As a child growing up in Grayton Beach in the 80s, Jennifer Steele never dreamed she'd one day become the director of a non-profit that would help cultivate the arts in our region. She just knew she loved visiting the little art shop of local Grayton Beach artist Susan Foster where she would buy postcards and photos. Susan's gallery was her first experience with fine art and as much a part of young Jennifer's childhood memories as Grayton Beach itself.

Susan, along with another local Jan Clarke, dreamed of having an art festival with other local artists to help bring the community together to provide a sense of community the art world provides. Susan and Jan began mentioning their arts festival idea to other locals such as Van Ness Butler, and the buzz began with

talking excitedly. The Walton

County Tourist Development

Council, who also adminis-

tered the festival's first TDC

grant, recommended they

schedule the event during a

slower time of year.

The rest is history. In 1989, with a small community gathering, the first Grayton Beach Fine Arts Festival, now called ArtsQuest, was born! Early organizers chose Mother's

Many locals, all volunteers and names you might still recognize today, were involved in this first endeavor including Jeff Ellis, Chris and Manny Chavez, Malcolm Patterson, Paul Digiamico, Doug Krumel, Nicky Frye, Jack Houston, Hilda Mc-Donald, Kitty Tyler and several more. Through the years, it evolved into a weekend event and has moved to various locations such as Eden State Gardens, Seaside and The Village of Baytowne Wharf to accommodate its growth.

In the meantime, Jennifer was growing up and witnessing it all happen in her hometown. Today, 34 years since the festival's inception, Jennifer is the Cultural Arts Alliance (CAA) Executive Director and ArtsQuest is one of the largest juried art shows in the region bringing in thousands of attendees from all over. Having evolved into much more than a community gathering, in a VIE Magazine article, Jennifer describes ArtsQuest as "an intricate and beautifully detailed tapestry, woven over the years by locals tooled with varying backgrounds, resources and talents."

Eventually, realizing the need for a non-profit organization to help cultivate the arts in Walton County, the CAA was formed as the official local arts agency. Its vision is to continue to make Walton County a home and destination for cultural and artistic excellence where lives are enriched, the economy is stimulated and the community is strengthened through the arts. It offers support, connection and access opportunities for all forms of art, every variety of maker, all levels of learners, and especially, art lovers all throughout the year.

Through sponsorships, advocacy, funding and educational programs, the CAA directly connects people to all things art related. ArtsQuest was the first event the CAA ever produced and has truly become a beloved CAA signature event — one of the most significant ways CAA is able to continue to fulfill its mission. It bridges the gap for those who either lack access to the arts or could uniquely benefit from the experience.

Each year, the CAA produces popular, large-scale events,

including the 30A Songwriters Festival, Valentine Tour of Homes, ArtsQuest Fine Arts Festival and the Flutterby Children's Arts Festival; operates The Foster Gallery, a local artist collective showcasing art works from more than 30 local artists in a quarterly rotation; and also

presents over 250 exciting and educational art workshops in its offices at the Bayou Arts Center. Further, the CAA recently partnered with the South Walton Artificial Reef Association to launch the nation's first permanent Underwater Museum of Art off the coast of Grayton Beach State Park. Visit umafl. org to learn more about this Art in Public Spaces program that is expanding the county's artificial reef system. The CAA also provides much-needed arts funding through its Art For All grant program to Walton County's teachers, students, artists and arts organizations.

Still a Mother's Day weekend tradition, this year's ArtsQuest, May 7 and 8, is being hosted by Grand Boulevard at Sandestin and features exhibiting national, regional and local artists as well as art workshops and live art demonstrations. With continuing support from Visit South Walton and additional support from the Florida Department of State, Division of Arts & Culture and Emerald Coast Magazine, the festival will provide an opportunity to view and purchase original art from more than 100 artists who convene each year from throughout the U.S. They will display their original artwork in various mediums including, but not limited to, ceramics, glass, oil and acrylics, photography, sculpture, metal and wood. They will also compete for awards and cash prizes totaling \$10,000. Further, the festival will offer heritage art demonstrations, a CAA member artist exhibit, a Walton County student exhibit, continuous live music and entertainment and "ImagiNation: where kids rule." A full cash bar will be available throughout the weekend in Grand Park.

You will find this year's featured artist, Orestes Barrios Marañón, who was also the 2021 ArtsQuest 'Best in Show' winner, at the event. His featured piece, "Fable In Eden," is

Cherry Trees that bloom in the middle of March for about 10 days. During this period, Macon is called the pinkest city in the world. At this time, Macon celebrates an event called the International Cherry Blossom Festival. Unfortunately, our visit was about a week too late to see the trees in bloom.

The history of the cherry trees began in 1949. A native of Macon, William A. Fickling, discovered a unique and unrecognized tree blooming in his yard. Later, while visiting Washington, D.C., he realized, seeing the same type of tree there, that it was a Yoshino Cherry Tree.

He and his family began distributing the tree throughout Macon, and well, the rest is history!

Tradition has it that the tree symbolizes eternity and the blossoms speak of renewal and new beginnings. Because of the blossom's short duration, they represent the briefness of life on earth. It seems fitting that the death and resurrection of Christ is celebrated in the spring of each year. The death of Jesus was like a bitter winter storm to all those who were close to Him. Hope Squad: Positive Mental Health for Our Youth

Suicide is the second leading cause of death among young people ages 10-24. According to the Florida Department of Vital Statistics, suicide was the third leading cause of death for individuals ages 5 to 14 in 2020.

