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

Cindy Smith has taught child abuse prevention in schools since the 1990s. This earlier work led her to become an advocate, author, speaker and founder of Living Hope for Today, whose mission is twofold: to teach our kids, even as young as age 3, how to deter a potential sex offender through the X Zone Body Safety Program and to remove the shame of abuse. Cindy knows firsthand the damage generational abuse can have on a family and is now working to be part of the solution.

"I married the wrong man," she said. "He was physically abusive, and we were only married for three and a half years. When I left him, my children were 18 months and my eldest daughter just turned 3. When she was 3-and-a-half, I found out through things she was saying and doing that he had sexually abused her.

"My daughter, who's now 40, doesn't remember the details of what happened and has left my granddaughter



alone with my ex-husband. He's charismatic and manipu-

lative. So, although she knows something happened to her, she says it couldn't have been him. I have told her, 'But I'm the one who lived it with you and chose to believe you. I'm the one who was with you through the daily nightmares and acting out. I'm the one that was there when you spoke to the counselor.' We knew what happened to her.

"When I found out my 4-year-old granddaughter

was being left alone with my ex-husband, I decided I needed to get a book to teach my granddaughter body safety rules."

When Cindy looked, however, she was unable to find a resource that would make sense to young children, and she desperately wanted to give her granddaughter a tool she could use.

With a counselor's guidance, Cindy wrote her children's book, "Isabella's Treasure," which teaches specific words and actions to deter a potential perpetrator, especially when the potential victim is prompted to keep the abuse a secret. One of the strategies in the book encourages the child not to keep these "sad secrets." The significance of this comes from studies that reflect that an abuser is deterred when they know a child will tell.

Now including a music video, the book has become part of the "X Zone Body Safety Program."

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


Paddle at the Park!

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

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Just as important, Cindy wants to support those who, like herself, live with their history of being sexually abused. In her novel for adults, “Whispered Truth,” Cindy shares her abuse through the characters and storytelling. She understands firsthand how important it is for victims to have an outlet for their stories.

“For me, it was very freeing,” she said. “When I first started

dealing with my repressed memories from childhood, the first people I told were my husband and my pastor. It was freeing to know I could talk about it and people weren’t going to reject me. I felt like I’d done something wrong, and I was full of shame, that something was wrong with me. When you talk about it, and people respond by sharing their own stories, or by offering you support and encouragement, those chains break off. That’s why we need to talk about it.”

Because child sexual abuse

prevention isn’t being taught in most schools, Cindy is passionate about training parents, guardians and professionals how to recognize signs of abuse. If a community decided to make an impact on prevention, the fruit of those efforts would grow exponentially. The results would include better mental health, less addiction, fewer kids in foster care and fewer adults in jail. Cindy Smith will be a guest speaker at the Back to Homeschool Convention at the Crestview Community Center Aug.

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

Mosquito Spraying Under Way

Okaloosa County recently began its evening treatment schedule of spraying pesticide to control mosquito populations. Treatments begin one hour before sunset and/or in the hour after sunrise. Surveillance activities may indicate

certain types of mosquitoes known to be disease vectors that are active during time periods other than noted. If this is the case, the county will respond appropriately. In Destin, spraying takes place on Mondays (County Line to Airport Rd.)

and Tuesdays (Airport Rd. to Destin Bridge).

Residents are also reminded to have outdoor animals vaccinated against mosquito-borne disease and have dogs treated for heartworms since certain mosquitoes present in Okaloosa

County carry the disease as well.

Moving Kids from Hunger to Hope

In April, local Destin business F45 hosted a "Playoff" event to raise money for the 4th Annual Hope for the Hungry Emerald Coast packing event taking place August 6. No small feat, on this day, community volunteers are planning to pack 300,000 meals at the Emerald Coast Convention Center in Fort Walton Beach.

Though local, the August 6th event has global impact; packed meals will go directly to Haiti to feed hungry children. Hope for the Hungry Emerald Coast partners with an organization called Mission of Hope to make it happen. Mission of Hope partners with several meal-packing organizations, which procure the bulk food, transport food to the event, provide all packing equipment and secure shipping to Haiti. Donations of any amount are donated to the Mission of Hope foundation.

The reality is that millions of kids in Haiti do not know where they will get their next meal.

Mission of Hope is currently feeding more than 100,000



kids a day through a network of schools and orphanages, but have about 73,000 more children on a wait list.

Last June, local volunteers packed 250,000 meals that ended up in Haiti right around the time of the August earthquake. The meals provided some relief for those impacted by the earth-

quake. "Our relatively small community also holds the record for the most meals packed on a single day in a single location in the U.S. (through Mission of Hope)," said Kim Bauman, a volunteer. On Saturday, August 6th, there will be over 800 volunteers at the Emerald Coast Convention Center who

will pack a goal of over 300,000 meals for kids in Haiti. "Our community donated \$100,000 over the past year to make this happen," said Kim.

Mhari Turner and her son, Bryson, are the heartbeats behind this cause and head up the efforts in our community.

On January 12, 2010, a devastating earthquake hit Port-au-Prince Haiti. At just 3 years old at the time, Bryson spent the next year praying for Haiti daily. In 2014 and 2015, Bryson and his family were able to go on a mission trip with Mission of Hope to visit the country that had been on his heart for so many years. "It was amazing watching him with the kids in Haiti," said Mhari. "We had no idea what God was planting in his heart and how it would turn into literally leading a community into packing hundreds of thousands of meals."

The Hope for the Hungry event got started after young Bryson's two trips. Only age 8 after the second trip, he and Mhari knew they had to do something about it. "Seeing

Haiti, the poverty and everything about it, there's just no way to not do anything about what you see," said Bryson.

After that second trip, Bryson began continually asking about raising money to host a food packing event to help Mission of Hope to feed kids in Haiti. By 2019, through many fundraising efforts, Bryson raised \$6,000 and packed 22,000 meals. In the fall of 2020, they packed another 40,000. In June of 2021, Bryson, his family, several local churches, and the greater Destin community came together to pack a full container of food which was 250,000 meals!

This August, volunteers will pack 300,000 meals with the help of the community and businesses such as F45. "This really is a local event that has a global effect," said Bryson.

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

Preliminary Brooks Bridge Expansion Work Under Way

Early preparation work has begun on the replacement of the 56-year-old Brooks Bridge, connecting Okaloosa Island and Fort Walton Beach, according to Ian Satter, public information director for FDOT District 3.

The \$171 million project, which will expand the bridge from four to six lanes over two spans, is set to begin next summer. The completed project will include three, 11-foot-wide driving lanes, two 10-foot-wide shoulders and a 12-foot-wide shared-use bicycle and pedestrian path will be included in each direction.

About 50,000 vehicles currently cross the bridge each day, Satter said.

The contract for the new construction was awarded to Superior Construction Co. Southeast, headquartered in

Jacksonville, earlier this month. Three other bids were submitted. The company will design the new bridge as well as construct it, Satter said.

Previously in Okaloosa County, Superior Construction designed and built a \$14.5 million interchange on Highway 98 at Hurlburt Field, which was completed in 2016, according to a spokesperson for the company. The company was founded in Indiana in the 1930s, with its first Florida project begun in 1987. Since then, the spokesperson said, "We've slowly grown that position. We have a lot more presence out there now."

