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New Year, New Norriego Point

For years and years, one of Destin's most vital assets, Norriego Point, functionally and aesthetically, was losing its battle against nature. Multiple thousands of dollars have been spent trying to clear the Harbor so that recreational boats, as well as the charter fishing fleet, could get in and out of the harbor safely. Despite all efforts, sand kept filling in the channel at Norriego Point, "especially after Hurricane Opal when the Point was actually breached," said Sam Seevers, former Destin mayor. "Since then, the Point had never really been able to settle which made safety an issue," she said.

What Norriego Point needed was a permanent solution for stabilization. As Destin's mayor in 2013, Seevers received notice that full funding was being recommended by the Natural Resource Damage Assessment (NRDA) Trustees. At that point, she, along with city staff, had already been working tirelessly for years to submit applications and file for permits, competing with others to obtain some of the oil spill settlement money marked for restoration projects since the BP oil spill had shrunk a promising tourist season

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smile on their face."

The Harvest House in Destin has expanded from its Mountain Drive location to an additional second location at 114 Palmetto Drive Suite 1. Harvest House TOO is a 1,000 square foot space that houses "The Finer Selection" of items. "It's all the really pretty things that come in—designer handbags, and pretty pictures that don't need to be damaged. You walk in there and it feels totally different than a thrift store," said Lori. 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and crippled the charter fishing fleet in 2010. Seevers even petitioned Okaloosa County to grant the city ownership of Norriego Point, which the county eventually did. After years of relentless work and from many who were instrumental in seeing the project through, BP also began to take notice. Seevers says she welcomed BP and worked WITH them to establish a strong relationship. And with a management plan already in place, the rest of the efforts built upon securing the funds to make the project a reality.

Fast forward to 2019 and many years later, and residents and visitors are finally realizing the almost completion of a \$12 million dollar funded, permanently revitalized Norriego Point. Its impact is important in

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the city's history as the Point is one of Destin's most unique as-

sets. "When entering Destin from the west, travelers can clearly see Norriego Point separating the Destin Harbor from the East Pass channel that leads out to the Gulf of Mexico," says Lance Johnson, Destin's city manager. "For years it has served as a gathering point for both residents and visitors arriving both by land and by boat." Aside from being a beautiful recreation area enjoyed by thousands annually, the Point protects

the Destin Harbor, HarborWalk Village boardwalk and the city's multi-million-dollar charter fishing and recreational boating industry, vital to our local, as well as regional economy.

The two-phase project included shoreline stabilization, beach and dune restoration, reestablished recreational improvements and the addition of five acres to the Point. Several erosion control structures were constructed to dissipate wave energy, and protect the fill placed landward of the revetment to restore and expand the land area lost over time.

Phase one is complete. Phase 2 is in process and is planned to include a recreational area with a public park, picnic pavilion, boardwalk and restroom facilities, a multiuse trail, bike racks, and vehicle parking along the access road adjacent to the park land.

At this time, the recreational components are in the design phase. "We hope to have 60% of the design plans for the recreation components available for review by the Parks and Recreation Committee by the end of February with a subsequent review of those plans by the City Council in March," says Johnson. "If the design phase remains on track, con-

struction could begin sometime after Labor Day this year."

Johnson says he looks forward to the final stage of the Norriego Point project being completed. "The recreation components that will be added will make this an even better experience for our residents and visitors and will make the facility much more accessible to those with special needs." In the meantime, its new facelift and functionality can be enjoyed now while helping to guarantee better safety and quality of life at the Harbor. And both Seevers and Johnson are very proud of it. "Norriego Point is a long-standing landmark in Destin for residents and visitors alike. The recently completed armoring projects will help ensure that both Norriego Point and the Destin Harbor are around for future generations to enjoy," says Johnson.

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Meet our Hometown Hero: Amy Walsh



The American Cancer Society estimates that 268,600 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in 2019. That's

268,600 women and 268,600 families whose lives will be changed forever. It's a story Amy Walsh knows all too well.

Walsh, the founder of Fore Her, a nonprofit dedicated to providing support to breast cancer patients along the Emerald Coast, watched both her mother and aunt struggle through their battles with the disease.

"In watching their fight, I learned that everyone needs support," said Walsh. "Whether the support is emotional or financial, the need is there, and with support, the journey is not as heavy." After their deaths, Walsh's golfloving family wanted to join together to honor the family they

had lost, sparking the creation of the Jeanette Hansen/ Barb Schultz Golf Outing in Saginaw, Michigan. The family used their day of golfing to raise funds for breast cancer patients in Michigan.

