Veterans 48 Keeps It Real:

Builds Bikes for Vets, And Much More

Local Jeff Powell is the founder and President of Veterans 48, a 501c3 non-profit organization, whose goal is to build modified bikes for wounded veterans. Jeff himself spent 30 years serving in the air force, and upon retiring, realized he was missing a critical piece of his life from being active duty: The camaraderie he had enjoyed being part of a community of military men and women. When he retired, Jeff missed the people who spoke the same language, understood the experiences he'd had, and the bonds that were formed from lives unique to warriors. When he left a distinguished military career there was a deep sense of loss as the call signs, stories,



and nicknames ended.

"After that much time, culturally, socially, you pick up habits. Separating from that culture, that environment, even though it's a positive retirement, it still leaves you isolated and feeling without purpose. I tried the contractor thing, but I didn't feel fulfilled. I worked for Tesla and that was fun for a while, but it was

too physical. So, I bought this building. I always loved riding; so did my friends. We call ourselves Wild Hogs. There's a sense of freedom when you ride, but you're also trying to survive, just trying not to get hit and keeping it between the lines. It lets you get out of your head. I want to give that back to guys who have lost a leg."

Many men and women

who leave the military tend to retire at their last assignment. As friends move on from the base, however, loneliness sets in for those who have left the life and still remain. It can especially take a toll on soldiers who have come back from combat. The isolation can jeopardize their mental

well-being, particularly if they have come back from combat with life-changing injuries. Jeff and his wife, Jackie, also a retired vet decided to build a community that these vets could be a part of, and Veterans 48 was born.

'Twenty-two veterans kill themselves every day so we are just trying to reduce that 22 by giving them more purpose and giving them a distraction if nothing else."

Jeff and Jackie are avid motorcycle enthusiasts and it was bike building that became the "excuse" for their fellow vets to gather. Their building at 50 Hill Ave., just outside the back gate of Hurlburt Field, is the clubhouse in which he invites vets to come, gather, tell their stories, and rebuild the community they left behind. At Veterans 48, they can have a cup of coffee, listen to music, and settle in for great conversation where "we understand us," says Jeff.

The campaign Veterans 48

is currently promoting is for vet, Brandon Gingras. Brandon was removed from combat due to spinal injuries. He has since developed his own non-profit, Hunt Pray Eat, to help veterans' sons without fathers. Once funds are raised for parts, his bike will be built by the kids in his program with professional supervision. The plan is to raffle off the bike to fund Hunt Pray Eat. The goal for builds done through Jeff's organization is that each bike has authentic, brand-new parts. To donate to the current and future builds, go to veterans48.org/donate.

Jeff stresses that this isn't just for people who love motorcycles. There's even a single mom who is a gunsmith and veteran, who fixes and restores guns. He's excited about all the activity that happens in his building.

"It's about the connection. Get off the couch and come to the shop. Not the clinic at the VA. not the doctor, not the bar. Come to this healthy environment where we joke and kid and tease each other, just like we do

in the military, and get back to that camaraderie you miss when you get out. This is for the military who want to find that community again."

These reefs are not only used by fishers and divers, but also are habitats for commercial and recreational fish we all enjoy eating.

Bobby Wagner, Owner of Trees on the Coast, runs the "Honor Tree" program which beautifies Destin one tree at a time. He also spearheads the volunteer organization called the Divers Down Pollution Project that removes trash from our local waterways, and participates, plans and promotes a monthly beach trash cleanup too.

Catherine Card, City of Destin Public Information Manager, and the city of Destin, have also done their part by implementing an initiative back in 2017. The City of Destin started the Leave No Trace initiative to promote environmental awareness and pride in our city. Catherine says, "We all love Destin and play a vital role. We must be conscience of our actions and how they can impact not only our environment, but our city too."

A partnership among the City of Destin, Okaloosa County and the Okaloosa Tourist Development Department, ensures that our beaches are cleaned and beach trash cans are emptied on a regular basis. In 2019, more than 1.3 million pounds of trash were collected from Destin and Okaloosa Island beaches.





In 2020, (during COVID-19), about 900,000 pounds of trash were collected from the same beaches.

Catherine states, "Our Leave No Trace initiative goes much more beyond keeping our beaches and waterways clear and clean from trash. We also want to include our parks, front yards, roadways and our entire city." She hopes that residents, local businesses and visitors alike will join their effort and support the initiative. Businesses can support by displaying the Leave No Trace logo on their digital billboards or by simply posting "Leave No Trace" on their marquee sign. Pick up your free Leave No Trace decal at city



hall by emailing Catherine at Ccard@cityofdestin.com. Residents and visitors can also support the initiative by removing any items they bring to Destin

Destin collaborates with many partners on different clean-ups throughout the year and even operates an Adopt-A-Street program which allows local families, businesses and community groups to adopt sections of a street to keep it free of litter and debris. Local resident Lucille Rogers does her part too by simply picking up trash on the beach. Lucille and her husband relocated to Destin from upstate New York, and have a son, a daughter, and two grandchildren living in Destin, and another daughter

still residing in New York.

Since retiring two years ago, she's made it her mission to keep the beach pristine. Her interest in the environment began with her first Earth Day experience in 1972, and for as long as she can remember, she has cared about the quality of our environment and of course, since moving to Destin, our beaches. Although she's only one person, she can see that she's making a difference. Most mornings she begins at the June Decker public beach and then goes through the beaches of Henderson State Park. She's armed with multiple recyclable bags to sort the things she finds as she walks. She says, "I am so happy to live in close proximity to the most beautiful sandy white beaches in the country—if not the world. My hope is that people become more conscience of their surroundings and make a sincere effort to keep our beaches beautiful and clean!"