Forty-eight parcels of land will need to be acquired, comprising 7.5 acres, as well as 4.2 acres of easements. So far, six are under negotiation, Satter said. Completion date will be the summer of 2028, weather



permitting, he said. At least 10 buildings will need to be demolished, several of which have already come down.

So far, several Oak Breeze Apartment units, Pat's Bait and Tackle Shop, and a building in front of the old Giovanni's One89 restaurant have been torn down.

west end of the bridge and in the vicinity of Santa Rosa Boulevard, extending to Pier Road on Okaloosa Island.

A project development and environmental study was performed last year to establish the conceptual design and evaluate the environmental, traffic, engineering and social impacts for the replacement of the bridge, which found the current span suffers from structural deficiencies. The existing bridge, which was constructed with a 50-year lifespan, does not meet current design standards, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements, or navigational clearance requirements for this portion of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway, according to the Florida Department of Transportation.

A separate product development and environmental study will be undertaken in a couple of years, Satter said, to deal with the current bottleneck at the Fort Walton Beach end of the bridge. To accommodate the bridge replacement, intersection improvements are necessary at Perry Avenue on the

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

Improving Mental Health with Horses

Alaqua Animal Refuge and Healing Hoof Steps have established a partnership to provide equine-assisted therapy to individuals struggling with mental health issues in our community. The partnership is an extension to Alaqua's Equine Interactions program, which has been used to help children and adults with emotional traumas and developmental challenges to promote social and life skills in a supportive environment.

The Equine Interactions program is open to anyone with mental, emotional, behavioral or development struggles in our community, and serves individu-

als, couples, families, active-duty military personnel, veterans, first responders, at-risk youth, and other groups through an experiential approach to healing through powerful engagement with horses. Focusing on relationship building and coping mechanisms, the program's goal is to foster positive change for individuals with anxiety or depression, autism, trauma such as PTSD, grief, ADHD or physical or developmental disabilities. Additionally, there are women and family services for foster parents, foster children, and domestic violence victims.

With mental health conditions increasing across our



bal communication, horses can convey the awareness, emotions, connection, respect, and structure that exist within the herd dynamics for their survival.

Horses are not distracted by the past or future events which could prevent them from identifying the level of safety in their environment and being able to respond. Unfortunately, humans are notorious for dwelling on past events, which causes depression, or projecting into a future that hasn't happened yet, which causes anxiety. Horses remind us of the importance of living in the moment, away from any anxiety or depression.

They are very sensitive to non-verbal communication and another's energy, even when it is subconscious. As prey animals, horses must be constantly aware of every environmental cue in order to survive. These unique qualities and sensitivities give them a special capacity to read and respond to non-verbal symbols and cues, which can lead to powerful emotional interactions, breakthroughs, and life-changing insights.

The American-Made Heroes Foundation salutes U.S. military veterans who dedicate their lives to helping others, especially fellow service members. Evan Williams provides a platform for sharing their stories, raising awareness for charitable causes and supporting non-profit organizations that serve the veteran community.

And no wonder they chose

Mike. He is a co-founder and the Executive Director of Healing Paws for Warriors (HP4Ws), a local, non-profit organization providing executive management and service dogs at no cost to combat-injured veterans.

According to a study conducted by the Department of Veterans Affairs, 22 veterans and active duty members take their own lives each day. Burdened with a stigma associated with mental health issues and the “shame” surrounding PTSD, TBI and MST, they sometimes resort to suicide as an option to relieve their suffering.

Healing Paws for Warriors is designed to provide our heroes the tools to live and improve their symptoms as they struggle with their conditions. “We want to increase their self-esteem, allow them to lead a more productive life, and help alleviate some of their symptoms,” says the organization’s website. “By training rescue or shelter dogs, we allow the veteran to receive the dog at no cost. But more

importantly, we’ve potentially saved two lives in the process.”

Mike could have been one of those statistics. After having served more than 23 years as an operational medic in the U.S. Air Force, he found himself in the same situation. After completing numerous deployments throughout the world, he was diagnosed with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) and was medically retired.

But there was hope. After his diagnoses and subsequent retirement, he heard of a program that paired service dogs with veterans, and he pursued it as his path for healing. He joined the program and also found his K9 partner, Orion. Shortly after graduating, he regained his smile. He possessed a new mind-set, able to put aside past mental and physical challenges with his injuries. This was the catalyst for founding Healing Paws for Warriors.

Mike and others in the community jointly founded the local

non-profit to help our local veterans who battle with their invisible wounds of war – PTSD, TBI and Military Sexual Trauma (MST). He and the HP4Ws team are passionate about providing hope and healing to veterans as they partner with rescue dogs to become a handler/K9 team. Through the program, military heroes are able to transition to civilian life with self-assurance and determination.

Healing Paws for Warriors trains veterans and dogs to be capable handler teams at no cost to the veterans: enabling struggling military heroes to transition to civilian life with self-assurance and determination.

One week later, on April 19, another Appreciation Lunch was held at Texas Roadhouse in Bay County. Kevin Fordred, an Army combat medic vet who currently works as an EMT, is a newlywed whose wife works in oncology. They just purchased their first home together in Panama City, and. With the currently inflated housing market there were limited homes to choose from in their budget. They landed on a two-bed, two-bath fixer-upper built in the 50s. 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
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Okaloosa County Welcomes Governor DeSantis Again

Gov. Ron DeSantis has visited Okaloosa County four times this year. In February, he visited Northwest Florida State College to announce a bill allocating \$10 million for workforce charter schools. In April, he stopped in Destin to proclaim the extended snapper fishing season.

In May, Gov. DeSantis visited Crestview to announce a \$3.2 million Shoal River Ranch extension. And in June, he signed six military-related bills into law at veteran-owned Props Craft Brewery and Taproom in Fort Walton Beach. The bills either expand educational opportunities for active-duty military members and veterans or help them advance into career fields.

The military and veterans appreciate Gov. DeSantis for supporting these bills and signing them into law. These bills are life-changing as men and women depart the armed forces to enter the next phase of their lives, and I know this first-hand.

I enlisted in the Air Force when I was 17 years old and used the GI Bill to help offset the costs of attending college. I gave my country six years, and America rewarded me with an education. Because Pennsylvania was a pro-military state, they helped me earn my college degree at Penn State University, finishing

without going into debt. That was 40 years ago, and Florida is doing even more!

The bills: provide tuition assistance for disabled veterans to eliminate education costs; ensure a smooth school transition for children of military families; permit employers at state agencies to substitute military experience for post-secondary educational requirements; provide non-traditional pathways to educator certification to service members, allowing military service to count towards a teacher's certificate; require the Department of Business and Professional Regulation to expedite license applications of active-duty military spouses; and update Florida's definition of uniformed service to include the U.S. Space Force and update military base names.

According to the governor's news release, "Florida is the most military-friendly state in the nation, and I am proud to continue that commitment to our military members and their families by signing these pieces of legislation. Providing military families with the resources they need to receive a high-quality education and find good jobs is the best way that we as a state can show our appreciation for the sacrifices that they make."

Adjutant General of the



Florida National Guard Maj. Gen. James O. Eifert joined Gov. DeSantis, along with Florida Department of Education Senior Chancellor Henry Mack and Executive Director of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs retired Maj. Gen. James S. "Hammer" Hartsell.