Northwest Florida, from Walton to Escambia Counties, combined in 2018-2020, falls in the top five in youth suicides per 100,000 population for the State of Florida. It is time for our communities to come together on this topic and be aware of the challenges we face in keeping our kids safe.

The Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), a statewide school-based survey of Florida's public high school students, showed that 39.3% of high school students felt sad or hopeless. 17.7% seriously considered attempting suicide, 13.8% made a suicide plan and 8.9% attempted suicide.

Fortunately, there's the Hope

Squad, part of United for a Good Cause, a local 501(c) (3) charitable organization. United for a Good Cause is the lead entity that helps secure funding for and implements Hope Squad in our region's schools.

In 2019 after seeing the concerning statistics for our region, United for a Good Cause, Inc. took on the task of raising the money to bring the Hope Squad program to this region. Thanks to many area businesses like Eglin Federal Credit Union, United Way Emerald Coast, Okaloosa Cares Grant, Bit-Wizards, Emerald Coast Harley Davidson, and organizations like Impact 100, Sunday's Child, 100 Women Who Care, Niceville Strong, The Tatissa Foundation and numerous smaller donors, funding has been made possible to start a Hope Squad program in most elementary and secondary schools in Okaloosa and Walton School Districts and others over



the next year

According to United for a Good Cause, Inc. Executive Director Peggy Brockman, "We have 18 schools that currently have their Hope Squad program in various stages of implementation. Fifteen of those are in Okaloosa County School District, one in Santa Rosa and two in Escambia County. Others will be onboarding their programs over the next year. We still have a long way to go, but we are moving forward in spite of a global pandemic slowing the process. Students are finding hope again and are learning that it is ok to speak up and seek help. 75% of

young people will tell a peer before harming themselves but will not go to an adult. That is why the peer-to-peer program is so successful across the country."

Recently, four regional "Community Conversation" meetings regarding the mental health of our youth were held—locally at Choctawhatchee and Crestview High Schools and Pensacola State College Milton and Pensacola Campuses.

Dr. Greg A. Hudnall, founder and Executive Director of HOPE4UTAH and creator of the Hope Squad peer-to-peer suicide prevention program, led the conversations. He has championed suicide prevention in schools and communities for more than 20 years. His expertise is not only sought after locally, but also nationally and internationally at the highest levels of government.

In addition, the seventh annual Youth Leadership Con-

ference took place at Niceville High School on March 5th and encouraged area 7th-12th grade students in public, private or homeschools to attend. It specifically was designed to help these students cultivate leadership skills, empower them with tools and resources, and inspire them to live and model civic action in the community while helping them discover their purpose and potential. The conference brought together students and youth from throughout the region that are interested in leadership—a great number already actively participating within the Hope Squad Peer-to-Peer Suicide Prevention Program.



Fire Truck Pull to Benefit Twin Cities Pavilion

Multiple community organizations are teaming up to complete fundraising for a major project at Twin Cities Pavilion (TCP). "You could say we are 'all pulling together' to sponsor a fire truck pulling contest on April 23 at 3rd Planet Brewing," said Bob Hoffman, coordinator of the team effort that will address safety and cosmetic issues at the front entrance area at TCP. "We're looking for any community group or business

willing to come out and have some fun to help the residents of TCP."

The Rotary Clubs of Mid-Bay Bridge, Niceville/Valparaiso, Destin and Fort Walton Beach, along with the Knights of Columbus from Christ Our Redeemer and Holy Name Catholic churches are supporting the effort with donations, planning and staffing. Also helping with donations and staff are the Okaloosa County Fire-Rescue Organization, Valparaiso Realty and Dynamic Software Solutions.

There will be two competitions—the Open Division for the more serious competitors to show their stuff. A team consists of 10 people who pull a fire truck 15 feet one time, and the best time wins. The \$200 per team entry fee all goes to the

"In the Business Division, any group can enter. They will get their name or logo on T-shirts we're making for competitors," says Bob. "This could include businesses, churches, non-profits or even neighborhoods." The \$250 entry fee helps the Pavilion and offsets the cost of the event.

Teams can register by scanning the QR code on flyers being distributed or visiting the Facebook pages and website of the organizations listed above, such as Mid-Bay Bridge Rotary.

The TCP project involves

refurbishing the entrance area, which is also used by residents for sitting and relaxing outdoors.

The event will begin with team check-in at noon. Competition begins start at 1 p.m. There will be two food trucks, raffles and music





On June 24, 2021, Champlain Towers South in Surfside, Florida, suffered a collapse of the east wing, killing 98 people. This building was constructed in 1981 with 136 units. Although building failures of this nature in the U.S. are seldom seen, it is important to examine what happened to prevent similar collapses in the future.

The investigators are likely to uncover defects in the original design and construction. Settlement of the site may also be a contributing factor, as may have been the construction of an adjacent development. None of these were under the control of the board. However, there is also clear evidence from the site that some factors within the board's control are likely culprits. The structural deterioration was readily visible in some areas, even to a lay-person and this failure could have been delayed.

The current condo laws in Florida places fiduciary responsibilities on Unit Owners and

Condominium Insurance and the Value of a Customized Unit Owners Policy

Board Members. It is very important to understand the requirements and design your policy to maximize your condo insurance program protection whether used as your primary, secondary residence or rental. And make sure your packages include Hurricane/Wind coverages and flood insurance as well.