"In general people love to sit at the beach and enjoy the waves quietly landing on the shore. At the same time, their trappings leave footprints behind. A child's

History of Destin Vacation Rentals

About 12,000 years BC (Before Condos), a little place happened to catch the eye of wayward travelers. They found a magic land where crystal white sands are kissed by emerald green waters and the sky just seems to have prettier clouds than anyplace else on Earth. They were simply looking to stop and relax, but they found so much more. Here, in this little special little spot by the beach, Native Americans hunted and fished. They stopped to camp, trapped animals, harvested plants, and lived off the abundant wild resources, deep in the old-growth forest and along the precious shores of what we now call Northwest Florida.

Our story begins about 12 millennia or so later, on May 12, 1932. That's when the War department sold two of the lots on the Destin Harbor to Mrs. Green of Pensacola. She had big plans for small houses.

The lots were located roughly where the parking lot for the Emerald Grand sits. She used her purchase to establish the

first vacation rental cottages here in Destin. The concept of a rentable home isn't a new idea, but with these humble beginnings, Mrs. Green has made a difference in the hearts of millions of visitors here over the years. People looking for a respite, a quiet getaway, a place to commune with nature, and a place so beautiful, it makes it easy to look inward. Destin is that place.

Early vacation rentals were simple concrete structures. Four walls, maybe a large bay window in the direction of the Gulf of Mexico, the very bare essentials of home. What these humble abodes lacked in grand splendor and luxury appointments, they made up for in unimaginable views of the dunes and the shore. Irreplaceable now, these amazing virgin views had a connection with nature that we can't even begin to imagine. They helped families get a little closer to the beach and a little closer to each other, and that's all they were required to do for the next 20 years. But, oh, what a time. Every place experiences









popularity and its population increases differently. To say Destin is unusual is an understatement.


Though it's a known fact that insects by far outnumber humans on the rest of the planet, here in Destin, maybe not. There are 11,500 permanent residents on our shores (on those occasional off weeks); that number jumps to more than 250,000 any given week in season. The loose math works out to over 2 million through the summer. So, if you come across a grumpy local, it could very well be because, at any given moment, each and every one of them is catering to the needs of roughly 21 giddy tourists.

Leonard Destin had the right idea over 150 years ago, setting up his fishing camp on these shores. Since then, the Harbor has grown exponentially with each condo skyscraper that goes up, retaining its charm in the people's faces that are so happy to be here. It's been said that to see Destin the way it used to be, simply look out at the Gulf, that view hasn't changed a bit. This sleepy little fishing village

had a long way to go. Over the last 73 years or so, word spread throughout the Southeast and eventually the world. Destin quickly became a household name, synonymous with its relaxing calm shores, warm waters and plentiful fishing.

Building on that rich history of fishing, an event sprung up back in 1948 that would forever help drive the local vacation rental market. The Fishing Rodeo got its name from the abundance of large fish, so many to round up and catch, you could practically ride them! Visitors have been flocking to Destin's shores every year since. The sheer numbers make this the largest attended, longest-running (and ah'hem, luckiest) fishing tournament in the world. No other event even comes close to generating the room nights that the Rodeo draws in annually. Just like Destin, it has grown every year. Rodeo founders Howard Marler, Jewel Melvin and Willie Marler were so interested in promoting rentals that




Destin Launches Beach Basket Pilot Program in partnership with Trees on the Coast

Meet Okaloosa County's Patt Maney

An Uncommon Freshman Legislator

Florida state representatives call one another "Rep." But Okaloosa County's newest legislator presented sitting representatives with a quandary. What do you call a man who is a retired brigadier general, a retired circuit judge and now a state representative?

They solved the problem, Patt Maney said, by referring to him as "GJR."

"There are a good number of veterans in the (Florida House of Representatives) freshman class," he said. "But veterans generally call me general. Lawyers call me judge. They couldn't figure out what to call me."

Patt, 73, a Kentucky native who has lived in Florida since 1975, challenged three other candidates for an open seat on the Florida House of Representatives in 2020, besting them in the Republican Party primary in August and defeating Democrat John Plante and write-in can-

didate Lance Lawrence to succeed current Okaloosa County Commissioner Mel Ponder. He took the oath of office on Nov. 4, the day after the election.

"Not surprisingly, I'm the oldest freshman in the class," Patt said with a chuckle. "The youngest was 26. They call us the bookends."

Patt move to Okaloosa County in 1975, where he practiced law for 15 years before his appointment as a judge with Florida's First Judicial Circuit in 1989. An Army reservist, he sustained wounds during a tour of duty in Afghanistan. After his recovery, he tentatively resumed his post on the bench. On Ian. 31, 2016, he became the longest-serving county or circuit judge to preside within the First Judicial Circuit. He retired from the bench in May 2018, the same month he turned seventy, Florida's mandatory retirement age for judges. He retired from the Army Reserve in 2007 with the rank of brigadier general.

Early in his term in the House, Patt had a plan. "I focused first on policy issues, then moved to appropriations," he said. And, he added, he got plenty of help from old hands. "Chris Sprowls, the Speaker of the House, and his leadership team put on a great program to get freshmen a common base of knowledge," Patt said. "The staff has been very friendly and responsive."

He said Sprowls is also gifted at keeping civil. "He told the whole house this isn't like Washington and we're not going to have the same atmosphere. We're going to debate policy and try to pass laws that are beneficial to the entire state. He keeps people on the subject and I appreciate that. He's reached across the aisle to treat the (Democratic) minority party fairly."

Not that his early service in the House hasn't been without hitches. "I was surprised that being a freshman in the House is largely like being a freshman in high school," he said. "You don't know where you're going, but you don't want to be late. And the upperclassmen tend to tease or prank freshmen."

For example, Patt was presenting a bill to a committee and referred to the chair as "ranking member." A senior legislator chimed in with "Don't you know her first name?"

Another time, he said, a freshman representative was talking about an education bill by acronym. A senior committee member asked him what the acronym stood for and he drew a blank. "They pounced on him," Patt said, noting that the banter is good natured rather than malicious. "Most people don't expect to know that legislators harass each other," he said.

Right now, Patt is awaiting his committee assignments for the upcoming session. "I'm really interested in education, workforce development and infrastructure," he said. "And not



surprisingly in veteran's affairs and judicial issues."