"It is truly an honor to be here with the Commander-in-Chief of the state of Florida this morning. As a 37-year Marine, I know about leadership, and I am truly honored to serve this leader," Hartsell said, noting that Gov. DeSantis is the only currently serving governor to have served in combat. He added that Gov. DeSantis has made Florida the most sought-after state by veterans.

Props Craft Brewery was founded originally by two USAF Special Operations Pilots with a passion for brewing beer, but has grown into a regional brewery operated by Nathan Vannatter, Mike Kee, Brian O'Neill and Travis Peterson. Mike, Nate and Travis spent most of their lives serving in the USAF. "I enlisted in the Air Force when I was 18 years old," said Nate, one of the

thank the Governor for his support of these veteran bills. As these men and women depart the armed forces and go into the next phase of their life, these bills are really going to mean something."

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Eglin's Climatic Lab Celebrates 75th Anniversary!

As folks across the nation gear up to celebrate the 75th birthday of the Air Force later this summer, those at the McKinley Climatic Laboratory here recently marked the facility's diamond anniversary. Initial testing at the MCL occurred on May 24, 1947, predating the official establishment of the Air Force by about three months.

For 75 years since, the unique capabilities available at the MCL have been utilized to conduct a variety of climatic testing for the Department of Defense, other government agencies and private industry. From arctic freeze to blazing heat and desert sand to jungle humidity, any climatic environment in the world can be simulated in the facility. "For all agencies of the DOD, environmental testing at the MCL is an essential step in establishing a proven military capability to meet our global commitments specifically stated in the National Defense Strategy," Kirk Velasco, retired MCL director, wrote in a commentary published in High Mach



in 2020. "The results obtained from the vast array of aircraft and equipment tested at the MCL have been a major factor in maintaining the position of the United States as the world's leading military power."

Today, the MCL is managed by the 717th Test Squadron, a geographically separated unit located at Arnold Engineering Development Complex in Tennessee.

When it first began operations, the MCL was part of the U.S. Army Air Forces. This component was soon separated from the Army and became its own military branch when the

Air Force was founded on Sept. 18, 1947. Before the MCL, there was the Cold Weather Test Detachment stationed at Ladd Field in Fairbanks, Alaska. The Army Air Force designated that site as a cold-weather testing facility in 1940. Prior U.S. involvement in World War I meant that international warfare was on the table and service members could end up engaged in combat virtually anywhere on the planet. The ability of military aircraft and equipment to maintain operability and reliability in the harshest of climates needed to be ensured. This was the mission of the Cold Weath-

er Test Detachment at Ladd Field. For two years following its 1940 activation, the detachment managed to establish basic operational and maintenance requirements for aircraft in the arctic, perform experiments on cold weather uniforms and rations, and experiment on solutions to arctic flying issues. Testing at Ladd Field ceased after the December 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor. There were concerns installations in Alaska could also come under attack. So, it was decided that all military aircraft there would be used to defend the state.

The Cold Weather Test Detachment was reactivated in 1942 and by that winter, testing had resumed at Ladd Field as the importance of such efforts was recognized. However, issues present since testing initially began at Ladd Field continued to be encountered. Despite its position on the globe, cold weather testing at Ladd Field was often inconsistent.

Cold weather testing there was conducted in an open-air environment which essentially involved subjecting aircraft and



Oh, how our furry family members bring so much joy and can also cause a lot of wear and tear to our furniture and floors. Does your dog or cat lounge on your furniture? Do they zoom through the house like they're on a racetrack? If you said yes, chances are they're leaving behind pet hair, drool, scratches on the furniture, nicks on fabric and maybe even leaving their

mark too. All of these things are common occurrences with indoor pets. While we work on training them, we can also choose durable, easy-to-maintain materials that can resist stains and repel odors.

I realize that you cannot run out and buy new furniture or install new flooring, but you can treat the fabric and rugs you have and quickly clean up any



professionally treated to help prevent stains from absorbing into the fabric. A slipcover can also be used for better protection. Slipcovers have come a long way since we were kids and you should be able to find one that suits your style and fits snugly over your furniture. Leather: Keep in mind that leather is easy to scratch, but if you have the "distressed look" those scratches will not be as noticeable as the smooth option. Tile: Ceramic and porcelain tile are easy to clean and scratch-resistant. They're also non-porous and don't easily absorb smells from accidents. However, grout can be more absorbent, so keep the grout lines thin and seal them regularly (at least twice a year).

Faux Or Treated Hardwood Floors: If you have LVP (luxury vinyl plank) flooring, you have a great pet-friendly floor that is more resistant to scratches and liquid messes than a laminate or engineered wood option. For all of those with other types of hardwood floors you'll need to do your best to spot the mess quickly and swiftly clean it before damage sets in.

spills or messes to prevent damage to your flooring. Below are some of the best options without sacrificing design style:

Carpet: Wall-to-wall carpet isn't ideal with pets, but if that's what you have, you can protect it by layering with rugs. Rugs made of natural materials (sisal for example) can be harder to clean than a synthetic rug.

Indoor-Outdoor Rug: These are a good investment and many are designed with stain- and odor-proof synthetic materials. When your pet makes a mess, you can take the rug outside, clean and dry it according to the manufacturer's directions, then bring it back inside. You can also add a little comfort to your indoor-outdoor rug by adding a rug pad but you should consider replacing the pad yearly due to its absorbency and inability to be cleaned.

Wool Rug: These rugs are fairly easy to spot clean, but for tough stains you should consider having it professionally cleaned. Avoid the higher pile rugs, as they're more difficult to vacuum and they take a longer time to dry after being cleaned.

Washable Slipcovers: You can treat your upholstery with Scotch Guard (always test a small area first) or have it pro-

Unfortunately, this is only one of the stories through history that reflect the dark past of the Danube River during World War II.

Bratislava. We saw castles, historic Nurembourg, and so much more. We ended this once-in-a-lifetime trip in the little Bavarian village of Oberammergau, where we were privileged to mingle with the local villagers before viewing their performances in their world-famous Passion Play.

They have been performing the Oberammergau Passion Play for more than 400 years since the plague was raging through Europe. 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One Woman's Journey: How Restaurants Can Help Save Sea Turtles

Long before people were enjoying the white sand beaches and emerald green waters along The Emerald Coast, sea turtles were coming ashore to nest their eggs. They now share the area with around 500,000 people. That number surges as tourists flock to the area. What we do affects the life of the sea turtle. The trash we leave behind, specifically plastic, has been dangerous to their health.

One thousand sea turtles die annually from digesting plastic. Plastic stays in the stomach of the turtle, and as it builds up, the brain thinks the stomach is full, but in reality they aren't getting the nutrients that they need. The mortality rate of a sea turtle that ingests 14 pieces of plastic jumps to 50%.

Straws are the most commonly found plastic materials by our volunteers on the beach. Americans discard 500 million straws per day. With all of the restaurants along the coast where we can get our smoothies, iced coffee, sweet tea, and cocktails, you can imagine how many straws end up on our beaches and in the Gulf. Straws find their way into the water and can be mistaken



by the sea turtles as food.

There are a few alternatives to plastic straws. Paper and other plant-based straws

are passed off as biodegradable, but contain polyfluoroalkyl substances known as "forever chemicals" that have an ex-



treme resistance to environmental breakdown. These can also lead to adverse health effects in humans at low levels. Reusable straws are popular, but people don't always remember to bring them, and they are hard to keep clean and sanitary on the go.