Because the association is responsible for maintaining and insuring the exterior of the building (shell), Condo Unit Owners need coverage for the replacement cost of Structural Elements With**in** – from the paint in, including flooring, fixtures, cabinets, builtin appliances, and more. This coverage amount is arrived at by calculating the cost per square foot to rebuild multiplied by the square footage of the unit. Sometimes the developer will provide this number and typically the range starts at \$60 per square foot, and depending on the quality of construction, that can go up significantly. Your condo policy should always include Special Coverage A. This is broader coverage, changing the policy from a named peril to an open peril

Another important coverage to consider is **Personal Proper**-

ty coverage which is replacement cost on furniture, accessories, clothing, appliances, electronics, and other valuables, basically anything that's not attached. Replacement cost insurance is defined as the cost to replace and/or repair the building with materials of like kind and quality following a loss. If policyholders have replacement cost insurance, they may receive advance payments for the depreciated value for furniture, televisions, clothing and other household items.

Loss of Use/Loss of Rents is an important feature as well. Depending on the carrier, they may offer loss of use but not loss of rent. If your unit is damaged and you can't use it for a period of time, you may be able to collect under loss of use if it's your primary or secondary residence. If you're losing out on rental income, check your policy to see if you have the Loss of Rents coverage. You should always make sure you have the correct policy for the right risk.

Loss Assessment is another important coverage on condo policies that Florida law requires. Its purpose is to pay up to your loss assessment coverage amount (typically \$2,000) for an assessment levied by the association

for covered losses to the common elements. An example of this coverage coming into play was when Hurricane Michael knocked down most of the fencing and damaged the roofs of an administration building and conference center that was covered under the master policy. Because these perils were covered under the association's policy, they had the option to assess each condo owner to help re-coup their out-of-pocket expense.

Flood coverage, which is typically a separate policy, is also important. The unit owner should carry flood insurance even if their unit is not on the ground floor. Some condo associations purchase a master program through the National Flood Insurance Program called the RCBAP (residential condominium building association policy). This policy does cover many of the interior build-out items for a unit owner, but it does not cover the personal property. So, does the unit owner still need their own condo flood policy? David Thompson, with the FAIA (Florida Association of Insurance Agents) says this: "If there is no RCBAP in place the unit owner needs his own primary flood coverage. If the RCBAP has a large deductible and the unit owner sustained building damage, then their [flood] policy will respond. Should the unit owner be assessed by the association for a flood loss, the unit owner's policy will cover the loss assessment up to their building limit with no deductible. This alone is a compelling reason for all condo unit owners to have their own building flood coverage."

Liability and Mold and Water Backup, which are also important coverages on condo policies should be properly structured. And if you rent your unit, always consider excess of higher limits of liability protection. The bottom line is this - when it comes to condo insurance policies the average consumer isn't aware of their exposures and responsibilities. You should always talk to an experienced insurance agent so you can make the best coverage decisions for your situation.





Education News

Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis recently announced groundbreaking legislation that eliminates the high-stakes Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) test and replaces it with progress monitoring. Senate Bill 1048, sponsored by Senator Manny Diaz, Jr. and Representative Rene Plasencia, makes Florida the first state in the nation to transition fully to progress-monitoring for school accountability. Starting with the 2022-2023 school year, Florida students will have three short check-ins instead of multi-day, end-of-year, high-stakes tests for English Language Arts and Mathematics. This new system of testing will benefit students, teachers and parents by allowing for informed instruction in a timely manner, that can be tailored to each student's individual needs.

Northwest Florida State College (NWFSC) was recently named a 2022-23 Military Friendly School with a Gold Distinction by MilitaryFriendly.com. Every year, institutions

earning the Military Friendly School designation are evaluated using public data sources and responses from a proprietary survey. Final ratings are calculated by combining the institution's survey scores with the institution's ability to meet minimum thresholds for student retention, graduation, job placement, loan repayment, and loan default rates for student veterans. Methodology, criteria, and weightings are determined with input from the Military Friendly Advisory Council of independent leaders in the higher education and military recruitment community. The gold-level distinction is awarded to schools that score within 10% of the 10th best school in their category. These schools are considered to be setting the example with their programs and initiatives. An Area Rug Can "Make or Break" Your Room!

Yes, you read that right. There are so many things to consider when selecting the perfect rug for your space. Choosing the right style, size, shape and material for your rug will create a statement. Selecting the wrong rug is too easy with so many choices available. Below are a few tips to help guide YOU in purchasing the perfect rug.

Style:

When selecting a patterned rug, consider how the pattern will play with your furniture. If the rug design has a focal point, make sure it doesn't get covered up with heavy furniture. If the rug has a repetitive pattern placement of your furniture won't cause you to visually miss the design.

Size & Shape:

Bigger is Better, but NOT too big! A few inches can make a big difference between the rug pulling the room together or making it feel disconnected. The size of your room and furniture layout will determine which rug size and shape will work best for your space. **Pro Tip:** Typically, round rugs work great in a dining room under a round dining table and rectangular rugs work best in a square or rectangular room.

Living Room – There are several layouts you can use, but my favorite is allowing all of the furniture legs to rest on the rug with a minimum of at least 6" of the rug extending past the furniture. This layout, requires a large rug and is the best choice for anchoring an open-space concept with floating furniture.

Dining Room – Again, I recommend allowing all of the furniture legs to rest on the rug. This layout looks best and is ideal for safety purposes. The rug in this room should extend at least 24" but not more than 36" beyond all ends of the ta-

ble. The 24"-36" allows for the chair to remain on the rug when pushed back. Pro Tip: Remember to include the size of your table when the extensions/leaves are in use.

Bedroom – Your bed should be both the focal point of the room and the base for your rug. My favorite is the same as above, all furniture legs on the rug. This includes your night-stands and bench at the foot of the bed, but does not include the dressers or other pieces of furniture in the bedroom. The rug should extend a minimum of 18"-24" past the edge of your bed/nightstand. If space allows, avoid having the rug flowing into the main walking area(s).