Patt said his concept of infrastructure is not limited to bricks and mortar, but includes quality of life issues such as the environment. "I've sponsored several water projects," he said. "You've got to have clean water to survive and for our communities to grow."

Patt and his wife, Caroline, have been married 50 years and have raised two daughters, Lindsay and Sarah, who have given them six grandchildren. He's determined to be a force for good in his adopted Okaloosa County. "My goal is to be a very effective freshman legislator in representing the people of Okaloosa County and improving life for the state at large," he said.

In most states, including Florida, auto insurance is required to register and legally operate a vehicle. Like most lines of insurance in Florida, rates have been on a rise for the past few years. It may be tempting to only purchase enough coverage to meet our state's minimum requirements. Don't do it! These low limits are not enough to protect you and your family if the worst circumstances happen.

Your car insurance policy is an important financial tool. If your car or you are involved in a wreck, theft, or natural disaster (hurricane, flood or fire), the impact on your financial viability can be substantial. Your car insurance should be tailored to protect you, other people, and assets from most of the associated expenses and costs in the event vou are involved in an accident. Your lender, who legally owns the car, may have their own requirements and will want to be financially protected if there is a collision or other damage.

There are six basic types of coverages for your auto, motor home, motorcycle and LSV's that are registered with the state. They are liability coverages, medical payments coverage, un-

insured/underinsured motorist, collision coverage and comprehensive coverage.

Liability — Coverage that offers protection against claims alleging that a driver's negligence resulted in bodily injury or property damage to another party. This can include the driver and passengers of the other vehicle or vehicles involved, injured pedestrians and owners of the property where the accident occurred.

The more assets you need to protect, the higher the limits should be. For those with significant assets, an Umbrella policy is recommended for increased protection. In most cases, the Umbrella will require minimum underlying Liability limits of \$250,000/\$500,000.

Medical Expenses – Coverage for medical expenses because of bodily injury sustained by an insured caused by an accident. This covers your medical bills (not lost wages) regardless who is at fault in a crash. Usual limits offered \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$10,000.

Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist Coverage –

This coverage pays for your and your passengers' medical bills and property damage if the driver at fault in an accident doesn't have insurance, has insufficient coverage, or the incident is a hitand-run. It is recommended to carry limits equal to the liability limits on a Stacked (broader) Basis rather than Non-Stacked.

PIP/Personal Injury Protection - Mandated by Florida, provides medical, disability, and death benefits to you and any passengers in your vehicle. Basic PIP covers up to 80% of your medical expenses and 60% of your lost wages.

Collision – Physical Damage coverage for your vehicle if it is impacted by another vehicle or damaged in an accident. This coverage is usually required by a lienholder on a leased or financed vehicle.

Comprehensive – Covers damage to your vehicle caused by an event other than a collision, such as fire, theft, vandalism, hail and flood damage. Like collision, this coverage is usually required by a lienholder on a leased or financed vehicle.

Other Recommended Coverages – There are many other coverages that should be considered when reviewing your Personal Insurance Program. Included are Loss of Use or Rental Reimbursement, Roadside Assistance, Accident Forgiveness, Gap, New Car Replacement, Diminishing Deductible, Pay-Per Mile Cover-

age, Customized Equipment and Original Equipment Coverage.

With the popularity of Uber and Lyft, one can now readily obtain Rideshare Insurance. This is supplemental coverage for drivers of the ride-hauling services, which is typically inexpensive. It provides valuable coverage for situations that are not covered by a driver's personal car insurance policy or the rideshare company's insurance policy. If you are a rideshare driver, please discuss options with your insurance agent.

Many of our neighbors and customers have golf carts, or LSVs (low speed vehicles). As long as they're not rented, they can be written as a separate policy, or added to your auto policy if they are licensed for road use. The rental exposure can sometimes be written under a commercial liability policy, but the coverage is not as broad as an auto policy.

Many of our neighbors and customers have teenagers who are approaching the driving age and wonder how best to insure these exposures. If you have a new driver in the household, all insurance companies recognize the increase in risk with a new driver. Some insurance carriers will not insure new drivers, while others will charge higher premiums to make up for the increased exposure. There are some measure you can take to lower your insurance rate. Taking a driving course is beneficial, and many courses are available on line. This will help your new driver become more familiar with the rules of the road, and educate them on ways to avoid accidents. When you are a new driver, it is worth taking it slow. Stick to the roads you are familiar with, and avoid getting into stressful traffic situations where the chances of having an accident are higher.

The bottom line is to talk to your agent and get customized auto coverages that fit your personal needs. Don't feel like you have to accept the first quote you are offered, and make sure you are aware of all discounts

Strategies to Reduce the Impact of Taxes

Many businesses and individuals in the world and America in particular are experiencing and benefiting from (in spite of the increased spread of the virus) a huge growth in the money supply, strong earnings, early retirements and the sales of their businesses. While there is much to acknowledge by the financial security these can bring, it also means considering the impact taxes can have. Add to that Washington has increased spending and increased tax plans on its current agendas.

When it comes to taxes and investing, there are three main strategies individuals might want to consider. Each has its

own merits and distinguishes itself from the other. Any one or combination of the three may help address the accumulation of wealth and the preservation of it as well.

The three are: 1) Tax reduction strategies 2) Tax free strategies and 3) Tax deferred strategies.

Tax reduction strategies (for current and future tax liabilities for individuals and perhaps their estates). This involves charitable giving or moving assets out of their estates. Americans are among the most charitable people in the world and they can combine their philanthropy with reducing their current taxes with contributions directly to a charity of their choice (including churches, schools/ universities and certain societal causes). Another way that is utilized and is an increasingly popular strategy of Donor Advised Funds (or DAFs). And some, depending on resources they have, might even establish their own private foundation. The impact is that it reduces (within certain limits) income taxes for the current year while also fulfilling their support for the causes



they care about. There are also tax reduction strategies that can impact current and future taxes by utilizing things like Charitable Remainder Trusts (CRTs), Charitable Lead Trusts (CLTs). And some may be looking to get assets out of their estates to address the tax burden for their heirs (so no current tax savings for them) and utilize things like Spousal Lifetime Access Trusts (SLATs).