A great alternative to these is 100% organic Bamboo Straws. Walton County resident and entrepreneur Khuyen Bui is the principal behind Econet Green Products working to make bamboo straws affordable and available along The Emerald Coast. The 100% organic Bamboo Straws are produced in a small village in Vietnam, cut from living bamboo branches, cleaned, sanitized and individually paper wrapped for single serving usage.

Instead of customers receiving a free plastic straw the restaurant has to purchase, restaurant owners can pur-

chase bamboo straws for 10 cents each and resell them in their restaurants. Organic bamboo straws available now in online stores, are reusable and unwrapped, and cost almost \$1 each. They are more expensive and unsanitary compared to the Bamboo Straws sold by Econet.

Restaurants can ask customers to pay pennies on the dollar to help keep our beaches plastic straw free. equipment to the outdoors conditions. However, it was difficult to predict when temperatures would reach the levels required for testing. When they did, these temperatures would sometimes not remain low enough for long enough to meet testing needs.

Along with suggesting that U.S. aircraft be operable at minus 65 degrees Fahrenheit, then-Lt. Col. Ashley McKinley is credited for suggesting the construction of a refrigerated airplane hangar to allow for cold weather testing under controlled conditions. The headquarters for such testing was reassigned to the more temperate Eglin AFB and plans for McKinley's suggested facility were approved in 1944. Construction began soon thereafter.

The first tests at the MCL involved subjecting a B-29 Superfortress, C-82 Packet cargo plane, P-80 Shooting Star, P-51 Mustang, P-47 Thunderbolt and R5D helicopter, as well as trucks, tanks and clothing, to a temperature of minus 70 degrees Fahrenheit. The tests were considered highly successful.

In 1971, the refrigerated hangar was dedicated as the McKinley Climatic Hangar in honor of McKinley, who passed away the previous year.

Over the years, the facility that would become known as the McKinley Climatic Laboratory expanded its offerings beyond arctic and subarctic testing. The laboratory now consists of five testing chambers used to prove the operational reliability of systems under test in the climatic extremes found around the world. Along with large aircraft, items tested within these chambers include engines, tanks, missile launchers, shelters and automobiles. "The MCL is the only facility in the world that can hold and test a full-scale operational aircraft in climatic extremes," said Melissa Tate,

MCL site director. "This facility can produce, on any given day, any extreme weather environment within which to conduct a desired test."

Examples of aircraft more recently tested at the MCL include the F-117A Nighthawk Stealth Fighter, C-130J Super Hercules, F-22 Raptor, F-16 Fighting Falcon, B-2 Spirit bomber and the HH-60W Jolly Green II combat search and rescue helicopter.

In 1987, the MCL was named a National Historic Mechanical Engineering Landmark by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. The following decade, it was added to the National Register of Historic Places. "It's pretty awesome that MCL is the only facility on the planet that can do what we do," said Michael Burch, MCL senior facility field engineer, who has been employed at the laboratory for nearly 25 years.

A Work of Art Takes First Place at EC Blue Marlin Classic

The Emerald Coast Blue Marlin Classic at Sandestin (ECBC) is a multi-day event that happens at Baytowne Marina at Sandestin during the peak of blue marlin season. The 20th annual tournament June 22-26 welcomed 84 boats with a total of \$1,987,100 in cash awards.

If you've never been to the Baytowne Marina at Sandestin for the blue marlin weigh-ins, put this on your list for next year. Watching these charter boats roll in with monster fish being wheeled to the weigh station is a sight like nothing else. The all-time record marlin weighed in at 1,402 pounds, although most caught will average in the 500-800 lb. range.

This year's top three blue marlin winners were: Raise 'Em Up, weighing in a 513.30-pound blue marlin for third place; Benedetta, weighing

in a 547.90-pound blue marlin for second place; and A Work of Art with a 638.70-pound first-place blue marlin.

Other categories include heaviest dolphin, heaviest tuna, heaviest wahoo, as well as top angler, top release angler, top lady angler and top junior angler. There is also a release division for those boats that release the blue marlin back into the water.

Blue marlin have brilliant colors on their skin, with bright cobalt blue on top and a white silver belly. They are a beautiful fish that primarily stays offshore, but will move closer to shore from July to September.

Once caught, it's common at ECBC to paint the fish and take an imprint of it on canvas, to be painted in full as a memory of the catch. ECBC welcomes children to paint the fish, a unique experience for kids of all ages.

Also available during the



event is a golf scramble, sponsor booths and a fireworks show. Guests also have access to all recreational activities at the Village of Baytowne Wharf.

Mark your calendars for the third weekend in June 2023 to be at the Baytowne Marina at Sandestin to experience the weigh-ins.

For-hire operations that do not have a federal reef fish permit may also participate in the season, but are limited to fishing for red snapper in Gulf state waters only.

If you plan to fish for red snapper in any state or federal waters off Florida from a private recreational vessel, even if you are exempt from fishing license requirements, you must sign up as a State Reef Fish Angler (an-

nual renewal required). Sign up at GoOutdoorsFlorida.com. To learn more, visit MyFWC.com/SRFS.

When catching red snapper and other deep-water fish, look out for symptoms of barotrauma (injuries caused by a change in pressure), such as the stomach coming out of the mouth, bloated belly, distended intestines and bulging eyes. When releasing fish with barotrauma, use a descending device or venting

COURAGEOUS Deployed

On April 28, the Air Force Research Laboratory and Eglin Air Force Base's Integrated Test Team demonstrated a new low-cost, air-delivered capability for defeating maritime threats, that successfully destroyed a full-scale surface vessel in the Gulf of Mexico. The vessel was the COURAGEOUS and our Coastal Resource Team was on hand to assist with the mapping data. The plans are to add these coordinates to our artificial reef

system demonstrating how the results of Eglin's testing can benefit our coastal environment. In addition to providing new places to dive, the artificial reefs allow for a healthy ecosystem. The QUICKSINK program, a Navy partnership, aims to provide options to "neutralize surface maritime threats." Limestone Coral Reef Deployed in Gulf

In celebration of World Coral Reef Awareness Day, Starborough Wine partnered with Reef-maker, the largest reef builder in the U.S., to deploy its first limestone reef two miles off the coast of Fort Walton Beach in June. calves (back lower leg), abductors (outer thigh) and adductors (inner thigh) all comprise the lower body.

A **squat** is a prime example where all the muscles are incorporated, and a very functional movement for everyday life. Squat safety – bend at the knees (knees must bend for proper ROM: Range-of-Motion), sit back on heels, lower butt down, chest and head up, drive your heels into the floor to push up to standing. The toes are for balance so, to protect the knees, use them lightly. Work on getting deeper to get stronger through the entire ROM.

To address knee issues, start light, assist your weight by holding on to something if you haven't been training. Track your knees in the direction your toes are pointed to keep them aligned. Butt is always way lower than your chest! Knees never move forward past the toes. Squats help you remain self-sufficient for getting yourself up and down.

Your knees will get stronger if you progress through consistency with ROM & safety. Babying them will make them weaker. Plus, bending and weight bearing the knees will produce synovial fluid to lubricate the joint.

Variations – Basic squat,

heels are shoulder width apart, toes and knees slightly turned out to 11 and 1 o'clock. Focus on gluteus maximus and quadriceps, some hamstrings. Wide squat, heels are outside of shoulder width, toes and knees are pointed roughly 10 and 2 o'clock (key, start your turnout at the hip joint so that thigh, knee, shin and toes are all pointed outwardly the same). Focus on gluteus medius, quadriceps, adductors, some abductors.