If you want to see more of your flooring, use a smaller rug, allowing only 2/3 of the bed to sit on the rug. This option still needs 18"-24" of the rug to extend on each side and beyond the foot of the bed. **Pro Tip:** An 8'x10' rug works best for a queen bed and a 9'x12' for a king.

Foyer/Entryway - It's best to let the shape of this space determine the choice of a round, rectangular or runner. The width of your front door can be used as a baseline for how wide your rug should be. Pro Tip: Make sure the pile of the rug isn't to high so the front door can open properly. Also, don't forget your rug pad. It will help prevent your rug from sliding around.

Material:

There is a broad selection of area rugs made from wool, synthetic, sisal and grass to name a few. Consider which material is right for your lifestyle based on the below.

Wool – A wool rug combines comfort and durability, but they also absorb humidity and can fade in the sun.

Synthetic – A synthetic rug offers a large variety of colors and patterns. They stand up to heavy traffic and are often pre-treated to avoid stains and are more affordable.

Sisal – Sisal rugs are extremely durable and made of natural fibers. They work well in the high traffic areas of your home but they are stiff compared to wool rugs.







choice. Throughout the process, you find yourself engrossed in the experience.



Off the Hook: Spring Fishing

We are loving this warm weather and the fish are, too! We've had some rough waters this month, but overall the bite has been decent. The Choctawhatchee Bay is a bit slow this time of year, but the Gulf action has been picking up.

March 1st kicked off Trigger-fish season, which many offshore anglers were excited for. In our area, Triggerfish are normally found nearshore and offshore, hanging around artificial reefs and natural bottoms, in depths between 50 to 300 feet. They share the same habitat as Red Snapper and Gag Grouper. So, catching a Triggerfish is usually a sign that additional species are below as well.

The average size of the Triggerfish ranges from 12 inches to 20 inches, with females growing larger. They are a distinctive gray in color and have the ability to change their color while swimming in open waters. The



mouth is small but mighty, containing a set of sharp teeth even the most experienced anglers don't want to mess with. Along with the teeth, Triggerfish have a strong jaw that can make a hook difficult to set.

We like to call them Bait Stealers – which is exactly what they like to do. Triggerfish are aggressive feeders; a plus if you've set out to catch them specifically, but a con if you were

trying to reach the Red Snapper or Grouper they hang around with. Shrimp and any sort of cut bait on a circle hook will do the trick as they typically chase anything they perceive as being food. Catch and keep them legally until May 1.

Also, in April, the Cobia will begin their migration through our area with the warmer water temps. They are best found by sight fishing, running the lengths of the beaches until you spot one, or around buoys, navigational markers, structures or other large fish where they feel safe. An average Cobia is 20-40 lbs., with a 60 lb. fish considered a large catch.

Cobia put up a great fight

and are often compared to or mistaken for a shark once they hit the line and take off. You can keep Cobia year-round, with a size minimum of 33" and 2 per boat. They are a tasty, white meat fish with a hint of lemon flavor -great as grilled steaks. This is a season our local anglers look forward to year round!

One million registered Florida recreational vessels

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) today announced that Florida continues to lead the nation and has passed the mark of 1 million registered recreational vessels across the state. Florida, with its great year-round weather and plenty of access to fresh and salt water, is the "Boating Capital of the World." With more people calling Florida home and more vessels on the water, it's important that resi-

dents and visitors practice safe boating.

The top five counties for vessel registration in Florida are Miami-Dade (74,622), Pinellas (53,867), Lee (50,304), Broward (47,741) and Hillsborough (41,495).

"Crossing the million mark just confirms what we always knew - Florida is the top state for boaters. And with more boats on the water, we want to spread the word about boating safety to both residents and visitors enjoying Florida's yearround boating season," said Maj. Rob Beaton, Boating and Waterways Section Leader. "A safe day while boating is a great day. Nothing can ruin a fun and memorable experience on the water faster than a boating accident."

Boaters are encouraged to wear their life jackets, maintain 360-degree awareness and know the dangers (and penalties) for operating a vessel while impaired.

Saltwater Fishing Reopenings in the Gulf

Gray triggerfish reopened in Gulf state and federal waters to recreational harvest on March 1. If you plan to fish for gray triggerfish in state or federal waters from a private recreational vessel, you must sign up as a State Reef Fish Angler (annual renewal is required). To learn more, visit MyFWC.com/Marine and click on "Recreational Regulations" and "State Reef Fish Survey" under "Reef Fish." Sign up today at GoOutdoorsFlorida.com.

Spotted seatrout reopened in the Western Panhandle Management Region, which includes all state and federal waters from Escambia County through the portion of Gulf County west of 85 degrees, 13.76 minutes west longitude but NOT including Indian Pass/Indian Lagoon.

Snook reopened in some Gulf waters, including Escambia County through State Road 64 in Manatee County, and waters south of Gordon Pass in Collier County through Monroe County (also includes Everglades National Park).

Snook remains catch-andrelease only in state waters from State Road 64 in Manatee County south through Gordon Pass in Collier County through Aug. 31, 2022.

Nets on the Beach?