When Walsh moved to the Emerald Coast, she wanted to continue her family's tradition. "I moved here and realized that there are no resources in the Panhandle that are

specific to helping breast cancer patients financially," said Walsh. "I decided to start Fore Her to help make a difference in the lives of these patients and their families, letting them know they are not alone in the battle against breast cancer."

What initially began as a single charity golf tournament has grown into a multi-event, quickly

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growing a nonprofit organization that assists breast cancer patients in the area pay for utilities, mortgages or rent, auto repairs to get to and from appointments and more

"My hope for the future of the organization is to become a better resource for breast cancer patients and their families," said Walsh. "Not only do we want to help these ladies financially, we want to be able to be a place they can come with questions about each step of their battle. We would like to bring survivors together with newly-diagnosed patients to help with support and guidance."

Walsh and the Fore Her board most recently started a peer support group to facilitate this, and they're currently in the process of planning their first event of 2019, Tea Fore Her, to generate the funds they intend to give to the area's breast cancer patients.

"It's about helping others," said Walsh. "It's what my family has always done since I can remember and what we will continue to do, to help make a difference in the lives of others.

What's Your Perspective On Spring Break Along the Emerald Coast?



From the law enforcement viewpoint, tolerance is permission — and looking the other way or failing to intervene is nothing more than a granting of permission to violate our laws. Our zerotolerance approach is all about public safety and maintaining law and order in our family-friendly atmosphere.

With tens of thousands of teens and young adults flooding into the area hoping for a good time, that means implementing beefed up patrols on our beaches, in our neighborhoods and on our area roadways to target law violations. It means more off-duty officers hired at local hotels and condos, and it means ongoing educational efforts to boost awareness on our zero tolerance policy for

underage alcohol consumption.

The majority of the thousands of spring breakers who will head to our beaches the first week of

March through the last week of April will enjoy our stunning coast, make fun memories, and head back to school with no big drama ruining their break from the classroom.

However each year, a percentage of high schoolers and

college students will cross the line and end up with a booking photo. Last year our deputies arrested 444 Spring Breakers for various violations, the majority involving underage possession of alcohol. In 2017 the number was 508, due in part to a longer Spring Break period. The youngest arrest in 2018 was for an age 14 visitor and 15- and 16-year-olds were also found with alcoholic beverages. However, overall the "Zero Tolerance Spring Break Initiative" was a huge success due to the fact there were no major crimes or injuries reported throughout the

entire Spring Break period.

That, of course, is our primary goal. We know a lot of these students are members of the families



of our future for tourism. We want them to be aware we will not tolerate the type of behaviors other areas have had to endure during Spring Break, but we do want them to have a good time and leave with great memories. We want them to come back again in the future. The key to avoiding a bad memory is to know that if you are under 21 years of age and caught with alcohol, you will be arrested. Our booking van will be standing by for those who violate the law. The consumption of alcohol leads to impaired judgment and sometimes impulsive, dangerous behaviors. Cracking down on consumption correlates to fewer problems ranging from traffic crashes, DUIs, sexual assaults and

balcony hopping (falls).

Each year we distribute a letter that welcomes students to the "World's Most Beautiful Beaches." We share with them

our zero tolerance policy for underage possession, public intoxication and other illegal behaviors. We give them a list of state statutes, county ordinances, and City of Destin ordinances outlining everything from the prohibition of glass on the beach to control of open house parties.

For our businesses, Spring Break can bring a welcome surge in economic activity. It can also lead to the development of visitor love and appreciation for the area that lasts for decades and brings families back repeatedly on vacation. Our mission is to manage the crowds and create the safest atmosphere possible so the cycle can be repeated in positive ways that benefit our community.

Our public safety efforts are enhanced through our partnerships with the Tourist Development Council, The City of Destin, and other first responder partners including Fire, EMS, FWC and FHP.

During our Spring Break season, we encourage residents to practice patience and stay vigilant as the roadways, businesses and beaches become more crowded. We also encourage you to report any suspicious behavior, including impaired driving. Do not hesitate to call the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office at 850-651-7400. Our Beach and Marine Units will be on hand, as will extra deputies to handle the expected rise in calls for service and to monitor conditions and crowds to try to prevent accidents and ensure that our laws are being followed. We all play a vital role in keeping our community safe and we appreciate the support and assistance of our citizens and visitors in that endeavor.