Tax free strategies focus on those investments where income is not taxed federally (and in some states as well). These can help reduce current taxes particularly in a year where income may be surging. The main investments available in this case are municipal bonds or municipal bond funds or exchange traded funds. Many of these are considered more conservative (and hence not growth oriented) investments and pay monthly, quarterly or semi-annual tax-free income. Social security recipients should take note that the income while not taxable does go into their earnings calculations. Lastly, certain retirement accounts like the ROTH IRA, when certain requirements have been met by the holder, might deliver tax free income (post 59 1/2 years old and after a certain waiting period for owners or beneficiaries) for life.

Tax Deferred Strategies. Many Americans do this at every paycheck by contributions to their 401ks, 403bs, SIMPLE (Savings and Incentive Match Plan for Employees) plans or SEP plans. These contributions not only reduce your current taxable income but they also can grow on a tax deferred basis (without annual taxes on growth, capital gains or any income they produce). In theory that means the investments have an advantage to taxable investments. Of course, on the other end, when

distributions are made, those distributions are taxed, at that time. Tax deferred strategies for IRAs have current contribution limits of \$6000 per year (\$7000 if over 50 years old). For 401ks that can mean contributions of up to \$19,500 (\$26,000 if over 50) with a total annual maximum of \$63,500 given certain limitations from their salaries and those plans that involve a company contribution through a profit-sharing plan to add to that. SIMPLE plans work similarly but with lower limits (and might be attractive to small companies). There are merits and considerations for SEP plans as well. Lastly, some people, particularly in their 50s or 60s might be wanting or needing to catch up on retirement savings and there are plans such as Defined Contribution Plans (DBPs) where the individual can potentially contribute 100% of their earnings within limits. Those plans currently would max out at \$230,000 per year in contributions. It is important to seek professional tax planning assistance when considering any

Flowers, Veggies, Butterflies, Bees, and Other Gardeners. Peace.

For those of you who planted spring or summer gardens—you should be near the end of your summer season. Summer flowers are blooming and your veggies are still producing. You have maybe another month of summer. Hopefully you have been able to either can or freeze some of your produce.

At our Destin Community Garden on Main Street, the tomatoes stopped producing six weeks ago and the plants have been pulled. The squash vines were decimated by the squash borers and are now a distant memory. It got too hot for the kale so most has been pulled and composted. Cucumbers were also hit hard by the heat and are now dead vines. Yikes – This is sounding grim!

But that is just the way it is with gardening. Fruits, veggies, flowers — everything has its season. We still have our pole beans, Indian corn, okra, eggplant, peppers, watermelon and herbs. Yep – happy days are still here.

Most of the gardeners in our Community Garden plant flowers along with their veggies. We do this for a couple of reasons. Not only do flowers look and smell great, they bring in pollinators for our veggies. Also, certain flowers make great companion plantings by repelling some pests. The most common flower in our garden is the marigold,



but we also have zinnias, lilies, pentas, pansies, roses, cone flowers and black-eyed Susan's – you get the idea. It is always fun to bring home a fresh bouquet of flowers along with a basket full of organic veggies.

Some of our gardeners also love growing herbs. The Mediterranean herbs are the most popular. These are mostly perennials, so we try to plant them in our common areas. Rosemary, thyme, sage, oregano and lavender are several that do well and do not need a lot of attention. In fact, they do best when you ignore them. The more you water and fertilize, the worse they will do, and you might even kill them. So, if you are thinking of planting herbs, put them over in the corner of your garden and leave them alone. They will do fine as long as you keep them

Now that we are at the end of summer gardening, it is time to begin planning your fall and winter gardens. If you like to grow a variety of unusual produce, now is when you want to get out your seed catalogues and begin ordering. You can also order your seeds online.

And yes, we can grow veggies and flowers in Destin year-round. Actually, I prefer gardening in cooler weather. The bugs are a lot nicer and it is so much easier to work without passing out from the heat. Fall and winter is when we grow collards, kale, carrots, peas, beets, many kinds of lettuce, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, several kinds of cabbage, mustard, radishes and onions.

Since we are still harvesting okra, beans, peppers, carrots and eggplant, we are not quite ready to clean out our garden beds. But, we are close. Once a veggie is done producing, it is time to pull it and clean up the bed. This is when you want to boost your soil nutrients by adding compost and minerals.

This last year and a half have been rough for those who were shut in from Covid. I couldn't do it. Thankfully, I had a garden to go to. Working outside with others, I did not feel the isolation that I heard others talk about. We have about 30 gardeners in our Community Garden. I enjoy

the variety of personalities, life experiences and funny stories. So, for me, gardening is never boring or lonely.

Certainly, gardening can be hard work, but that feels good too. For us in our little garden community, we have a certain slice of reality and ordinary. There is no craziness. It is just flowers, veggies, butterflies, bees, and other gardeners. It is peace.

Okay – maybe there are a lot of weeds to pull and the occasional wasp. But for me, our garden on Main Street is a little slice of heaven and the best place to be in Destin!

of no nutritional value and take time to decompose.



So, fires were often kindled by carrying a shovel full of coals from one stove to another and it was while doing this task that Fanny's twoyear-old baby girl bumped into her mother causing the live coals to fall on her and catching her clothes on fire. Fanny was alone with her baby and, although she put out the fire, she was so frightened that she went into what is now known as shock. The doctor told William their little girl would not live. However, William was determined. So, he moved his little family to Elk City, Okla., where better medical care was available. While there, the entire family had a bout with smallpox which left Fanny depressed, weak and unable to walk.