Close Stance squat, (i.e. back squat), toes face forward, feet close together, sit back almost like you are going to fall back. In yoga, some go all the way to the floor (Malasana). Focus mainly on center quads and glutes.

Protecting our knees is very

important because they are vulnerable in all lower body exercises. Imbalanced muscles, where a muscle is strong but the opposite muscle is weak, can be detrimental to any joint. For a balanced lower body workout, think of working around the whole circumference of the leg.

Quads and Hamstrings should be equally conditioned, which doesn't mean they have to lift the same weight. Hamstrings perform more isolated movements. They can move independently of the rest of the lower body. Named the biceps femoris, it flexes the knee joint the same as the biceps in the arm. But quad exercises, such as the squat, are assisted by the glutes, making them a true pow-

erhouse. But the key is to give them equal workout attention. Don't forget the leg extension. Also an isolated move targeting one of the quad muscles, done properly it will make a huge difference in knee stability and thigh shape. Abductors and Adductors are knee and hip stabilizers. Exercises that move the legs out or in (leg lifts or band work) are what you do to strengthen those. Throw in your calf raises on your bottom stair and you will be complete from hip to toe!!

Happy to introduce the second in a series of tips to effectively and safely exercise various areas of the body (Check out June edition: "Core/Abs").

There is a lot going on in the lower body. That old song (hip bone's connected to the thigh bone...) is true; everything is connected and can affect the entire chain of movement. To stay healthy, you must look at balancing your muscle groups to avoid imbalance that leads to weakness and injuries. Importantly, acknowledge that some muscles are meant to be stronger due to their function, so weight load for your exercises should reflect that.

The lower body muscles work synergistically and only a couple can be isolated. The gluteals (butt), quadriceps (front thigh), hamstrings (back thigh),

Hormones Aren't For Me





I know some doctors who have learned how to do pellet therapy from watching videos on the internet. The same is true for Botox and fillers. Just because someone can perform a procedure does not always mean they are capable or should be performing that procedure.

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Plastics, from Storage Ware to Water Bottles

Do you know what the two most toxic plastics are that can be found in most kitchens today? Wait for it... plastic wrap and silverware.

How many plastic storage containers do you have and how many of them come from restaurant leftovers, the deli or the 24 container box deals?

One of the most toxic prod-

ucts we come in contact with is styrofoam. In one study, eggs that were stored in a styrofoam container were tested. After several hours they found that the chemicals from the styrofoam had leached through the shell into the egg.

Now, back to plastic.

Many of us are familiar with the term BPA-free and even though this is a good thing it does not mean that it is healthy or safe. Here are some lingering dangers of plastics:

Dioxin production: Direct exposure to the sun. Such heating (including microwave) releases a toxin called dioxin, which, when consumed, can accelerate breast cancer.

BPA generation: Biphenyl A is an oestrogen-mimicking chemical that can lead to a lot of health problems like diabetes, obesity, fertility problems, behavioural

problems and early puberty in girls. It's better not to store and drink water from a plastic bottle.

Impact immune system: Our immune system is immensely affected when we drink water in plastic bottles. The chemicals from plastic bottles are ingested and tend to disturb our body's immune system.

Liver cancer and reduced sperm count: Because of the presence of a chemical called phthalates in plastic, drinking water from plastic bottles can also lead to liver cancer and a reduction in sperm count.

A recent study done by the State University of New York in Fredonia shows that there are excessive levels of microplastics in bottled water, especially in popular brands. Microplastics are small plastic debris pieces measuring 5 millimetres or smaller. Microplastic is found in over 93

percent of bottled water and while The World Health Organization says that there is no evidence consumption of microplastics affects your health, it is still an area of concern.

Here is a mini guide to plastic bottles and other plastics. The numbers refer to the number in the triangle on the bottom of the container.

- 1 - PETE or PET (polyethylene terephthalate)
- 2 - HDPE (high density polyethylene)
- 3 - V (vinyl) or PVC
- 4 - LDPE (low density polyethylene)
- 5 - PP (polypropylene)
- 6 - PS (polystyrene)
- 7 - Other or miscellaneous

The safest numbers are 1, 2, 4, or 5. Number 3 is the worst followed by 7. As a rule of thumb, the softer the plastic the more likely than leaching will occur.

So, what can we do? Begin by replacing water bottles with a stainless steel water bottle. When plastic bottles are a necessity (a long road trip or a day on the boat) ensure the bottles stay cool and out of the sun. If you're on a trip, bring the water into your hotel room for the night and never leave a water bottle in your vehicle.

For the kitchen, begin replacing food storage containers with glass. When using plastic wrap, either place parchment paper under the plastic wrap or ensure the wrap does not touch any food. Finally, NEVER heat food in the microwave in a plastic container or plastic wrap.

Here's to health.

Life with ADHD Part 1: In the Words of a 10 Year Old

Our 10-year-old son, Will, suggested our monthly article should be an interview with him about ADHD to help other kids who might be struggling. We decided to turn it into a two-part series addressing the perspective of both kids and parents. The following interview took place while Will was dancing, throwing a ball, playing with the dog and generally wiggling, all while actively engaging in the conversation.

What is it like to have ADHD?

ADHD makes it hard for me to focus and stay still and sit in my chair at school.

What are the positives of having ADHD?

I am very musical, artistic, funny and have a lot of ideas to invent things.

What are the negatives of having ADHD?

I work really hard to sit still and focus. When I'm supposed to be focusing on one thing, my

mind drifts and gets interested in something different and I completely forget I was supposed to be focused on the first thing. School is especially hard because there often isn't a time to move around when I need to let out energy. Sometimes I take bathroom breaks to move and pace around so I can try to be more still in class.

How has ADHD challenged you at school?

I have so much energy and have trouble sitting still and sometimes teachers get on to me a lot. Kids noticed I was getting negative reports on my communication card and started saying I was a bad kid. Every day I started thinking I didn't want to go to school because it's going to be another bad day. I'd go to the nurse most days, thinking I was sick, but really I was stressed because I got in trouble a lot. This turned into a loop until I found a medication that worked for me.

How has ADHD challenged you at home?

I'd be asked to do homework, chores or take a shower several times and I would get distracted. It would take an hour to finish things that could take 15 minutes because I would forget



what I was doing and would start playing. My parents would get frustrated from asking me over and over to do things. I felt stressed because I was in trouble at home and school a lot. It felt like there wasn't a place where I wouldn't get in trouble or people weren't annoyed with me.

What does NOT feel supportive to you in managing ADHD?

When kids are mean to me because of my struggles, that doesn't help. When teachers made my behavior charts public in the classroom, that felt bad. I felt like I could never get ahead in behavior points and the whole class could see that I didn't have as many points. Some people don't really know or understand what ADHD is and they end up thinking I'm just a kid who doesn't behave right and judge me. When my

parents get frustrated, raise their voices, or get firm, that doesn't help.

What DOES feel supportive to you in managing ADHD?