Tips from the Trainer: Service Dog Etiquette

This month we will focus on Service Dog etiquette. Spring is coming soon, according to Punx-sutawney Phil, and we on the coast know that means a flood of visitors will be arriving to fill our favorite haunts. There is also a greater possibility of experiencing a Service Dog and you should be prepared with the proper etiquette. Because I am a trainer, I will also address the proper behavior you should expect from the dog/handler team.

First and foremost, leave Service Dogs and their handlers alone. They don't need your sympathy, your concern, or your comments on how beautiful their dog is. Harsh? Maybe. Your good intentions are actually counter to the proper training of a Service Dog. In fact, it can be detrimental to the health and well-being of the handler. You see, a real Service Dog is trained to assist the handler at all times with injuries or disabilities that you might or might not see. For example, a person with Diabetes would need



the dog to continually pay attention to the blood sugar levels of its handler as much as a person with a mobility impairment needs the dog to pay attention to its handler's balance.

Now, let's dive into dog and handler behavior. A properly trained Service Dog should behave in public and be nearly invisible. Obviously, some dogs you see are not as well trained as others. This is due to many factors including who trained the dog. Some people with little or no experience will train their own Service Dog. Some kindhearted people with time, a love for dogs, and a passion to help people will also attempt training. The problem is that many lack the

skills necessary to properly train. There are rules governing behavior in public. A Service Dog that is unruly and cannot be brought under control can be asked to leave an establishment, according to the Americans with Disabilities Act. As the Executive Director for Pawsitive Love Foundation (PLF) there is no one more critical of a fake Service Dog. PLF provides professionally trained Service Dogs for Children with Autism and Epilepsy, as well as veterans with PTSD, Traumatic Brain Injury and Military Sexual Trauma. If you encounter a suspected fake, bring it to the attention of the shop or restaurant management. They are allowed to ask two very important questions of the handler. First, they may ask if it is indeed a Service Dog. They may also ask what tasks the dog does to assist the handler. Those tasks must be supported through training. If you are a person who likes to take your dog everywhere with you, and do so under the guise of being a Service Dog, consider what that means to those with

Service Dogs that are charged with protecting the life of their handler?

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Underinsured

Don't Let It Happen to You

Protecting your assets (and your bank account) from losses you wouldn't otherwise be able to financially afford is what insurance is about. Making sure you have the correct amount of coverage can be the difference between rebuilding your entire structure versus a partial rebuild.

Take Larry for instance. He's well known by all his friends and family as the guy who knows where to get the best deals. They call him 'let's deal Larry.' He researches and asks questions, compares and tests before he plunks down his money. From cars to espresso machines, Larry's your guy to give you the scoop on where to find the best deal. In addition, inadequate insurance on your dwelling can also lower the coverages available to replace your personal property, loss of use, and more.

There are several factors that directly contribute to being underinsured. The biggest one being your initial purchase of that dream home. You searched until you found the perfect house. You bought furniture, painted walls, and hung a stunning chandelier over your brand-new dining table and chairs. And that was fine, until Hurricane Michael toppled a few trees onto your roof and the rain soaked not just your furniture, but the drywall and cabinets, and that beautiful chandelier shattered on the floor.


The adjuster came and you ended up with a check that would only rebuild two-thirds of your house. Because of the scope of the catastrophic disaster, building materials and construction labor costs rose significantly, which means the rest came out of your pocket.

The second factor that contributes to being underinsured can happen when your policy has been with the same company for a number of years. Not all policies have a built in inflation guard, so it's always best to review your dwelling and contents limits at their renewal each year.

The third factor is a sneaky one. Most homeowners periodically update their homes, like install new flooring, remodel bathrooms and kitchens, add rooms and square footage, but they don't always inform their agent so that the replacement cost can be recalculated and limits increased.

The bottom line, when it comes to insuring your home, is this: don't skimp on the coverages, look carefully at your renewal policy and address any coverage deficiencies you may have, and always let your agent know about any upgrades and remodeling you've done to your home. We recommend an annual review of your property insurance program because life happens and circumstances change.

Preparing for Life's Events:

Widowhood

Many people will tell you that life brings on such uncertainty that even a great amount of planning won't suffice when uncertainty sets in. I would suggest that over-preparation for times or events could, for many, be a great driver of success or accomplishment in the face of adversity. Becoming a widow is seen by many to be one of the most traumatic experiences they will ever have to face in their lifetime.