William was now trying to care for his badly burned baby and his invalid wife. The doctor said perhaps a warmer, drier climate would help. So, William left Fanny and the baby with family and with his brother, Leslie Jay, and a family friend, made a hurried trip to Texas to claim a new homestead, build a small shelter and hurry back to get his family, wife and baby. They began their long journey in a covered wagon about the first of August 1905 and arrived in their new home in late October of the same year. Each day on their trek, Fanny seemed to gain strength and her zest for life as her baby also improved. They learned to forget the hard struggle for life in the little joys of each day like the beautiful land, new flowers, birds singing, sunsets, coyotes howling at night, hooting owls and rabbits playing in the moonlight. A couple years after arriving in Texas, Fanny had a little boy she named Milo who was my grandfather. My great aunt, "Auntie" as my generation called her, completely recovered from her burns, but carried scars on her back and torso for the remainder of her life which was 90 plus years. I don't remember noticing any scars, so she was indeed very blessed.

Telling a Southerner to social distance is pretty much like telling a duck to stay out of the water or a little boy to stay out of the cookie jar-it's just unnatural. But we'd never seen anything as unnatural as a worldwide pandemic that could only be survived by sheltering in place and avoiding each other. Love thy neighbor, but only from across the fence or behind a window. My husband and I were diagnosed with Covid in




early July. For several weeks, we were both about as sick as we have ever been

Now that I have my health back, I have a renewed zest for life and a desire to live my life as fully as I possibly can. That means spending time with my family and traveling till I'm a hundred. The new Covid variants will be resolved and the human spirit's desire to travel knows no bounds. Positivity must reflect our times. 





they decided to move the Rodeo to the entire month of October. This helped lengthen the tourist season. Vacation visionaries!

Off the west side of Mack Bayou, a large parcel of land, rich in natural beauty, came on the market. Among other ideas it was considered for a seaside racetrack for a short time, then for a spell as a potential location for a certain mouse-themed amusement park by the early 1970's. Evans & Michell bought the land and started the concept of Sandestin. Incorporating the "San" from nearby Santa Rosa Beach and the Destin from, um, well Destin, a master-planned resort community was born. In stark contrast to the over-development that was so popular at the time, Sandestin carefully incorporated its permanent residences and vacation rentals into the lush dune forests and marshes. It's quite a wide area from the beach to the bay. From its inception, the community faced grounds and facility challenges.

It was around that time that a fresh face from the Pacific

Ocean was making his way to our shores. After his time spent in the Marines, Tim Taylor landed in Waikiki. Little did he know that his early career in hospitality would lead him to such great heights. It was here that he would meet his wife. Soon the two moved to Maui to open a new boutique hotel. Before too long a call came in with an offer to work at the new beach community of Sandestin. Becky and Tim sold their Toyota FJ Land Cruiser and moved here from Hawaii. 

The boba tea comes in four flavors: strawberry, mango, Thai and Taro.





During my 20 years as a pastor, I was privileged to be invited into the heights of the human experience as well as the deepest valleys. I presided over weddings and was one of the first to hold newborn babies. I was also one of the first called when there was a life altering diagnosis or a tragedy and walked with families through the grieving process. Through those 20 years, I have become convinced of two things.

First, deep down everyone desires and knows they need community, yet most people aren't sure how to create it. In our early years community is created for us through our parents and our environments. Many of us grew up playing with the kids of our parent's friends and we found friendships and community with classmates and through after-school activities. This builtin community continued and was encouraged through high school and college. Then as adults we move away from those built-in communities and must learn how to build community on our own for the first time.

Second, true community shows up the moment a need arises, but only if it has been built patiently over time. Even if it is easy to ignore the desire or need for community today, there Journey Bravely: The Need for Community

will come a time when your need for support is undeniable. If you wait until you need community to build it, it won't be there for you. So, even if it is a bit clumsy at first, here are some ways to begin building community today.

5 Ways to Begin Building Community

- 1. Create space. Community happens when it is prioritized. One of the greatest obstacles to developing community may be the lack of margin in our lives. Screens have also become a barrier to the development of deeper relationships. Create space, lift your head, and see the people around you. Try joining a club, a community service group, a sports league, or a church.
- **2. Be first.** Too often we don't pursue community, because we are waiting for someone else to go first. It's like we are still living out the middle school lunchroom narrative. The fear of rejection or judgement often keeps us from the best parts of life. But, maybe we can find encouragement to connect if we remember that deep down, those around us desire community and may be waiting for someone to go first.
- **3. Be curious.** One of the best ways to connect with others and build trust is to listen. If you have ever interacted with a good listener, you know how valuable listening is to connection. Develop a genuine interest and curiosity in the lives of others and learn how to ask good open questions and then, most importantly, listen intently. Open questions invite more than yes or no answers. Examples in-

clude: How was your test? Tell me about your meeting. How are you feeling about your relationship with your friend?

4. Be generous. Intentionally notice the needs of others in both small and larger community settings. Join with and lead others to generously meet those needs when you find them. Also cultivate a generous spirit toward others in general. Allow for differences in personality, beliefs, perspectives and give others the benefit of the doubt. Unfortunately, this is becoming increasingly counter-cultural. If you choose to only be in relationship with people who act and think exactly like you, you are destined to a lonely and isolated life.

5. Be vulnerable. True community and connection requires accepting the love and support of others in times of need. Though difficult, setting pride aside, and admitting that we don't always have it all together and we need help carrying the overwhelming load

creates opportunity for honest relationship.

Friendships and community take effort, time and vulnerability. But those investments make the world and life significantly more meaningful for you and for those around you. What is one practical step you will take to begin building community? Imagine the impact if we all committed to community building as an intentional practice. May it begin with you and me.