If you've been getting out to the public beach lately, you might have seen poles and nets that extend from the shoreline out into the water and wondered what it was and what it's doing there. It's actually a NuShore beach renourishment project facilitated by Okaloosa Countyporous "groynes" or nets in the form of fencing to capture sand to widen the beach and extend the shoreline seaward. Having kicked off in November 2021, this "fencing" results in sand accumulation that widens the beach and extends the shoreline seaward, thereby renourishing the beaches and increasing coastal resiliency to storms and other erosive events. Designed to help restore Okaloosa County beaches where steady erosion and beach loss has already occurred, "This system actually slows down the sand that may be suspended in the water column and allows it to accumulate within the system," said Alex Fogg, Coastal Resource Manager for Okaloosa County, in

It's Turtle and Shorebird Nesting Season!

Each spring and summer, sea turtles, shorebirds and seabirds nest on our local beaches. Because our shorelines are critical for sea turtle and waterbird nesting, beachgoers can make a big difference in helping them.

Our area had a successful green sea turtle nest hatch early in the morning on October 19, 2021! Out of 93 eggs, 90 of them hatched, giving the nest a 96.8% hatch success. In November 2021, Coastal Resources and Gulfarium staff released 12 sea turtle hatchlings (6 loggerhead, 6 green) 50 miles offshore in the Gulf of Mexico.

Destin-Fort Walton Beach and the Gulfarium are partnering to host educational turtle talks. The talks take guests on a behind-the-scenes tour of the Gulfarium's C.A.R.E. Center to share information about sea turtle nesting habits and demonstrate a mock intake of an injured sea turtle. For additional information, visit destinfwb.com/explore/ecotourism-hotspots/turtles

Keep your distance! Getting too close (50 feet or less) to nesting sea turtles can cause them to leave the beach before they complete nesting. Remember, it is illegal to harm or disturb nesting sea turtles and their nests, eggs and hatchlings. Not keeping enough space from nesting shorebirds, seabirds and wading birds can cause them to flush from their breeding sites, leaving vulnerable eggs and chicks exposed to the elements and predators. Egg temperatures can increase to lethal levels after just a few minutes of direct sun exposure. Shorebirds and seabirds nest in shallow scrapes in the sand and their eggs and chicks are well-camouflaged,



making them vulnerable to being stepped on unless people look out for them and avoid walking though flocks of birds. As a general rule, it is best to keep at least 300 feet from nesting birds and to avoid walking through flocks of birds or entering posted areas.

Stash the trash! Obstacles on the beach can prevent sea turtles from nesting as they crawl from the water, across the sand, to lay

their eggs. Trash and other obstacles can also prevent sea turtle hatchlings from reaching the water once they emerge from their nests. Food scraps attract predators, such as raccoons and crows, that can prey on sea turtle hatchlings, shorebird eggs and chicks. Litter on beaches can entangle sea turtles, birds and other wildlife. Beachgoers can help our native wildlife by properly disposing of all trash, filling in human-made holes in the sand, and removing boats, beach toys and furniture from the beach before sunset. Fishing line can be deadly to sea turtles, waterbirds and other wildlife, so be sure to dispose of it properly. To find a monofilament recycling station near you, visit mrrp.MyFWC.com.

Lights out! Any lighting can misdirect and disturb nesting sea turtles and their hatchlings, leading them away from the ocean and toward potential danger, so beachgoers should avoid using flashlights or cellphones on the beach at night. Anyone living along or visiting Florida beaches can do their part by turning out lights or closing curtains after dark to ensure nesting turtles are not disturbed as they come ashore, and hatchlings will not become disoriented when they emerge from their nests. If lighting could still be visible from the beach, be sure it is long, low and shielded.

a YouTube video. "It's a more cost-effective method of building back the beaches here."

Each groyne is spaced every 100 feet along the beach and extends roughly 150 feet seaward from the mean high waterline—each system covering 1,500 feet of beach.

Funded by tourism development dollars, it will likely be taken down soon before turtle season and more visitors hit the beach.

Ranked #1 in her senior class of nearly 500 students, Niceville High School senior Page Dolloff, a two-sport athlete (swimming and tennis), is the 2022 Female Scholastic Award Winner. To win is an even greater accomplishment," said Page. "I couldn't have done it without all my supporting teammates, coaches and parents. Spring Into Fitness

It's spring and not too late to get into fitness. With spring comes more sunshine, warmer weather and the urge to wear less... like tank tops, shorts, sleeveless dresses and swimsuits. So, if you messed up on New Year's resolutions, don't let that hold you back or feel like you have to wait another year to "start." There IS no better time than the present. And the "present" is any day that has a beginning and an end. Knowing what to do makes that hurdle less intimidating. First: Figure out your goals.

According to the Cambridge Dictionary, fitness is "the condition of being physically strong and healthy...usually through exercise and nutrition." Exercise can achieve several outcomes such as, strength, flexibility, cardiovascular endurance, strength endurance, and power/speed. Everyday life calls for a combination of these. If you begin exercising you will be more "fit" to live LIFE. It's actually essential and those that don't exercise choose to create unnecessary obstacles for themselves due to fatigue, tightness, illness and weak-

A basic fitness lifestyle will fo-

cus on being healthy through a consistent routine of cross-training to achieve a mixture of the above outcomes. An example of cross-training can be rotating through two days of strength training, two days of yoga or Pilates, and two days of sports, swimming, cycling or jogging. The different modalities of exercise will give you different outcomes and the consistency will offer you the improvement overall. Any consistent activity, along with a nutritious and reasonable diet, will help you lose weight if that is your goal. But having strong muscles through strength training will raise your metabolism, thus helping your body burn more calories, even at rest. So, strength training is an important key component to being fit.