Kathleen Rehl is a Ph.D. and CFP professional and writes about widowhood in her awardwinning book "Moving Forward on Your Own, A Financial Guidebook for Widows." Dr Reh explains the challenges and planning needed when someone faces this in life. She (who had been a widow herself) spoke recently to a group of Raymond James branch managers and community bank executives in Sarasota, Fla.

She started out by informing the audience that 70% of women become widows in their lifetime. And she pointed out the immediate concerns many have are: 1) Am I okay? 2) Will I have to work? 3) Can I stay in my house? Even when these fears are not rational, they nonetheless feel that way. Throughout the years I have experienced hearing two important concerns that many women, widowed women in particular, have: 1) Will I run out of money? and 2) Will I have enough money on which to live? Many women never remarry. Dr Rehl goes on to share that 80% of men die married (and the majority of widowers, vs. widows remarry within two years) and 80% of women will die unmarried.

According to Dr Rehl, for women, there are three stages that they can anticipate if and when they become widowed. First the Grief stage: Feeling vulnerable, numb and therefore they should focus on taking care of themselves. That is followed by the Growth (or Journey) stage: Thinking becomes clearer and they are ready to "take care of business." And lastly, the Grace (or transformation) stage: Life has calmed down and there is a "renewed sense of purpose." Women become and feel more independent at that point.

In the end, and most importantly, if recently widowed, Dr Rehl suggests that women not rush in to anything, they should ask a lot of questions when meeting with a financial professional and to take care of themselves. And finally, preparing in advance, or perhaps a periodic or annual check-in on investments and financial matters is a best practice.

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Destin High School

Have questions about the potential new Destin High School? Below are many answers as part of our ongoing updates on the progress. (Please see complete stories in Dec. 2018 and Jan. 2019 Destin Life, www.MyDestinLife.com.)

Q: Where will the school be located?

A: Destin High School will be located in Destin. The exact location has not yet been selected from our top choices. However, we are in the process of having our top three potential sites evaluated by our charter school financiers with whom we have signed a Memo of Understanding.

Q: Does Okaloosa County School District have to approve the school?

A: Yes. In Florida, charter schools are public schools and are authorized/approved by the school district. Our charter application is due on Feb. 1 and the school district has 90 days to act on the application.

Q: Can a charter school become a public school after opening as a charter?

A: Yes. Charter schools are public schools and have all of the same educational requirements as a traditional public school except they are governed by an independent governing board.

Q: Is it free?

A: Yes. Charter schools are considered public schools and are free. Florida is ranked second in the country in terms of the number of charter schools (behind California). Currently, Florida has more than 750 charter schools in 62 school districts.

Q: If the charter application is not approved, do I get my donation back?

A: No, but to facilitate charter approval, the governing board hired one of the leading charter specialists in the country. Collaborative Educational Network, Inc. (CEN) is a highly regarded and recognized team who has been working in the charter school industry for 22 years. They have near perfect approval rate on the charter appli-

cations they write (more than 95% of their applications are approved, where the state average for approval rate is 23%).

Q: What is the money going to be used for?

A: The money raised will be used to pay CEN for assisting us in writing the charter school application and working with us to get the application approved, to write the federal start-up grant, to conduct an executive search for a Principal, and to assist and guide the governing board with all the activities required to open.

CEN is not a for-profit charter management company. They charge a fee for services to assist independent governing boards with getting their school open and support the school until the board no longer needs their services (typically 2-3 years). Conversely, a charter management company would charge fees per student as long as the school is open. Those fees are typically between \$350,000-850,000 per year for the life of the school. CEN's model focuses on preparing the school for success and then ensuring that the school can use their money for educational

O: Is my child guaranteed a seat if I donate?

A: No. Preference is only given to children who are members of the governing board, siblings of students who have already been accepted, and active military families.

Q: How is the enrollment lottery handled with siblings, Destin vs. outside of Destin, Okaloosa vs. Walton?

A: A lottery is conducted only if the number of applications exceeds the number of seats available. If a lottery is needed, the above-mentioned preferences would first be given, followed by students who reside within Okaloosa county as a first priority, followed by students from surrounding counties.

Q: If seats are filled in one grade but not another, can you use empty seats from another grade?