Monoclonal Antibody Treatment for Covid Available

monoclonal antibody treatment site is now open at the Northwest Florida Fairgrounds in Fort Walton Beach. It will be available seven days per week from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis says health officials can handle up to 320 treatments per day. The treatment -- which is free of charge -- consists of monoclonal antibodies being given to patients with mild-to-moderate symptoms of COVID-19. Vaccination status does not matter. Monoclonal antibody treatment saves lives and reduces hospitalization and death. It is intended to be used in patients with mild to moderate COVID-19 who

are at high risk for progressing to severe disease and/or hospitalization. Gov. DeSantis says the monoclonal antibody treatment will ultimately decrease hospitalizations. "We saw that these treatments were underutilized and folks have now been able to get more access to it," he said. "We're already getting testimonials from people who have gone in and visited our sites and gotten the treatment. People say they could've been in the hospital or maybe even been dead had they not gotten this, and so it has a good track record and I think people will be very, very happy with the results."

Dr. Samuel L. Jacobs, physi-

cian at the Florida Department of Health said, "The monoclonal antibody sites increase access to this treatment in communities across Florida. Had I not received monoclonal antibodies myself when I tested positive for COVID, it could have been much worse. I had received my first dose of the vaccine prior to contracting COVID and I think the monoclonal antibody treatment saved my life and I'm very grateful. If someone tests positive for COVID and especially if they're having symptoms, I strongly stress the importance of getting monoclonal antibodies basically as a life-saving mea-

Monoclonal antibody treatments can be prescribed by health care providers to individuals 12 years of age and older who have been diagnosed with COVID-19 or who have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 and are at high risk for severe illness and hospitalization. However, there is currently a standing order in Florida signed by the State Surgeon General that allows patients to receive this treatment without a prescription or referral if administered by an eligible health care provider. Such referrals are not required at any of the State of Florida monoclonal antibody treatment sites and treatments are available at no cost to patients. The antibodies help the immune system recognize and respond effectively to the virus. According to the treatment guidelines, they should be administered as soon as possible after diagnosis. By providing access to these treatments at these new sites, Gov. DeSantis is alleviating demand on hospital resources and further making sure that Floridians have access to all potential treatments that can help them recover from COVID-19. Gov. DeSantis and the Florida Department of Health continue to encourage Floridians to receive the COVID-19 vaccine.

We LOVE Internet Reviews...Until We Get A Bad One

Online reviews are a must these days! Why? Because most people search the internet for just about everything: where to eat, how to pick a cat, how to hire a contractor, how to hire a great Realtor (like me!), etc. And online reviews are awesome! That is if they tout how good you and/or your business are. But, what do you do if you get a bad review posted about you/your business? Inevitably, it's going to happen; it could be a disgruntled customer, employee or even a fake review! (Yes, really!) So, how should you handle a un-favorable review? We're going to concentrate on Google reviews, since they're the most popular, most searched.

Here's a few pointers:

First and foremost, act fast and dig deeper:

- Ideally within the first 24
- Research who wrote it; are they a customer, employee, other?
- Are they a long term customer, first time customer?

When did they work with you? Were you aware of their

dissatisfaction, etc?

• You are better equipped to handle it if you do your research!

Address their concerns: And address them online so other folks, your potential customers that are looking at the reviews will know that you've addressed it and that you/your company will do your best to ensure happy customers. (Do not skip this step!)

Thank the customer! Yes, even if you think they are wrong! Thank them for bringing it to your attention and make it known you want to correct it.

Many times the customer will be encouraged to update the review to be favorable based on how you handle the initial review and that's a win-win!

Hate speech, threats: If someone posts inappropriate

content, flag it and bring it to Google's attention. Do the same if the review is **irrelevant**, has nothing to do with your business, contains SPAM or other advertising.

Fake reviews: Again, apologize for their dissatisfaction. Let them know you wish to help; however, you don't have any record of doing business with them; **offer to fix the problem.**

Report it to Google as fraudulent for removal. To do this, go to your Google business page, click to review your review and then click on the three dots at the top right corner of the page. You can also complete a Google form for a legal removal request form.

Hopefully any one-star reviews will be fewer than the number of Five-Star reviews.

If not, well, that's a whole other article!

There is help locally. Along with providing many services to children who have experienced abuse, abandonment or neglect, the Emerald Coast Children's Advocacy Center (ECCAC) has significant prevention programs in place.

According to Jasie Landeros, who heads up the prevention department as ECCAC's Outreach Program Manager, "We have been focusing on creating awareness for monthly prevention programs this past year. In September, our focus will be on calling attention to suicide prevention for children, teens and young adults."

It is especially important for parents, educators, youth workers and coaches to be perceptive. Self-care and mental health awareness are critical for children and youth. ECCAC will be providing additional data and information via their website and social media.

ECCAC has been in operation in our area for over 20 years with centers in Niceville and DeFuniak Springs. It has provided over 150,000 services at no cost for children to include mental health therapy, crisis intervention, referrals to other community providers, interviews and medicals to more than 14,000 children and their families.

Margin. Business leaders talk about it all the time, usually in terms of profit and loss. Most CEO's or business owners manage from a profit/loss sheet that often has margin cal-

culations built in. We therefore think of margin in purely financial terms; it is the difference between revenue and expenses and is therefore the gauge of our success or failure.

Savvy leaders think about margin in many aspects of business and life. These leaders search for margin at every opportunity. Margin can be found and should be chased not only on the balance sheet, but in time management, rest, family, spiritual focus, employees, friends, hobbies, and on and on.

From a business standpoint, margin allows us to take advantage of opportunity. Craig

Groeschel says, "Create margin for opportunities you cannot see." Great leaders know that running a business or any endeavor must be done with margin if you are to have available time and finances for leveraging new opportunities.

A mindset of creating time margin is so important that author Juliet Funt has created a very successful consulting firm built primarily around teaching executives how to have margin, what she calls 'white space' or space on one's calendar without appointments. Ms. Funt is the author of A Minute to Think: Reclaim Creativity, Conquer Busyness and Do Your Best Work. And yes, she is a daughter of Alan Funt of Candid Camera fame.

So how does one create mar-

Start with your calendar.

Plan minutes, not hours. Shorten meetings ruthlessly. If the decision your team needs to make can be done in 15 minutes, don't plan to meet for an hour.

Say 'no' to more stuff. Remember, saying yes is a no to something else.

