting misery into their lives. Misery actually repels lovers and friends; it deters us from getting better jobs and making more money. After studying this behavior for a long time, I've concluded that misery takes some doing and creativity. To make one's self miserable requires imagination, vision, and ingenuity. When others breed a spirit of gratitude and thanksgiving, these ingenious souls find another way to approach every day.

Research shows that people who express gratitude are happier than those who don't, so never express gratitude. "Counting your blessings is for idiots. What blessings? Life is suffering, and then you die. What's there to be thankful for?"

John Henry Jowett said, "Gratitude is a vaccine, an antitoxin, and an antiseptic." Gratitude is a vaccine that attacks misery and inoculates us against the disease of bitterness and resentment. Gratitude is an antitoxin that counteracts the poisonous thoughts of the Evil One who says trials are proof that God has abandoned us. And gratitude is an antiseptic that sterilizes our thoughts that would breed the germ of discontent.

The Bible says in Philippians 4:8, "Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable--if anything is excellent or praiseworthy--think about such things."

Here are proven techniques for achieving misery I gleaned from Cloe Madanes, a world-renowned innovator:

Sit in a chair and close your eyes and for 15 minutes meditate on all the things you could lose: your job, your house, your savings, and so forth. Then brood about living in a homeless shelter.

Force yourself to watch hours of mindless TV programs every day and read only non-stimulating material that will leave you feeling soulless. Avoid literature, art, and public worship. Write down ten situations that make you anxious, depressed, or distracted. Once a week, pick a single anxiety-provoking situation, and use it to work yourself into a panic.

Write down five annoying text messages you could send to a friend or member of your family. Keep a grudge list going and add to it daily.

List the names of five relatives or friends. For each, write down something they did or said in the recent past that proves they want you to be miserable also. Think of all the things you've done for others in the past that haven't been reciprocated. Think about how everyone around you is trying to take from you.

Make a list of all the things you could be grateful for. Next to each item, write down why you aren't. Imagine the worst. When you think of the future, imagine the worst possible scenario. It's important to be prepared for and preemptively miserable about any possible disaster or tragedy. Think of the possibilities: terrorist attacks, natural disasters, fatal disease, horrible accidents, massive crop failures, your child not getting picked for the varsity softball team.

Make a list of twenty things you dislike and see how many times you can insert them into a conversation over the course of the day.

Even if you succeed with just a few of the above actions, make sure to scold yourself regularly for not enacting the entire list. If you find yourself in a therapist's office-because someone who's still trying to save you from misery has tricked you into going — make sure your misery seems genuine. You may solicit some sympathy and feel even more comfortable in your misery. Then again, just maybe you will find the joy all around you and celebrate the gifts you have been given.



# A Pastor's Ponderings: Super-Sized Healing

My older brother Bob was always a big guy, and children often called him mean names like Fatty and Fatso. Later, due to his service in the Vietnam War, Bob had terrible nightmares. He tried to silence those dreams with toxic portions of alcohol and pot.

Eventually, Bob grew to weigh over 500 pounds. Desperately trying to change his life, Bob decided to have surgery to remove a large portion of his stomach. He died of complications at only 50 years of age.

In the big picture, my brother was an unhappy person. His size prevented him from engaging in normal life activities, including church attendance. Bob had a hard time loving himself for who he was, and this led to a cycle of depression with more eating and drinking. I mourn the loss of my brother and the unhappiness he felt most of his life. Bob needed the super-sized healing that only Jesus can give.

In Jen Larsen's new book, Stranger Here: How Weight-Loss Surgery Transformed My Body and Messed with My Head, she explains how losing 180 pounds wasn't all she thought it would be. Her fiercely honest writing moved me. While it is not a spiritual read, it is compelling for anyone who is struggling with weight issues or knows someone who is drowning in the murky waters of an eating disorder.