A: In year one, the school will open to 9th and 10th graders. We anticipate having more 9th graders than 10th graders in the first year. The governing board will set the capacity by grade level.

Q: Why only 9th and 10th to start?

A: Typically, it is difficult to attract 11th and 12th grade students to a new high school. Additionally, it is difficult to offer all of the courses needed for all four grade levels in the initial and second year. However, the situation could be



reevaluated based on demand and ability to meet such needs.

Q: Do you have to re-apply every

A: No. Once a student is accepted, he or she does not need to re-apply.

Q: Will transportation be provided?

A: Transportation will be provided for those students within a pre-determined reasonable distance – usually five miles. We will survey the students who are accepted and see if they need transportation. If so, a study will be conducted to examine students' geographic lo-

cation and potentially establish a "depot" style pick up and drop off.

Q: What sports will you have?

A: We plan on offering a full complement of sports as school enrollment grows, though we will begin with a reduced number and expand as enrollment increases. Students who attend the school (or any charter school) are also allowed to play sports at their zoned school if the school does not offer that sport

Q: Won't you reduce the chances of the school district building a public school?

A: Destin High School is a public school. However, our research shows that Okaloosa County has not made any plans in the near future to build another high school in or near Destin, with priority being placed on repairing existing schools

What does R-value mean?

R-value measures insulation's resistance to heat flow. It can also be referred to as "thermal resistance." The higher the Rvalue, the greater the insulating power. All materials having the same R-value, regardless of type, thickness, or weight are equal in insulating power. Don't forget that R-values are determined by material type, thickness, and installed weight per square foot, not by thickness alone. Insulation helps keep your home cool during the summer months and warm during the winter months.

How much will I save by adding insulation to the walls, ceilings and floors of my home?

protects the environment by reducing energy use. According to the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), typically 44% of a homeowner's utility bill goes for heating and cooling costs. DOE also states that homeowners might be able to reduce their energy bills from 10% to 50% by taking certain steps. One of the major steps is increasing the amount of thermal insulation in their existing homes or purchasing additional insulation when buying new homes. Unless your home was constructed with special attention to energy efficiency, adding insulation will reduce your utility bills. The amount of energy you conserve will depend on several factors: the climate; the size, shape, and construction of your house, the living habits of your family, the type and efficiency of the heating and cooling systems and the fuel you use. Energy conserved is money saved and the annual savings increase when utility rates go up, which on average is 3.9% yearly. Insulation upgrades

also instantly add to the value of your home.

How much insulation should I have?

"Insulation," says Bob Vila, host of the nationally syndicated TV program that bears his name, "is the most efficient energy-saving expenditure." Vila says homeowners should check attics to determine the amount of insulation already installed. "Most homes built before 1980 have inadequate insulation," he said, noting that if insulation between the joists of the attic floor comes only to the top of the joist, it probably makes sense to install more insulation. The U.S. Department of Energy recommends home insulation for our area to

What words should I watch out for in contracts or job estimates?

Once you have chosen an insulation contractor, make sure the contract includes the job specification, cost and warranty information. The contract should list



the type of insulation to be used and where it will be used. Make sure that each type of insulation is listed by R-value. Beware of any contract or verbal offering that quotes the job in terms of thickness only (e.g. "14 inches of insulation"). Remember, it is the R-value, not the thickness that tells how well a material insulates. Avoid contracts with vague language such as R-values with the terms "plus or minus;" "+ or -;" "average;" or "nominal."

Is there anything other than insulation to increase comfort and efficiency?

There are several innovated materials in the market which are not widely used by most insulation contractors. ERG film is a tint material which can be applied to glass and is virtually clear. This film blocks 94% of radiant heat and 99.9% of UV rays protecting floors, furniture, you and pets. Some applications would be sunrooms, wheelhouses, and rooms with direct sunlight. Radiant Barrier is a reflective material installed in attics which blocks 97% of radiant heat reducing your overall attic temperature increasing comfort and saving money

This past summer I took my almost middle schooler to a beach with a giant slide dropping off into the water. There was a group of rambunctious boys shoving each other as they climbed up the slide and all jockeying to go down the slide first. I paid it very little attention as I was deep into a summer read and was relieved there were other kids there to play with my son. That is until I heard a mother on the shoreline yelling her son's name repeatedly. I looked up thinking she must have lost her young child. Then the mother waded into the water, headed towards the water slide. I soon realized that her son was not lost, he was one of the boys on the water slide. I watched as she stood to the bottom right of the slide and began chastising the other boys to stop shoving her son. The boys responded with mixed confusion and "yes ma'am's" as her almost-middle school age looking son stood red-faced at the bottom of the slide. She completed the scene by pulling her embarrassed son out of the water, stating loudly for those around her to hear, "C'mon you're not going to play with those bullies!"