All weight bearing exercises, whether it be bodyweight (i.e. yoga/Pilates) or training with free-weights or machines, help build strong bones. This is so very important and the benefits are accumulative. The earlier you start the stronger your bones will be; so, don't wait until a doctor tells you that you have to. Please don't worry about getting bulky from weight training. Most likely, if you feel you are bulky while weight training, you probably have excess fat covering your muscles. It's so extremely difficult to grow big muscles, just ask any bodybuilder. They are extremely dedicated to THE GOAL of building as big of muscles as possible and it does not happen overnight. Your muscles draw in tighter to your skeletal system when you tone and strengthen them. They will begin to take on their shape due to their functional purpose.

For instance, the biceps are small at the insertion at the shoulder and small at the attachment of the inside of the elbow, yet larger in the middle. Once fat is removed, you will see that definition and the arm, on most individuals, will look lean and

slender. Understand, most fat is "subcutaneous," meaning it is just under the skin. So, your body should have this order: bone, muscle, fat, then skin. You can imagine that while you begin strength training, any layer of fat will look more prominent, because it's closer to the skin. That's why a moderate diet helps in your efforts if you give your efforts the deserved time your body needs. In other words, don't give up! Like I have said before, "be active." Just get moving! All movement plays a role in your fitness level.

There seems to be a misconception that testicles are supposed to work forever while ovaries go through menopause. Unfortunately, this is not true. April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month

National abuse statistics are alarming. According to the National Children's Alliance, the national association and accrediting body for Children's Advocacy Centers, nearly 700,000 children are abused in the U.S. annually. Neglect is the most common form of maltreatment with 75% suffering from neglect,

17.2% from physical abuse, and 8.4% from sexual abuse. About 4 out of 5 abusers are the child victim's parents.

Inflammation is both good and bad. When the body is invaded by foreign bacteria, viruses, chemicals, plant pollen, etc. or an injury occurs, white blood cells release specialized proteins into our blood and tissues to clean up debris, fight infection and heal damaged tissues. This raises our blood flow, and can cause red-

ness, warmth and swelling.

Acute inflammation is short lived such as when we get a cut or abrasion, broken bone, etc. This type of inflammation is beneficial and necessary. However, when this acute inflammatory response fails to shut off and becomes chronic it wreaks havoc in our bodies.

Chronic inflammation can begin to break down healthy tissue and over time can prematurely age us, damage our DNA and keep us from feeling our best. Issues like allergies, asthma, arthritis, sinusitis, tendonitis, dermatitis, etc. can begin to surface.

Underlying every chronic disease condition is inflammation. It contributes to the onset of cancer, heart disease, type 2 diabetes, asthma, arthritis, cog-

nitive decline, dementia including Alzheimers, auto-immune disorders (when immune system activates inside the body when there are no invaders or injury thereby causing injury) such as celiac disease, rheumatoid arthritis, Hashimoto's thyroiditis, etc.

When dealing with chronic inflammation we can experience symptoms such as fatigue, body pain, depression, anxiety, gastro-intestinal complications (diaherrea/constipation), weight gain or loss, or persistent infections.

What can we do to help our body reduce this cycle?

Exercise. Get up and walk, stretch and 'just move' your body.

Eat a Mediterranean diet. (For a list of foods to incorporate this type of diet into your lifestyle email succeed.hdhl@gmail.com with Med Diet List in the Subject line.)

Decrease Stress. None of us can escape stress but we can learn to recognize and control it. Deep breathing exercises can stop the stress response and calm us down and this can be done anywhere at any time.

Turn off the TV! Listen to your favorite music, sit outside, read a good book, spend time with friends.

Consume a highquality sup-

plement containing anti-inflammatory ingredients in their correct forms and amounts (fish oil, lipoid acid, curcumin, ginger, garlic, cayenne, certain mushrooms, etc.).

Avoid processed foods. If it has an ingredient list it has been processed. When purchasing these foods look for the package with the least ingredients and avoid colorings, harmful preservatives such as BHS and BHT, etc.

Be aware of what you put on your skin. ewg.org is a great resource to look up ingredients and how they are rated (toxicity level).



Yes, the first washing machine, a simple tub and ridged board, was used to wash clothes. Now, fast forward 225 years and some of you knew who our second president was and some of you knew the date of our first commissioned Navy ship. I'm going out on a limb and guessing no one knew when the first washing machine was invented. But, we all use one today and it has become an appliance used as often as several days a week or several times a month. So, what do washers and dryers have to do with energy savings? Washers and dryers are among the costliest appliances to operate; so, it's worth taking steps to reduce energy use while using

Here are some things you can do to save in the laundry room and reduce wear and tear on clothes:

Wash with cold water.

Using cold water instead of hot can cut a load's energy use by more than in half. Many detergents clean just as well in cold as they do in warm or hot. So, save the hot water for your show-

Wash full loads.

Your washer will use about the same amount of energy no matter the size of the load. So,

Dry right-sized loads for your machine.

If the dryer is too full or too small, it will take longer for the clothes to dry. You spend more per item when running the dryer to only dry a few things.

Use dryer balls.

Wool or rubber dryer balls will help separate your clothes and get more air to them, cutting drying time. The wool balls are said to absorb some moisture, further cutting drying time.

Switch loads while the dryer is warm.

This will allow you to use the remaining heat inside of the dryer for the next cycle.

Clean the lint filter on the dryer.

The dryer will run more efficiently and safely. If you use dryer sheets, scrub the filter once a month with a toothbrush to remove film buildup that can reduce air circulation.

Use the high-speed or extended spin cycle in the washer.

This will remove as much moisture as possible before drying, reducing your drying time and the wear on your clothes from the high heat of the dryer. **Use lower heat settings**

in the dryer.