My parents apologizing for getting frustrated and helping me calm down with deep breathing and restarting my day. Taking medication before school helps me focus, sit still and I started getting good reports on my school communication card. I forgot to go see the nurse and didn't feel stressed and sick every day. Medicine didn't eliminate all the effects of ADHD, but it made them much less noticeable to me and others. My teachers told me how much better I was focusing and sitting still. We do daily lists at home that remind me what I'm supposed to do each morning, afternoon and evening. Now I check off what I have done, which keeps my parents from having to repeat

themselves and keeps me on track. Instead of taking an hour to do my jobs, I can sometimes get them done in less than 15 minutes. I talked to adult family members or family friends who struggle with ADHD. They helped me know I'm not alone and other people think like me and are figuring out ways to manage ADHD. It helps when my teachers understand ADHD and encourage me.

What's one thing you want people to know about having ADHD?

ADHD is a problem with focusing, sitting still and managing impulses. It doesn't make someone a bad kid. And kids that struggle with ADHD mostly aren't trying to be disrespectful when they are moving around and having trouble following directions.

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Mold and What to Do About It

You might say he is one of the Pioneers of the industry.

So, what is mold? Mold is a microscopic fungi that plays a major role in causing decomposition of organic material, enabling the recycling of nutrients throughout the ecosystem. A question I hear a lot is 'how big is a mold spore'? A mold spore is 2-10 Microns in size.

Mold can become present, when water enters our home or business from many sources, including a leaking roof, ground water through the foundation, condensation, plumbing and appliance leaks, cooking and cleaning. Molds are ubiquitous in nature, and mold spores are a common component of household and workplace dust.

The question is, "Should I be concerned?" When mold spores are present in large quantities, they can present a health hazard to humans, potentially causing


allergic reactions and respiratory problems.

Research on the health effects of mold has not been conclusive. The term "toxic mold" refers to molds that produce mycotoxins, such as *Stachybotrys* and *Chaetium* and not to all molds in general. Some studies claim that exposure to high levels of mycotoxins can lead to neurological problems. Prolonged exposure, e.g., daily workplace exposure, may be particularly harmful.

Why do some molds have mycotoxins? Mycotoxins are mold's defense against other molds and bacteria. The real concerns with toxic molds can be opportunistic pathogens that look for a compromised immune system, such as a person over age 65, under age 2, recent surgery or an infection.

What should I do if I discover mold and how do I get rid of it?

Disinfectants: Can I just put bleach on it? Unfortunately, bleach is a hyper chlorite which is inactivated by organic matter, i.e. mold. Does killing a mold spore make them safe? No, actually killing a mold spore may release the mycotoxins which may pass directly through HEPA Filtration (High Efficient Particulate Air Filter). Dead mold spores are still allergenic. Unfortunately, mold spores must be completely removed from the built environment. If not removed, mold spores go dormant until excessive moisture is reintroduced, and they begin growing again.



How does a disinfectant work? Think of a mold spore as a balloon. If the spore is toxigenic, the mycotoxin is stored inside the spore or in this case the balloon. The mycotoxin is the spore's natural defense system and is released when it is attacked. The spore's outer membrane is ruptured by the disinfectant (bleach) and this allows the mycotoxin to be released into the air. Even when mycotoxins are not present, this rupturing makes them smaller and easier to breathe deeper into our lungs.

Is killing a mold spore really what we want to do? Thankfully, there is another alternative. Remove the mold spores through proper disposal, cleaning and filtration and then correct the moisture problem!

What are the factors needed for excessive mold growth? An organic food source, moisture, stagnant air, an acceptable temperature range, IE. 68-86 deg. F. for most mold growth and the big one TIME!

What is an ORGANIC FOOD SOURCE? Building Materials such as Drywall Pa-

per -Trees, 2 x 4 Studs - Trees, Boxes - Trees, Natural Carpet Fibers - Wool, Bathroom Tile - Bacteria, Dead Skin, and Adhesives -Animal Glue (OSB Subfloors).

So, how can we prevent excessive mold growth? It's Simple... Eliminate the factors for growth, respond quickly to water losses and stop the water intrusion.

It could be 93 degrees with a “feels like” 102.” Heat indexes of 103 degrees or higher are considered dangerous. Use caution when planning beach days or outings with a high heat index.

While checking the weather forecast and heat index, be sure to check the **UV forecast**. Checking UV (ultraviolet radiation) should become as much as a habit as checking the weather. UV forecasts include many factors, so don’t assume cloud cover or lower temperatures mean low UV, as anyone who has gotten sunburn on a cloudy day understands. Checking UV is particularly important if you plan to spend several hours outside and even more so at the beach where UV radiation can be increased



by reflecting off our white sands and water.

Wear reef safe sunscreen. The best way to protect yourself from UV radiation is by staying in the shade or wearing protective clothing. Another way is slather on reef safe sunscreen. Be sure to check the back of the sunscreen bottle, some sunscreens contain chemicals that can harm marine life including corals, fish and even dolphins.

Get to know the sand between your toes. We have some of the whitest beaches in the world, all thanks to the Appalachian Mountains and the Apalachicola River. Some 20,000 years ago, when world temperatures began warming after the ice age, large volumes of water were carried by riv-

ers to the world’s oceans. The Apalachicola River carried small quartz particles to the Gulf of Mexico and continues today. These unique quartz particles created our shorelines and beautiful white beaches.

Share the shore. Our beaches are great, but they aren’t ours; we’re all just visitors. Snorkeling, diving and even sitting, one can experience a whole world coexisting at the beach. Share the shore and take the pledge that you will find out how to keep yourself and the marine animals around you safe. Governor DeSantis recently signed into law more than \$1.2 billion of tax relief for Floridians. The new law creates 10 sales tax holidays for a variety of items commonly purchased by Florida families, including fuel, diapers, disaster supplies and tools.

“Florida’s economy has consistently outpaced the nation, but we are still fighting against inflationary policies imposed on us by the Biden administration,” Governor DeSantis said. “In

from **October 1-31, 2022**, saving Floridians \$200 million by lowering the price of gas by 25.3 cents per gallon.

A 3-month sales **tax holiday for children’s books from May 14 through August 14, 2022**, providing \$3.3 million in tax relief.

A one-year sales tax holiday from **July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023, for baby and toddler clothes and shoes**, providing \$81.5 million in tax relief.

A one-year sales tax holiday

A 7-day **Tool-Time sales tax holiday from September 3-9, 2022**, for tools and other home improvement items, providing \$12.4 million in tax relief.


and garage doors, providing \$442.8 million in tax relief.

Insurance Market Conditions in Florida Continue to Deteriorate

The unpopular, but familiar topics and headlines continue.

Florida now has the highest premiums in the nation. It has been two and a half years since we started to feel the impact of the changing (hardening) insurance marketplace in our state. Because we are nearly surrounded by water with the possibility of storms and other natural disasters so evident, the market cycles here are much more pronounced.

Florida's hard insurance market is tougher than any other market cycle in most other states. The challenges are exacerbated by other "unique" market conditions such as natural disasters, litigation, fraud and increase in claims frequency and severity. In this hard market, premiums increase while capacity, or the ability to write more premiums is diminished. These

past two years for the Florida insurance market have certainly been one for the records. Higher premiums, more stringent underwriting and less competition is playing into the advantage of insurance carriers, and make it difficult on consumers.