This case illustrates an issue I am finding common in my practice with parents. Somewhere along the way, parents have bought into the message that it is our job as parents to make our kids happy. It is our job to fix problems for our children so that they can have a happy childhood. If we have an unhappy child, we have failed at parenting. This is leading to a bigger issue than unhappiness. We are enabling a whole generation of children that cannot regulate emotions or problem solve on their own, because we have always solved the problem or been unable to watch our children struggle.

Watching our children struggle is a difficult thing to do. We are older and wiser (hopefully) and want our children to suffer less than we did in


our lives. The problem with alleviating our children's problems when they are young, is they never learn how to solve their problems when they are grown. I often remind parents; our job is to teach our children the skills to one day leave us with confidence. When we take away the struggle for our children, we rob them of gaining new, necessary life skills and the feelings of competence that come with solving a problem.

As a toddler, struggling might look like a tantrum over wanting candy before dinner. The tears and the frustration need to be worked through by the child. The parent can assist by role modeling empathy and providing the feeling words, "I know you're really disappointed about the candy. You can choose a snack after dinner." By not giving in to the tantrum, the child learns to work through the frustration and disappointment. This is a skill he will utilize the rest of his life.

When a child is disappointed and hurt, it is not the parent's job to make it go away. The parent can support and guide the child through the feelings, but should not "solve the problem" due to their own inability to watch the child struggle. I hear so many times in my office, "But I can't stand to see him upset..." and I ask why not? When he is upset, he is learning emotion regulation. It is an opportunity for your child to grow. Those opportunities start in toddlerhood and rise all the way up to adulthood. When the mother in the story above yelled at the other boys and pulled her son from the water, she robbed him of a valuable opportunity to learn important social skills. A better way to handle it would have been to keep an eye on the situation and see what her son did to advocate for himself (unless of course it became a dangerous situation, by all means intervene in that case). She might have been surprised that he was able to stop the pushing by using his own voice. If he couldn't do that and came out of the water upset on his own accord, that would be the time for mom to intervene by supplying her son with some social tools-practice saying, "stop!" ask another child to play somewhere else in the water, etc. Instead, the mother "took care of it" and the next time her child is in a social situation and mom is not there, he will be all the more ill-

We as parents need to look at our children's struggles in a different light. Rather than focusing on the pain in the situations, we need to look at these moments as learning opportunities. These moments are "on the job training" for when these kids leave home and become independent, productive members of society. It's okay for your child to have a bad day. It's okay for your child not to make the soccer team. It is okay if nobody comes to their birthday party. Is it difficult to watch those moments? You bet! Does it mean their childhood is an "unhappy" one? Definitely not! You can help your child by supplying tools to handle those situations, not by eliminating those situations

altogether for him. That is your job as a parent. It might be painful in the moment, but when they leave the house at age 18 with a confident smile and wave, it will be worth the short-term pain. You will also feel so much better that your child can handle life's disappointments with confidence and skill.



Off the Hook

Winter Fishing in Destin

By this time in the season, most of us anglers have a severe case of cabin fever. Constantly checking the weather apps on our phones, seeing which days will be warm enough with low winds to try and get out on the water. Weather changes mean new fish species to target, and the excitement is almost too much to bear.

"Flounder and Sheepshead are two popular winter/spring fish that anglers will be targeting in this area," says Captain Lionel James of Lion's Tale Adventures Fishing Charter. "Flounder will start to school up in October as they prepare to migrate during winter with the cooler water," he says, "typically heading out into the nearshore gulf areas." The move allows them to settle on natural and artificial reefs to spawn at this time.

Because of their shape, flounder are typically always found on the bottom, where they can burrow into sand to await prey. They hang within 200 yards off the beach, typically at depths of 20 to 60 feet. Common flounder species in the Gulf of Mexico are the gulf flounder and the southern flounder, and odds are the latter will be a much larger fish - with the female southern floun-

der maxing out around 28 inches.