Even if the drying cycle is longer, you'll use less energy and be less likely to over-dry your

Dry towels and heavier cottons separately from lighter-weight clothes.

You'll spend less time drying the lighter-weight clothes. **Check with your utility** company on time of use

Utility companies offer reduced kWh rates every day called off peak times, almost by half. Check with your utility company when off peak hours are and use high demand appliances at those times: washers and dryers, pool pumps, dishwashers and sprinkler pumps, during those times, saving you money.





Will Money Become Scarce Again?

It seems that these days everywhere you go there is a shortage of service, a shortage of product or a shortage of labor, or people to help you. Americans have never been in stronger financial shape, savings have never been higher, and it seems like jobs have never been so plentiful. The jobless claims number just reported this week shows the lowest number of claims since 1969 (of course the labor market and population are much larger now). Americans are flush with cash more than ever before. And that has shown up in housing prices, stock prices (in 2020 and 2021) and other asset prices except perhaps for investment grade bonds.

Inflation is a much bigger consideration in investing today than it has been in past decades.

The Federal Reserve and the federal government applied massive stimulus and relief going back almost two years ago as America and the world plunged into the pandemic. Almost 25 million jobs suddenly went away. Restaurants and businesses across the land had to close until further notice. That massive stimulus came in two forms: 1) new spending bills passed and signed by the President and 2) the lowering of interest rates and the buying of Treasuries and mortgage backed (and other) bonds by the Federal Reserve. The latter unleashed almost \$5 trillion dollars of new money into the financial system. That more than doubled what the Fed had done in history to date. And the Fed "printed" about 30% of all money created in the US for over the past 200 years in that short two-year time. That eventually (adding to



the supply chain problems) unleashed monetary inflation: Too many dollars chasing suddenly fewer goods and services. When considering an investment, we encourage individuals to look at the real rate of return (after inflation) as they make their evaluation.

The Fed is acting.

Now the Fed is, very carefully, moving to address inflation and has raised its shortest-term rate. known as the Federal Funds rate from 0% to .25%. That is also known as the overnight rate. Banks are an immediate benefactor of this because any funds they park overnight with the Fed start receiving this, vs zero or close to zero. Investors are also seeing an immediate benefit as the yields on money market funds have also increased. We therefore continue to be encouraged by long term opportunities in the banking industry, which is part of the Financial sector of the S&P 500. We think that clients should consider the top 40 largest banks (measured in terms of total deposits) in particular.

The Fed's balance sheet

The greater impact, we believe, on inflation, and asset prices of all kinds, will be when the Fed begins to reduce the size of its approximately \$9 trillion balance sheet. We feel that has much more impact as it makes money scarcer. The Fed is being, in our opinion, very practical and tactical as it tries to slow the rate of inflation without harming this very strong economy. With the Fed not competing to buy Treasuries and mortgage-backed securities, that could mean less price support and yields could continue to rise. Not good for bond prices but could help slow the rate of inflation. The Fed has indicated that action on the balance sheet could come by May or by sum-

The question becomes, will those two major components increase by the same amount in 2022? We don't think so. We think money will slowly become scarcer and that will mean a lowering of prices for just about everything. We do believe inflation will range from 3-5% by year's end.



Sean of the South: Easter

A few years ago, I attended my first Catholic mass in a busy church outside Birmingham. It was Easter Sunday. I sat in the nosebleed section.

People greeted me with the words, "He's risen."

And because I was not raised under a rock, I answered with: "He's risen indeed."

I was not reared Catholic. I was born into a fundamentalist family with a mother who sometimes prayed in tongues over our meatloaf.

But after my father died, I learned that he had been raised Catholic. He went to Catholic school, he played Catholic baseball.

He didn't talk about it. I never knew that version of him.

All I knew was a man who did not dance at wedding receptions for fear the pastor would catch him.

There in the Catholic cathedral, the priest announced, "He is risen."

"He's risen indeed," said the congregation.

I was an outsider in the room.

The priest recited the Liturgy of the Eucharist, people formed a single-file line to drink out of a chalice.

Easter Sundays in my family were nothing like this. My father was an usher at our little church. He'd stand by the front door and hand out bulletins that advertised upcoming Baptist church events.

For example:

—Thursday fundraiser, dinner on the grounds. Bring a covered dish.

—Young men's Bible study, 6 P.M. Bring a covered dish.

—Women's Sunday school class is holding an upcoming prayer vigil against beer. Bring a congealed salad.

—Men's group is recruiting for its annual mission trip to Bilovi

On Easter, my father always gave folded bulletins to those approaching. He would say, "He is Risen."

And any Baptist worth his salt would answer with, "He's risen indeed."

Most who attended our church on Easter were only visitors. They came twice per year. My father called them "nosebleed Baptists."

I never heard anyone else use that term. I asked my father what this meant.

"Well," he said. "Some fans only come to games once a year and sit in the nosebleed section. And other fans never miss a ballgame, even when the pitcher stinks." "Which ones are we?" I asked.

"You've heard our new preacher, you tell me."

Our preacher delivered fiery sermons. He would remove his jacket and preach to heartless sinners, drunks, and those who danced at wedding receptions.

The church services of my youth were lengthy. Someone in the congregation would either faint from low blood sugar, or be suddenly overcome with the spirit of narcolepsy.

But this Catholic business was different. Mass was foreign to me. It was exoctic, and beautiful.

All my life, my father refused to step foot in a Catholic church. And he wouldn't even talk about it.

But then, there was that one time.