Just in this past week alone, another Florida property insurance company went into receivership, a roofing industry lawsuit was dismissed, Citizens Property and Casualty had its rate hikes trimmed and it's official, Florida now has the highest homeowner premiums in the country. Southern Fidelity was ordered into receivership and this makes the fourth insolvency this year. Efforts failed to find other carriers to take some of the 78,000 homeowners' policies in Florida, and another 69,000 in Los Angeles, Mississippi and South Carolina. Some of these policies will be picked up by Citizens Property Insurance, our state backed insurer of last resort, and the Florida Insurance Guarantee Fund is now having to pay their outstanding claims.

Citizens, who continues to lose about \$100 million a year, has its policy count driven up to 900,000 due to the recent insolvencies. This is up from slightly over 400,000 in late 2019. Although Citizens asked for a 15% rate increase, the Office of Insurance Regulation has approved an increase of 6.4% to

be effective September 1.

The biggest loser in all are the approximately 7.5 million property insurance policyholders. The average policy is \$4,231, almost three times the national average, and up from \$2,505 just two years ago, for reasons other than the exposure to hurricanes and named storms. Most of the cost can be attributed to a lot of needless litigation and many fraudulent schemes.

In many cases, frivolous claims are creating unnecessary litigation. One recent study shows that 8% of all homeowners' claims nationwide are in the State of Florida, but 76% of all homeowners' claims lawsuits are in the State of Florida!

Fortunately, one of the lawsuits filed by the roofing industry was dismissed. They were claiming that SB 76 infringed on First Amendment free speech rights. The legislature last month passed SB 2-D which gives clarity to the law, so the case is now moot.

COVID and inflation have definitely impacted the insurance industry as well. The pandemic has certainly highlighted coverages that are included in contracts. Insurers have seen an increase in insurance claims while suffering investment losses.

Many carriers are still working through their losses from the natural disasters, and the major storms of Hurricane Irma in 2017 and Hurricane Michael in 2018. These two events had a major impact on the rising reinsurance costs. When reinsurance costs go up, your insurance premiums go up. However, reinsurance is an essential product, purchased by insurance carriers to mitigate catastrophic exposures.

Whether you are seeking personal or business insurance, navigating the market can be challenging. The bottom line for the Florida insurance market right now is that the industry is on life support and consumers are still facing double digit rate increases. Policyholders are paying more money for less coverage. Regardless of what you're after, it's important to find an

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Is this Contraction or Capitulation?

The financial media are replete with reports that the markets in 2022 are off to one of their worst halves in recorded history. The stock market – the worst since 1970. The bond market, the worst ever. That begs the question, is the worst over or is the worst yet to come? We think that a lot if not all of this is in response to what the current environment is and is also part of the journey for long term investors. We encourage investors and clients to not try and predict where things (or the markets) might be going in the short run and instead to focus on what strategies and allocations meet their objectives, time frame and risk tolerance. Nonetheless, some of the media leave people wondering if things are contracting or if the sky is finally falling. We think it is a contraction and that the sky is not falling. It's not different this time and the past keeps happening in the present.

What then is driving the contraction?

The current drivers are inflation (caused by very expansive monetary policy and the pandemic), the fall for housing from rising rates (more than 2.5 times higher to borrow now than in January), the ongoing crisis in Ukraine, and stubborn supply chain issues. Wages have risen (although up over 5% they still are not matching inflation) and that adds to production costs. What is all adding up to the markets – traditionally a forward predictor of the economy – is that stocks and bonds were overvalued relative to where we were headed, and the sell offs began. What accelerated that was the Federal Reserve raising its short term rate and, we

think most importantly stopping the buying of bonds and hence shrinking the amount of money or liquidity that was out there.

Elevated risk and or speculative investments (like cryptocurrency) have been significantly impacted on the negative side. Add to that many technology stocks (over 25% of the market's value is in technology stocks) may have little to no earnings and investors bought those stocks in hopes for future growth vs current earnings. The fallout has been brutal for the tech heavy NASDAQ.

The Business Cycle Considerations

So, while this may help explain a lot, what else might be important to consider? We suggest that investors look at the business cycle. In a recent issue of Utility Forecaster, they point out that there are four phases: early, mid, late and recession. They suggest that the current environment of rising rates, inflation, higher energy prices all point to late or recession. That makes a lot of sense to us and therefore we think the current environment (while the inputs may look different) is no different from past environments and that the past keeps happening. We think investors should take that into consideration at times like these.

Lastly, the energy scenario

Raymond James projects that a barrel of oil will be selling around \$90 a year from now and \$80 two years from now. In either scenario that is well above the approximate cost of less than \$40 a barrel for most domestic producers. With world demand restored and growing, the legacy energy sector has continued to show strong revenues and earnings. That is for exploration and production companies. Also consider that refineries have less capacity (and little to none planned) and therefore the competition for a gallon of gas remains high and keeps gas prices high. Despite that, inflation, ex food and energy, has declined to approximately 6% from 6.2% as recently reported.

These are the times that test investors' will, confidence and patience. We urge investors to reflect on the past, think about the present and continue to pre-

pare for the future. There is a book out on the life of former Secretary of the Treasury and of State James Baker, (The Man Who Ran Washington by Peter Baker and Susan Glasser) and we reflect on a quote on something he learned early in life which he applied throughout his career in law and government (the five Ps): Prior Preparation Prevents Poor Performance.

I hope you had a happy Fourth.



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

study with his coach. He didn't really want to go, but decided to give it a chance. Seeds were planted at those Bible studies. After a while he began to feel that knock on his heart's door. God was telling him "you have to change and you can't be living the same way." Tuba prayed about it and God continued to show him the things in his life that needed to be removed.

One day in training, he tore his bicep and just like that, his football career was over. As Tuba says, "it was a 'but God' moment." He wasn't sure

As a young boy, Tuba remembers learning about Jesus as his mom read the book of Matthew to him. She would pray over him and read Psalm 23 and the Lord's Prayer. She pointed him in the right direction. He also had a lot of aunts and grandmas praying

for him as well. Now he's fully in and fully embracing God.

"When my bicep tore – there was a low point, and I thought - what am I going to do next? I lost my back up plan." His turn-

ing point was when his wife got serious with the Lord and they both gave their lives to Christ.

Now Tuba looks for ways to bless others. He loves being involved in small groups with men praying and worshipping God together. His new passion is wanting to spend more time with the Lord and put Him first. Tuba's desire is to keep sharing his testimony and to be salt and light to others. "I love interacting one on one with men and talking about God. I love texting my friends and meeting with small groups and loving each other."

Tuba's new message is this: "Put God first, trust in Him. Put your hope in Him. Love God with all your heart. The standard and goal is Him – chase after Him. Riches and success and fame are nothing – it's vanity."



revelation that is most telling.

Jesus shows compassion even as he unveils the consequences of humanity's denial of His Messianic destiny. He cries out in verse 34, "...How often I have longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings..."

Jesus harmonizes with the Father's devotion revealed in Deuteronomy 32:10-11, "He shielded him and cared for him; he guarded him as the apple of his eye, like an eagle that stirs up its nest and hovers over its young, that spreads its wings to catch them and carries them on its pinions."

God longs for His people,

longs for you and I. Christ personifies this love even to the point of death. He wants to gather us under His wings.

I remember a tough period in my son's life when he was about age 17. He had dropped out of High School and been gone from the house for over a week. I agonized with worry as I heard rumors of various places he had been. How I longed to get him home safely. There was no rest while he was gone.

Finally, my wayward boy called. "Stay right where you are and I'm on my way to pick you up," I said. He looked and smelled like a homeless person. He was gaunt, and his eyes glazed over. It broke me to see him like this, but at least my son was home.