Our other winter fish, Sheepshead, become a lot more active in the winter time and the cooler water. They're almost always found hanging around structure like jetties and bridges where oysters and barnacles grow. To try and catch one, we recommend using live

shrimp or fiddler crabs as bait, as Sheepshead will rarely take artificial. "Sheepshead can be a little trickier for clients to catch", James says. "They like to steal your bait and leave the hook exposed, so we've really got to feel for that subtle bite. Once you hook them though, they're quite a fight!"

These fish are abundant, so there is no closed season for either of these species. The minimum size on the flounder needs to be 12 inches, and the bag limit is 10 per person, per day. Minimum size for Sheepshead is also 12 inches, and the bag limit is 15 per person, per day.



When we mentioned earlier they are two of the tastiest fish to catch, we weren't kidding. Both species are considered prime seafood, with a delicious white meat that's never oily or "fishy" in taste. Flounder have most of their meat contained to one side, making it easy to clean and keep one solid chunk of meat. Sheepshead have a few more bones to remove, and both fish are tasty when prepared grilled, broiled or fried.

Just reading this not only makes my mouth water, it has me pulling out those weather apps asking... is it nice enough to go fishing yet? If you're a fellow angler feeling the same way, we're in

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this together. Let the countdown to spring begin!

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Diet is a Noun

I encourage people to think of eating as a lifestyle such as using the word "DIET" as a noun and not a verb. What IS your diet, instead of dieting (bouncing from fad to fad). Let's look at two health concepts that have caught my attention: "Leaky Gut Syndrome" and "The Keto Diet."

Leaky Gut Syndrome has been brought to light by Cardiac Surgeon Dr. Steven Gundry at www.thegutrehab.com. According to Dr. Gundry, certain foods can cause tears in our gut lining. This, in turn, allows toxins to enter our body that lead to digestive discomfort, food cravings, fatigue, weight gain, and even more health issues. Eating fibroaus foods and lowering our body's acidity through our dietary lifestyle is a huge step in the right direction. Eat less refined (man altered) foods, especially calorie dense but nutritionally poor.

The Keto Diet is a moderate protein/high fat/very low carb diet. Keto Diet formula is 70% Fat/25% Protein/5% Carb. Your macros (macronutrients=Food Groups: Fat, Protein, Carbohydrate) are the nutrients needed for energy in your body. The concept is that if you eat high fat and very low carbs your body is tricked into using fat as your main source of fuel due to increase in ketones needed for the conversion. The formula CAN, however, be skewed a little if the increase of carbs comes from fibrous protein rich leafy vegetables. Just because a food is considered a carb doesn't mean it is ALL CARB... it could break down having a good bit of protein. Peas, spinach, kale, broccoli, sprouts, and black beans are excellent examples of high protein veggies that also help with alkalizing your body; hence, also helping with leaky gut syndrome.

THE FACTS: Now you decide what's healthy for you. Caloric breakdown for "macros" is Protein: 4 calories/gram, CARBS: 4 calories/gram, Fat: 9 calories/gram. The Carb problem is the way they are prepared or they are processed. Fat is very calorie dense. So, to understand the Keto Diet and how to be healthy and safe with it, you must realize that the portion size of food from fat will be a much smaller portion size than that of protein or carbs. So, raw nutrient rich vegetables and low sugar fruits can still be a substantial amount of food in your DIET, and very well should be. Only count net carbs: total carbs – fiber = Net carbs. Choose GOOD FATS (See previous article on Omega 3, 6 & 9 i.e. Avocados, non-animal sources.)

In conclusion, I'm intrigued with both ideas. Try the 80/20 rule. Aim to be strict and healthy for 80% of your week and allow fun and cheating 20%. Educate yourself on how to be HEALTHY! Everyone is NOT created equal, nor have the same activity level. The

worst thing to do is to jump on board with a fad without truly understanding the science (if any) behind it. I prefer to take health info from different nutritional concepts to design MY DIET/LIFESTYLE. Knowing the scientific facts will help you make the best decisions.

Super "gut healthy" salad:

High protein diets = high acidic bodies; I seek to consume more alkaline foods, so I designed this salad after learning more about acidic vs. alkaline health issues. No measuring needed, build to taste. Amounts



are small per ingredient.

- Shredded red cabbage (main ingredient)
- Broccoli Slaw (packaged or chop own)
- Spinach leaves
- Baked & shredded chicken (prob. 3-4 ounces)
- Blueberries (handful)
- Raw almonds


God produced and directed a show that was beyond com-








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Artworx @ Beachworx