Plan retreats, time where you allow yourself to relax, reflect, learn, and create. And do not make a list of things to do during retreat. It is a retreat, an opportunity to create mental margin. Warren Buffet famously spends 80% of his workday reading, learning, reflecting. He says, "The rich invest in time; the poor invest in money."

Delegate. Much is written on this topic, but most leaders still do not do enough delegating. When you delegate you do two things: First, you create margin for yourself and that means you have created margin for personal, professional, and organizational development. Second, you are engaging and empowering your staff to develop, to learn and grow, to stretch and set new goals, to become much better employees.

In short, margin is a product of planning and intentionality. As a business owner or executive do you have margin for personal development, for retreat, for friends or your family? If your profit and loss statement is the only place where you measure margin, you have truly missed the point.

Create margin for the most important things in life, your family will love you for it.

Make Your Claim Filing Process Easier

By now, you've heard me speak of Hurricane season this time of year; it's just so important to know what to do when trying to recover from a Hurricane's aftermath, in many ways, but also as it pertains to your insurance claims. Hopefully, it doesn't happen to you, but, if so, you'll be ready. Key points to make the claim filing process a little easier:

- Take as many photos as possible. Those with the most documentation come out ahead.
- Take contemporaneous notes (real time notes as they happen). Make sure to write down who you talked to, when you talked to them, what they said and how long they were on site
- Make an inventory list of all your damaged belongings.
 Write down what they are and how much it will cost to replace them.
- Try to provide your insurance company with photos of the property before the damage happened.
- Be true to yourself. If something doesn't feel right or sound right, mention it. Ask to have an explanation in writing about what someone said or to elaborate their position.

- Read your policy. If you have questions about what certain parts mean, ask a professional for clarification, like me.
- Make sure to read all the paperwork that comes from the insurance company or insurance company representative. Some documents are time sensitive and can put the claim at risk if not turned in on time. If you receive less than what you were expecting or promised, you can always submit more information for a better result.
- Make sure you understand what you are signing before you sign it. Sometimes you can sign your rights away.

Remember, the insurance mechanism is just that. A mechanism. A machine – a finely tuned machine that has its own way of operating. And people work inside this machine, but

have little wiggle room to maneuver outside the lines. Insurance is also deemed by the insurance companies as a way to lessen the blow of risk, not necessarily to make you whole after the risk you're insured against has happened.

Far too often people end up losing their cool (both on the insurance company side and the insured side) due to overwhelming circumstances surrounding an event like this. If I can express one thought in the midst of this, it's to remember that we're all people meeting one another with all sorts of differences, prejudices, realities, backgrounds and life events

that shape us as we are. If we can keep that in mind while attempting to communicate what we feel is important, and try to communicate in ways that are sincere to how we want to be treated (and treating others the same way too), then a lot more might be accomplished, roadblocks cleared and hurdles jumped over. You never know, the person who you thought was against you might become your greatest advocate and push your claim along to help it get settled.

Ikigai. Go Ahead and Google it if You Haven't Already.

In studying the history of the concept of retirement, it did not take long to come across research and studies that seemed to prove this is another manmade concept that has the potential to do more harm than good. We couldn't agree more.

In all our years of being hired to help people "see if they are on track for retirement," we have noticed a common theme emerge as to what delays or holds most people back from actually retiring: they don't want to. The sad part is, in many instances, our worth and purpose has been tied up in our labor, and that should not be the case.

A study by Harvard some years ago found that an area with one of the highest life expectancies in the world doesn't even have a word in their language for retirement. The study looked at two different groups with the same physical char-

acteristics and lifestyle habits. Participants who reported that they found their life purpose at the beginning of the study had higher levels of self-rated health, lower levels of stress, and a significantly longer lifespan than those without the ikigai.

Like all concepts related to money, work and possessions – the truth is found in The Bible which makes clear that storing up without purpose is dangerous. Wealth without intention is risky. And the retirement we should be working towards is more like reHirement.

Does God call us to work? Absolutely. Does He bring opportunities to serve Him in our jobs and our daily routines whatever they may be? For sure. Could He provide the resources for us to reduce our regular labor and spend most, if not all our waking hours in work serving Him and our neighbors around us? Certainly. If we are honest, however, we instead have mostly bought into a

concept that our purpose is to (1) make money, then (2) save said money, to (3) spend saved money in a time of rest. This blueprint started in the early 18th Century as a way to move younger, more physically abled bodies into jobs older, less capable bodies were occupying. But, it has turned into much more than that and this model is not how we were designed. Among other issues, there are too many missed opportunities with family, friends and neighbors in this retirement approach.

Jesus made it clear that He came to give us all life, and life abundantly. His desire is for us to experience and live in that abundance all the days of our life, not in a future state where our nest egg is our security, and our focus is limited to fleeting pleasures. He has so much more for you and me.



A Pastor's Ponderings: Crackers and Donuts

"Then Jesus asked, 'What is the kingdom of God like? What shall I compare it to? It is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his garden. It grew and became a tree, and the birds of the air perched in its branches'" "Again, he asked, 'What shall I compare the kingdom of God to? It is like yeast that a woman took and mixed into a large amount of flour until it worked all through the dough." Luke 13:20-21

I'm a donut kind of guy, crackers—not so much. I sharpened my parenting skills early on with the bribing power of doughy, delicious donuts. In order to motivate my four children to awaken on Sunday mornings, I would go out early and buy a dozen of the pastries and come home shouting out in my best Italian accent, "Coma getta you red, hot donuts." Bedroom doors would fly open, the kids came running and our worship day was off to a roaring start.



On the other hand, the kids never came running for crackers. What is the difference between crackers and donuts? The key distinctive is yeast. The living agents in yeast can transform damp flour into a living, growing organism that rises to become soft dough that defies gravity. After that, you can

bake it into bread, boil it into bagels, fry it into donuts or other delightful pastries. The yeast makes all the difference.

The kingdom of God is astonishing—to what shall we equate it? Only Jesus, the master storyteller, could craft metaphors so simple yet so majestic. Christ paints a picture with words about a place surpassing all imaginable expectations and powered by a mysterious life force.