On the way home from a Boy Scout meeting, he pulled into a Catholic church. I knew my father was having a rough time at work. I'd overheard him talking with my mother through the hot-air vents.

"The boss is killing me," my father once said. "I can't sleep, can't eat..."

At night, sometimes I found my father vomiting in the bathroom from stress. I would ask what was wrong, he would tell me to go back to bed.

That afternoon, Daddy wheeled into a Catholic church and turned off the truck. There was a man cutting the church lawn with a push mower, he wore a white collar.

My father told me to wait in the vehicle.

Daddy was in that chapel for almost two hours. When he came back his face was wet and his eyes were pink. I never asked why. And he never told me.

Anyway, Easter mass was lovely. I'll never forget it. The priest told the people that "Easter is when dead things come back to life, when we remember how the finger of God can touch dead wood and make it green again."

I had to write that down I liked it so much.

After the service, I stayed in the chapel until all people had left. The priest sat in a pew behind me. He introduced himself.

"Father," I said, "I'm not Catholic, but I really enjoyed mass."

"Yeah?" he said. "Thanks for celebrating the Resurrection with us."

"Can I ask you a question, Father?"

"Shoot."

"Have you ever lost anyone?"

"Yes. I lost my mom, my dad, and my brother."

"Do you think about them a lot?"

He ducked his head. He let out a sigh. "Every second. Actually, I was thinking about Mom this morning. You know, when I was growing up, she would always laugh about the big Easter crowds and call them 'nosebleed Catholics.' Isn't that funny?"

It sure is.

On my way out of church, the priest and I took a slow walk down the aisle. I admired the statuary, and the beautiful stained-glass windows.

The priest hugged me, then said, "He is risen."

And well, you know the rest. Happy Easter.

Ignoring the ancient liar, Jesus proclaimed, "I am the Lamb of God slain for the sins of the world. All who believe in me shall be saved."


"Yet, here you are," Satan smirked.

Thursday night's lineup also includes Jameson Rodgers, Niko Moon and Casi Joy, while Friday night brings to the big stage: Tyler Rich, Jordan Davis, Gary Allan, Randy Rogers Band, Presley & Taylor, Ryan Griffin and Tigerlily. Saturday features wellknowns Chris Janson, Maddie & Tae, Darryl Worley, Frankie Ballard, Steve Moakler, Nate Barnes, and Chandler Flint. Finally the culmination of the entire festival weekend will start Sunday, and includes one of my personal favorites, Georgia's own, Corey Smith, along with Scotty McCreery, Tracy Lawrence, Confederate Railroad, Mitchell Tenpenny and Elvie Shane.

Having attended and written about concerts by a wide array of artists, the one thing I am always in awe of is that even with today's ever-increasing ticket pricing for single concerts, somehow the producers of Gulf Coast Jam still find a way to offer a remarkable package that allows a concert goer to see in excess of 20 well-known artists, over four days, on a single stage, and make it affordable. I mean where else can you experience all of this music, first-hand, on a \$159 general admission weekend pass? People pay that to see one or two groups at most large venues around the nation.

Festival COO, and Panama City Beach Mayor, Mark Sheldon, agrees that the price has a lot to do with how popular Gulf Coast Jam continues to be, stating, "Four days of fun, sun and great music – you just can't beat that!"

My friend, Craig Campbell, of Campbell Entertainment Group in Nashville, has played an instrumental role in orchestrating various behind the scenes aspects of Gulf Coast Jam since its first year, and he's told me, firsthand, that the talent alone runs well into the multi-millions each year.

There's also VIP Pit and Super VIP passes at \$459.00 and \$659.00, respectively. And, trust me they are worth every penny for that location and stage view. There are also very limited numbers of Side Stage passes available for \$1,150.00. All passes are available at www.Gulf-CoastJam.com, while they last.

Spring break is in full swing now until about mid-April. Every year I see concerns posted by locals, in our private Destinites Facebook group. I am going to address a couple of those concerns here, because it isn't just locals who read this paper. So, VISITORS, this one's for YOU!

#1. When you go to the

beach, the first thing you need to do is look for the flags. They are on very tall polls and could be flying any one of four different colors; Red (High hazard - rip currents present), Yellow (Medium hazard), Purple (Dangerous marine life present - could be jelly fish or any other dangerous sea creatures), or Green (Low hazard - Best conditions for swimming but always stay aware). DOU-BLE RED FLAGS mean swimming is closed to the public and you could receive a \$500 fine for entering the water. This is because you are putting rescuers in danger; not just yourself.

We locals realize you have spent a lot of money for your vacation, but it is sad and unnecessary to have to send you home in a body bag or have to call the family of someone who tried to save you from a rip current and lost their own life, in the process. Keep an eye on the flags while you are out there, because they can change in a heartbeat. They are there to help keep you safe. Please pay attention to them!

If you are staying in a condo or hotel, you can most likely find a flag chart displayed in your room. Please familiarize yourself and your entire party with it. Some beach entrances also have a billboard displayed with descriptions of the flags. Take time to be aware so that you will have a fun and safe trip.

Driving around town: Before you get in your car, take a deep breath and bring your patience. Roads are packed with visitors, but also locals, as we go about our daily routines. Please slow down and do not weave in and out of traffic. Speed and weaving are two major culprits in causing wrecks. Rear enders can be high on the list, too, since visitors are trying to find an address or just look at scenery while driving. Please keep your eyes on the road and do not stop on a bridge to take pictures, which is dangerous.

#3. Please don't drink and drive! A taxi ride may cost you a little, but if you kill yourself or someone else, the cost will be a whole lot higher, in more ways than one.