It took over three years for him to recover and pay off the various legal fines he incurred from his mischief. Today he is a graduate and living on his own. But he travelled a long-jagged road. God met the longing of this dad's heart.

God cares for us like a moth-

er eagle cares for an eagle that escapes the nest too soon. God longs for each of us far more than I longed for my son. Jesus walked death row to return us to the Father's care because His heart throbbed with the longing of God's heart. The way of the Eagle is to hover over us until we come home.

Oh Lord my God, guide me to choose the path that reveals Your great love. Give me the courage to walk in the way of suffering that reveals Your compassion. May I not be deterred by danger nor intimidated by rejection. Use me to gather chicks under your wings.

Nation's First Underwater Museum Of Art Expands

Nine new sculptures and a Super Reef Anchor Point were added recently to the nation's first permanent Underwater Museum of Art (UMA) in the Gulf, off the coast of Grayton Beach State Park in South Walton.

Named by Time Magazine as one of 100 "World's Greatest Places," the UMA is the first presentation of the Cultural Arts Alliance of Walton County (CAA)'s Art In Public Spaces Program and is produced in collaboration with the South Walton Artificial Reef Association (SWARA). The purpose of the UMA is to create art that becomes marine habitat, expanding fishery populations and providing enhanced creative, cultural, economic and educational opportunities for the benefit, education and enjoyment of residents, students and visitors in South Walton.

The 2022 installation includes the following pieces of sculpture: Currents and Tafoni by Joe Adams (Ventura, CA), Pirate Shipwreck by Sean Coffey (Pittsburgh, PA), Bloom Baby Bloom by Brit Deslonde (Santa Rosa Beach), The Seed and The Sea by Davide Galbiati (Valreas, France), Fibonacci Conchousness by Anthony Heinz May (Eugene, OR), New Homes by Janetta Napp (Honolulu, HI),

Arc of Nexus by Tina Piracci (Richmond, CA), We All Live Here by Marisol Rendón (San Diego, CA), and Common Chord by Vince Tatum (Santa Rosa Beach).

More than 60 onlookers, including several of the artists and project partners, were on site June 21 to view the historic deployment.

With support from Visit South Walton, Walter Marine/The Reefmaker, and the Florida Department of State; Division of Arts and Culture, the sculptures were deployed with SWARA's existing USACOA and FDEP permitted artificial reef project that includes nine nearshore reefs located within one nautical mile of the shore in 58 feet of water. This installation joins the 25 sculptures previously deployed on a one-acre permit patch of seabed off Grayton Beach State Park, expanding the nation's first permanent underwater museum to a total of 34 sculptures. The UMA patch will continue to be filled with several new sculptures annually.

Individual sculptures are sponsored by Beachy Blooms, Buddy's Seafood Market, the 2021-22 CAA Staff, the Ellis Family, Hilton Sandestin Golf Beach Resort & Spa, the St. Joe Community Foundation,

SWARA, and Walter Marine/Reefmaker.

"The CAA is grateful for the dedication of the artists, fabricators, deployment team and partners," said CAA Executive Director Jennifer Steele. "We could not be prouder to work alongside project co-founders

Allison Wickey and SWARA to build this unique environment for creativity and education."

"With 34 total sculptures now, you can really start to see and feel the vision and future of the Underwater Museum of Art - 58 feet down, you are literally surrounded by these fan-

tastic art pieces and the colorful reef life that calls the museum home," said SWARA President Walt Hartley. "More sculptures will be added each year, growing the dive site and providing valuable new habitat to our precious marine life. We owe the continued success of the UMA project to the amazing support from our community and our sponsors, the creativity, expertise, and professionalism of the Reefmaker Crew / WalterMarine, and the hard work of our most favorite partners in the whole world - the CAA Team!"

Admission to the UMA is free, however, the site is only accessible in person as a dive location. Divers who wish to visit the site can take a dive boat .93 miles off the coast of Grayton Beach State Park. The coordinates for the new Super Reef UMA entrance are N 30°18.754/W 86°09.521. Out of respect for the art, boaters are asked to anchor on or near the Super Reef Anchor Point to protect the sculptures from unintended contact or damage.

Ask Destinities: **Visitors, Please Read**

In our locals' Facebook group at [Facebook.com/groups/Destinities](https://www.facebook.com/groups/Destinities), a topic of concern each summer has been that of people digging holes in the sand and not filling them back in before they leave the beach. This is not only dangerous in general, but also can mean death for our baby turtles. Many visitors do not know that turtle nests are in the dunes and when the eggs hatch, the babies head to the water. This means they have to cross a long area of beach sand

to reach it. They are very tiny, so when they fall into these holes they cannot get out and thus, die there. Also, please take your belongings with you when you leave, because those, too, can serve to entangle the turtle babies, keeping them from reaching their water destination.

Another serious area of concern from locals is visitors not being mindful of the colored flags flying at the beach. Every year, lives are lost because of the red flags being ignored. Red

flags mean that the water is not safe to swim in and usually mean there are rip currents present. You can drown very quickly and/or the person(s) trying to save you can drown. When you get to the beach, the first thing you should do is look around for the flag and take note of its color. Keep an eye on it, because conditions can change throughout the day. You will find signs at entrances to our beaches which give a description to each color. Please stop and read it. You may

also find a chart with descriptions on our website, Destinities.com. Click the drop down menu and click the tab that says Beach Flags and Turtles.

Visitors are appreciated and locals want everyone to have a fun, safe trip. Please be aware of water conditions before you swim and help us keep our beaches without holes, without trash, and without your left behind belongings. Thank you so much!

Let's Get Growing with Julie: **Targeting Biting Flies**

Other than moving to the Arctic, how can you minimize

the risk of being attacked by blood feeding insects this summer? Understanding the habitat needs and behavior of mosquitoes, yellow flies, deer flies, and horse flies is key. Mosquito control does a great job of educating the public with dump, drain, or treat standing water campaigns, but what about those other pesky biters?

Yellow, deer, and horse flies are in the Tabanidae family and are collectively referred to as Tabanids. Although they do

have some differences, there are enough similarities that managing for one will help prevent the others, too.

Tabanids lay eggs on aquatic vegetation, saturated soils, or objects (plants or inanimate) overhanging water bodies or similar surfaces. Larvae (juvenile stage) of these flies feed on moist decaying organic matter, aquatic and semi-aquatic invertebrates, small crustaceans, or earthworms (species dependent) so you are very likely to find adult Tabanids in these environments.

Females are responsible for bites to humans and other animals because eggs require a



blood meal to develop. Although they are strong fliers, they tend to congregate near larval habitat sites – typically shady areas near

water bodies and forests or other areas with dense vegetation. They are active during the day, with the highest incidence of activity during late afternoon or on cloudy days, and are attracted to dark colors and movement.

To reduce the likelihood of bites avoid potential habitats at peak times, wear light colored clothing that covers skin and apply repellents containing DEET, citronella, or geraniol. Eliminating larval habitats near buildings or where people congregate and hanging black ball traps in shady areas can also be employed in management practices. Ball traps can be purchased as kits or you can make your own by following instructions found here https://sfyl.ifas.ufl.edu/media/sfylifasufledu/baker/docs/pdf/horticulture/ThePerfectYellowFlyTrap_000.pdf

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
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