I constantly meet people that feel mired in the mundane. Trapped in trivial daily routines, their lives feel empty. They fill their time with work, TV, hobbies, sports, entertainment, just about anything to occupy their minds. Jesus shows us through small, ordinary illustrations how amazing our lives can become.

Christ's followers hang on his every word as He expounds on the kingdom of God in verse 21, "It is like yeast that a woman took and mixed into a large amount of flour until it worked all through the dough." The kingdom is as common as making bread, as ordinary as dough, yet as transformational as yeast.

Baking bread requires a fistful of yeast kneaded into the dough. Composed of millions of microscopic organisms, yeast initiates tremendous activity. The little varmints eat the sugars, reproduce, and emit gases, causing the dough to rise. The life in the yeast transforms and enlarges the dough that is then baked into golden loaves.

The yeast shows us the potency of life resident in the kingdom of God. You may not see it, you may not feel it, but it is there working in the unseen realm, changing us into something more than we thought we could be. Sometimes we feel as dense and useless as unrisen dough. Yet, the life of the Spirit is kneading, rubbing, massaging us into something useful in God's hands.

What could Jesus mean by comparing the kingdom of God to yeast?

First, I believe Christ was pointing to the life-giving qualities of the Kingdom of God. Add yeast to lifeless flour and water and the yeast will grow in incalculable ways. Like yeast, the teaching of the Lord brings life and transformation. Share the Word of God with any receptive group of people, and they grow. Mysteriously, the yeast of God's presence and His word change you into a larger person of faith. The life of God in you transforms you. It is unstoppable, and it eventually achieves its purpose.

Ultimately, the yeast of the kingdom permeates every facet of our lives. When you allow God into your life in a meaningful way, you will rise and grow.

Morning on an American interstate. A caravan of large bucket trucks travels southward. There must be a hundred of them. Maybe more. These are utility workers.

Hurricane Ida plowed into Louisiana like a Peterbilt semi yesterday. These trucks are heading to ground zero to join the 25,000 other utility workers who are already in the Bayou State restoring power.

The trucks' running lights are on. Their hydraulic lift buckets wobble from highway speed.

The men and women behind the wheels are preparing for weeks of sleepless nights, mechanical failures, possible accidents, wet weather, convenience-store suppers, cheap hotels, and video calls home—provided there is cell service.

A little boy in the backseat of a passing minivan with Florida tags waves at one of the truck drivers. The lineman waves back.

The boy's mother cranes

forward. She mouths the words "Thank you" in hopes that the utility worker can read her lips.

He can. He replies with a thumbs up.

And the convoy of trucks never stops coming. One by one they come. And one by one they should be thanked.

I live on the Gulf Coast. Hurricanes are part of our life. When Opal hit, for instance, it



crippled us. And yet, amazingly, it only took 24 hours for hordes of electrical workers to arrive in our town and restore our power so we could all get back to watching daytime television.

The workers came from faroff places like Maryland, Texas, Ohio, or Pennsylvania.

My aunt was so grateful to the linemen working on her street that she brought them sandwiches each morning. Other neighborhood ladies made cookies and deviled eggs. Elderly Miss Elaine made her infamous Green Jello Salad of Death. I would have warned the lineworkers not to eat the stuff, but it was too late.

And I'll never forget when Hurricane Ivan smashed into our area a decade later. I was a newlywed, living in a one-bedroom apartment. Our building had no storm shutters, we were in a flood zone, emergency vehicle sirens blared, people screamed out for help, and I ran out of beer.

All anyone could do was cover their windows in duct tape and hide. Friends lost homes, cars, animals, trees. Ivan pommeled us like we'd insulted his mother.

Once again, the next morning, our little world was flooded not only with water, but with bucket trucks.

So yeah, whenever I see a parade of utility vehicles I get a little emotional. Namely, because these workers don't have to be doing what they're doing.

Utility crews have some of the most dangerous jobs in the world. Out of every 100,000 workers, 30 to 50 die. Some are victims of explosions. Others lose limbs or get burned. Electrical work is not for wimps. This type of labor is not a job, it's a calling.

My friend Chad's father is a retired lineman. Chad said he grew up going to too many funerals. His mother was always wondering if the next memorial service would be for his father.

"Whenever my dad would leave for storms, there was always that question of whether he'd come back to us in alive or in a box," Chad recalls.

When Hurricane Michael hit a few years ago, I was out of town. One afternoon my hotel TV showed the eye of the storm making landfall 33 miles from my front door. The next morning, the national news showed images of a decimated Panama City, which is located in the county adjacent to mine.

I couldn't believe what I was seeing on my screen. This was our Panama City. The same Panama City where we went shopping. The same Panama City where I once took Mary Herrington to ride roller coasters at Miracle Strip Amusement Park when she got food poisoning from a hot dog and ruined the interior of my '86 Ford.

Anyway, I left my hotel that morning and sped home. The only problem was, everyone else did, too. So I was stuck in a traffic jam stretching from the Panhandle to Seskatchewan. I sat in a cloud of exhaust for over six hours.

I will never forget when, at about midday, I saw orange

flashing lights in my rear view mirror. A long line of bucket trucks was on their way to my Gulf Coast home. Diesels roaring. Earth rumbling. Cars pulled to the shoulder to let them pass.

It nearly made me cry.

I remember passing one particular truck in traffic later that afternoon. The driver was young, his window was rolled down. He was sunburned and as lean as a two-by-four. Music blared on his stereo. He spit into a Mountain Dew bottle.

At a red light, I rolled down my window and asked where he was from.

But he couldn't hear me, his diesel engine was rumbling too loud. The young man just tapped his ear to indicate that I wasn't getting through. So I shouted two familiar words of gratitude as loud as I could.

And it's funny, even after all these years I find myself hoping this nameless young man could somehow read my lips.


But more importantly, I hope all utility workers in this country know how sincerely I am saying those same two words right now.