Many people suffer today from weight problems, a bad self-image, and self-loathing. People are suffering, and not just overweight people. I remember a movie star in the eighties named Farrah Fawcett, who many considered to be the most beautiful woman in the world. She said in an interview with Barbara Walters that when she looked into the mirror she only saw an ugly girl — then she cried. Multitudes suffer like Farrah Fawcett from the self-criticism that plague their thoughts.

Larsen says in her book, I thought that my body was wrong when I was obese; I thought my body was wrong when I was thin past the point of health. I thought there was something wrong with my body whatever I looked like because there's always just one more thing to fix before I look perfect...I felt helpless before. I tried to dodge out of the feeling by getting weight loss surgery, and now I'm angry, that I wasn't fixed, yes. But, also, that so many people deal with this, this exact and pervasive struggle at whatever size they are, whatever shape, whatever they do. There is no perfect weight or size.

I believe Jesus wants to touch people like my brother Bob, Farrah Fawcett, Jen Larsen and you at the core of your being. The Lord can give super-sized healing and self-acceptance like no other.

Luke 4:40 above describes how Jesus healed people, and Doctor Luke uses the specific Greek word therapeuo to define Christ's healing gift. This word means, to wait upon menially. It gives the sense of a nurse applying a therapy that brings soothing comfort from the pain of illness. Jesus administers therapeutic healing, massage-like therapy to the body and soul.

Contemporary Christian music artists Mercy Me sing in their song Beautiful, You're beautiful, you are made for so much more than all of this. You're beautiful! You are treasured, you are sacred, you are His. You're Beautiful! May the Lord use us to love people who are suffering from the deceptions of our culture and a skewed self-image. We have the



# **Exploring Uses for your Required Minimum Distribution** Part II: The Qualified Charitable Distribution

As we approach the end of the year many of you will be needing to take your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your retirement accounts. That must be done by Thursday, December 31st, 2019. You work with your plan provider or financial institution where your retirement plan or IRA is held and complete a distribution because it is required by the IRS. You can do so by completing a form or provide instructions to your financial institution.

The RMD typically 1) begins at age 70  $\frac{1}{2}$  (or April 1st in the year following the year you turn 70  $\frac{1}{2}$ ) and 2) takes into account the plan balance from December 31st of the previous year and 3) utilizes the IRS

tables for mortality – how long you are expected to live. The number or factor for mortality usually is the divisor into the balance which then determines the amount that must come out. That amount - with some exceptions is taxable income.

This article further explores utilizing some of your assets in your retirement plan to address your charitable contributions and potential income tax savings. If you are charitably inclined your RMD might possibly be used to make a charitable contribution, and then satisfy your RMD.

Here is how it works: You have the option of moving up to \$100,000 per calendar year from your retirement account to a charity of your choice. That charity must be qualified as a 501 (c) 3 charity and the contribution must be sent directly to it. By utilizing this, the distribution is not taxable to you, and it also lowers the retirement account balance hence making future payments smaller and the tax owed potentially less on future distributions. The distribution in this form as a QCD is excluded from your taxable income and might also reduce taxation of social security benefits and lower Medicare Part B and D premiums.

PROCESS is also how insurance works – it's how insurance was developed, implemented and finally executed. 
### FROM JEREMY NEEL **QUESTION:**

mend is to call your insurance agent (not your carrier) and inform them of the situation. Make it clear to them that you don't want to file a claim if you don't have to, but you need their recommendation of a trusted restoration company who can evaluate the damage vs. deductible. In other words, you want to figure the "claim worthiness"

of the damage. You don't want unfounded claims, or claims that may not be covered.

The next step would be to stabilize the environment to ensure the situation is not getting worse. The restoration company can do this with special equipment they will have. Note: Fans and dehumidifiers are not always the correct move here! Make sure you are dealing with a professional restoration company.

Should a claim need to be filed, then it is time to have your agent direct your next steps.

"This is a good testing ground for our technology," said Finch. "With three airports, a nice mix of locals and tourists, plus the opportunity to provide non-emer-


